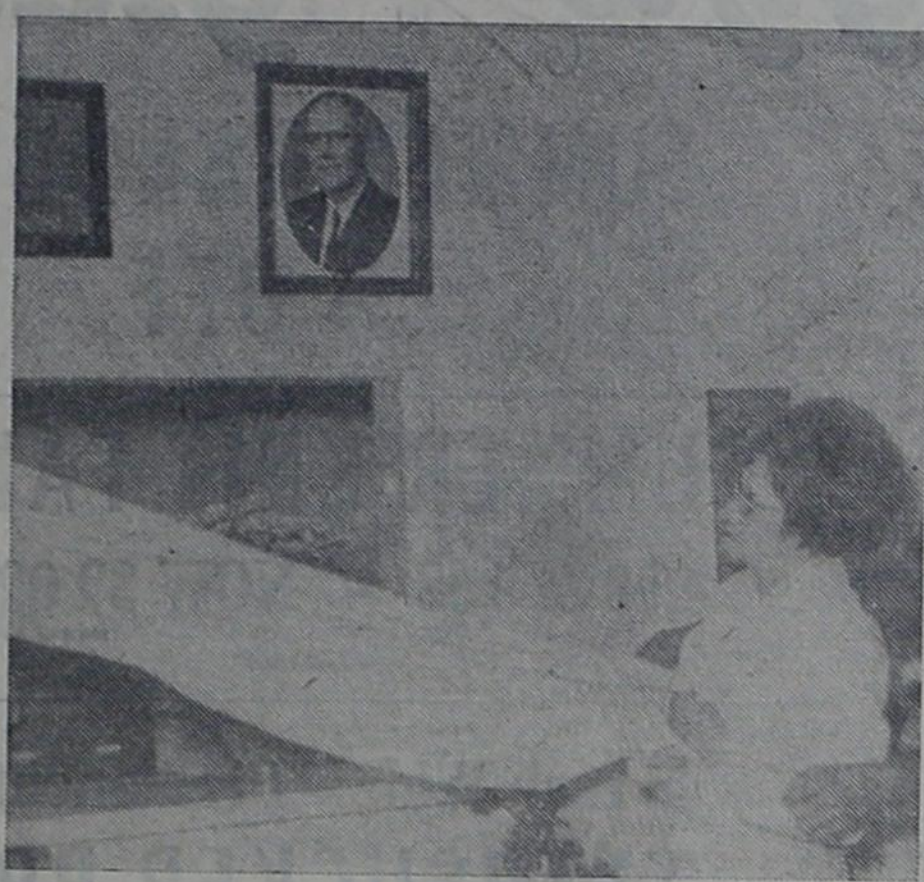
It couldn't happen to a finer fellow is my sentiments on Ross Wilson.

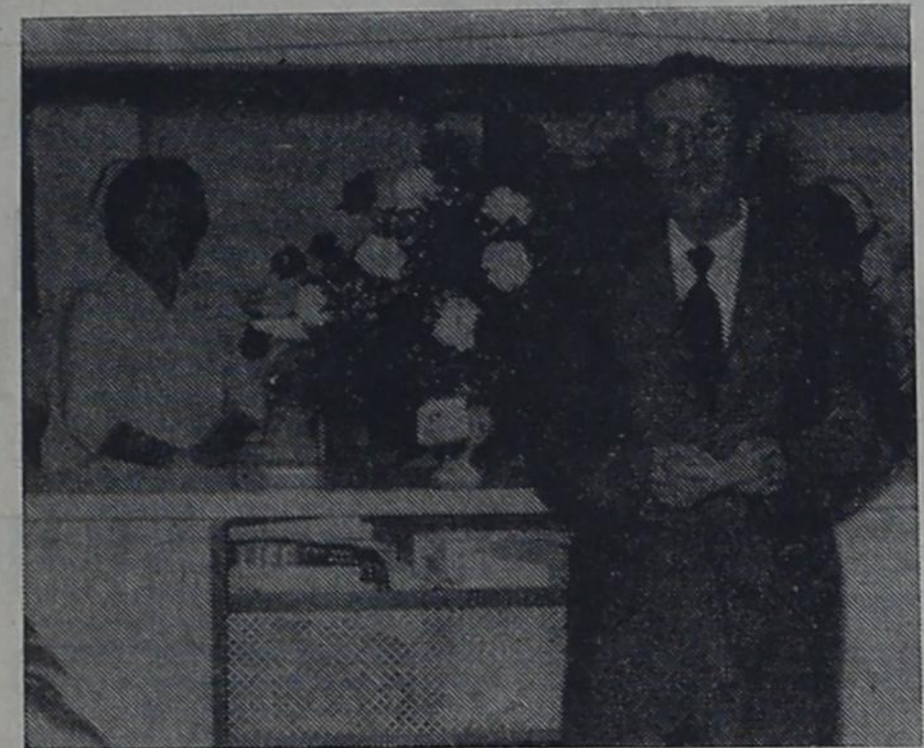
It has been a pleasure working with you for the past "hunner" years Ross. Here is wishing you succes for the next "hunner".

