## Pfc. Larry Rainey In Vietnam



Army Pfc. Larry D. Rainey, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom J. Rainey, Route 1, Ranger, was assigned August 9th as a mortar crewman in the 12th Cavalry in Vietnam.

Larry is a graduate of Desdemna High School and entered the service in February, 1968.

He sent his mother a clipping of an editorial from a Maryland newspaper, and re-printed in The Army Reporter. Larry wrote his mother that all the fellows in his group feel this describes them fairly accurately.

### OUR COMBAT GI'S

(The Easton Star-Democrat, Maryland, serves some 8,000 readers . . . normally. But this editorial entitled "Our Combat GI's" has been reprinted in several other newspapers. The Army Reporter presents it for your information as an illustration of what is thought at home about the serviceman in Vietnam.)

Vietnam is still a pop art oddity 12,000 miles away.

The public worries more about living with a possible tax increase. Officials worry about living with world opinion. The GI worries about living.

His world there is rightly black out and mortar traffic. It's alive with booby traps that can blow his legs or his life to shreds, it's occupied with an enemy and an ally that look exactly alike.

He would give a month's day for a sound sleep.

And 10 years of his life for a night at home.

He is not a bit player in a comic opera conflict, not the trump in an international card game and not 12,000 miles away but as near as the muddy and bloody pictures in the newspapers.

Moreover, he is usually a very young American citizen in a hell of a fix. The average age of a combat GI in Vietnam is eighteen and a half.

But what a man he is!  
 A pink-cheeked, tousled-haired

tight-muscled fellow who, under normal circumstances, would be considered by society as a half-man, half-boy, not yet dry behind the ears, a pain in the employment chart.

But right now, he is the beardless hope of free men.

He is for the most part unmarried and without material possessions except for possibly an old car at home and a transistor radio here.

He listens to rock n' roll and the 105mm howitzers.

He has learned to like beer by now because it is cold and because it is "the thing to do." He smokes because he gets free cigarettes in his C-ration package and it also is the thing to do.

He still has trouble spelling and writing letters home is a painful process. But he can break down a rifle in 30 seconds and put it back together again in 29. He can describe the nomenclature of a fragmentation grenade, explain how a machinegun operates and, of course, utilize either if the need arises.

He obeys now, without hesitation. But he is not broken.

He has seen more suffering than he should have in his short life. He has stood among hills of bodies and he has helped to construct those hills.

He has wept in public and in private, and he is not ashamed in either place, because his pals have fallen in battle and he has come close to joining them.

And he has become self-sufficient; he has two pairs of fatigues, washes one and wears the other. He sometimes forgets to brush his teeth, but not his rifle.

He keeps his socks dry and his canteen full. He can cook his own meal, fix his own hurts and mend his own rips — material or mental.

He will share his water with you if you thirst, break his rations in half if you hunger, split his ammunition if you are fighting for your life.

He can do the work of two civilians, draw half the pay of one and find ironic humor in it all. He has learned to use his hands as a weapon and his weapon as his hands. He can save a life or, most assuredly, take one.

Eighteen-and-a-half-years old.

What a man he is . . . already.

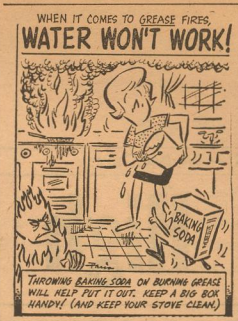

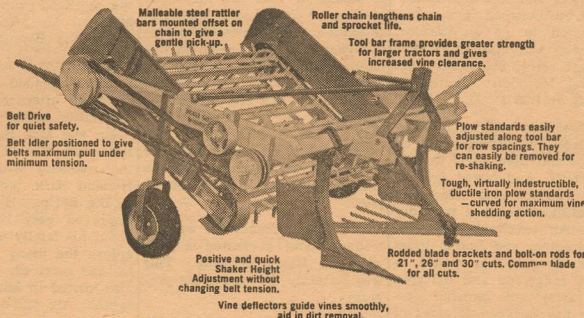

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

**NO. 1**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System.

**NO. 2**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000).

**NO. 3**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule.

**NO. 4**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsection (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section.

**NO. 5**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year.

**NO. 6**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas.

**NO. 7**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.

**NO. 8**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase.

**NO. 9**  FOR  AGAINST  
The amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas.

**NO. 10**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana.

**NO. 11**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties.

**NO. 12**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

**NO. 13**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation.

**NO. 14**  FOR  AGAINST  
The Constitutional Amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices.