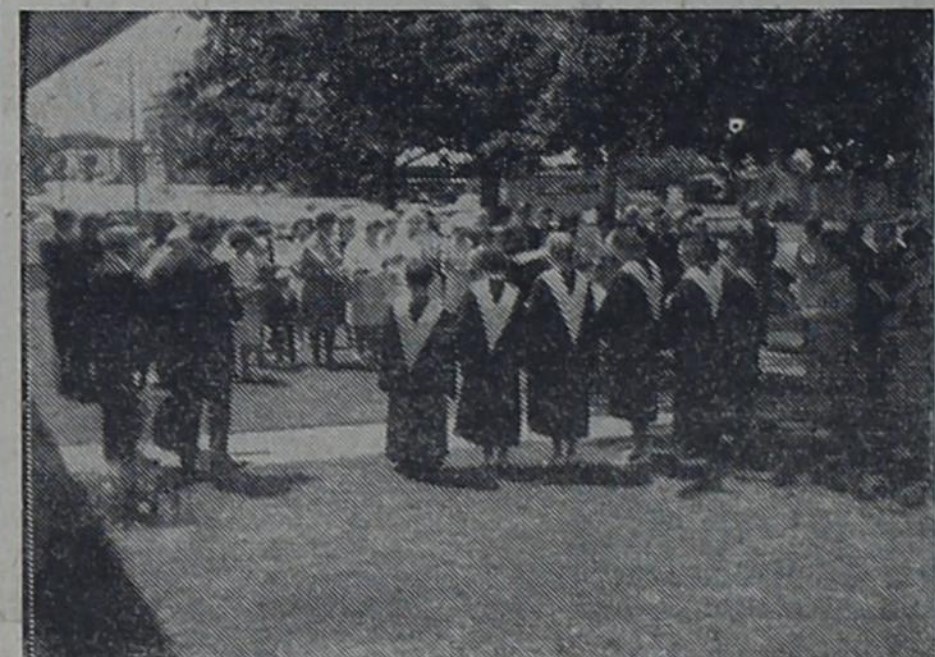
First United Methodist Church Parsonage Dedicated on Sunday

Time To Spray Pecan Trees

Now is the time to control the pecan nut casebearer in Eastland County.

Judging from the insect activity in pecan orchards and groves, County Agent De Gordon predicts that May 17th through May 20th will be the best time to spray pecan trees.

Gordon emphasized that the insect development will vary from one place to another in the county. Growers should check their own trees for egg deposits and feeding of newly hatched larvae to determine the optimum time to spray. When one to two percent of the young nuts have been punctured by the casebearer it is time to spray, the agent said.

Gordon urged commercial pecan growers to have their sprayer and insecticides ready and make daily checks in the orchard or grove to observe egg deposits and feeding of the small worms.

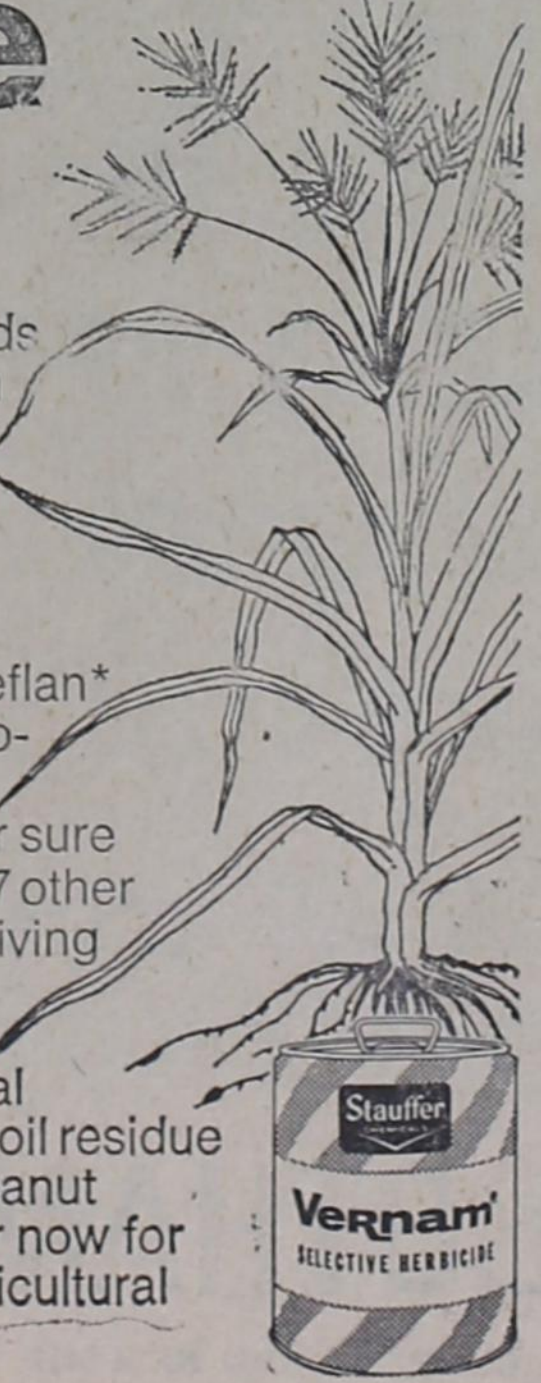

An Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF GORMAN, EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED.

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Gorman by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof; \$2.44 Gross; \$2.20 Net.
Next 3,000 cu. ft. @ \$.778 per Mcf Gross; \$.70 per Mcf Net.

Next 6,000 cu. ft. @ .700 per Mcf Gross; .63 per Mcf Net.

Next 15,000 cu. ft. @ .644 per Mcf Gross; .58 per Mcf Net.

Next 75,000 cu. ft. @ .611 per Mcf Gross; .55 per Mcf Net.

All Over 100,000 cu. ft. @ .589 per Mcf Gross; .53 per Mcf Net.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENTS
The amount of each net

monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments; Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the 42.5 cents per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to April 1, 1972, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make any adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross

It is hereby found and determined that the ordinance is passed in open to the public, as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given, and that this rate ordinance is in compliance with the applicable general criteria issued by the Price Commission under the Economic Stabilization Act of 1970, as amended.

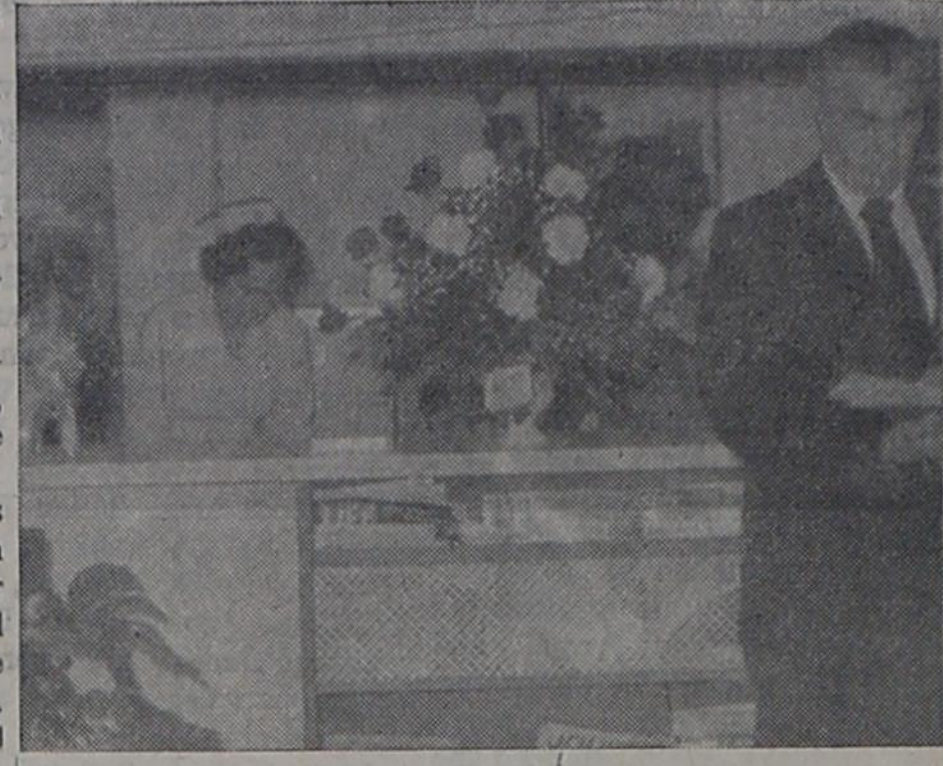

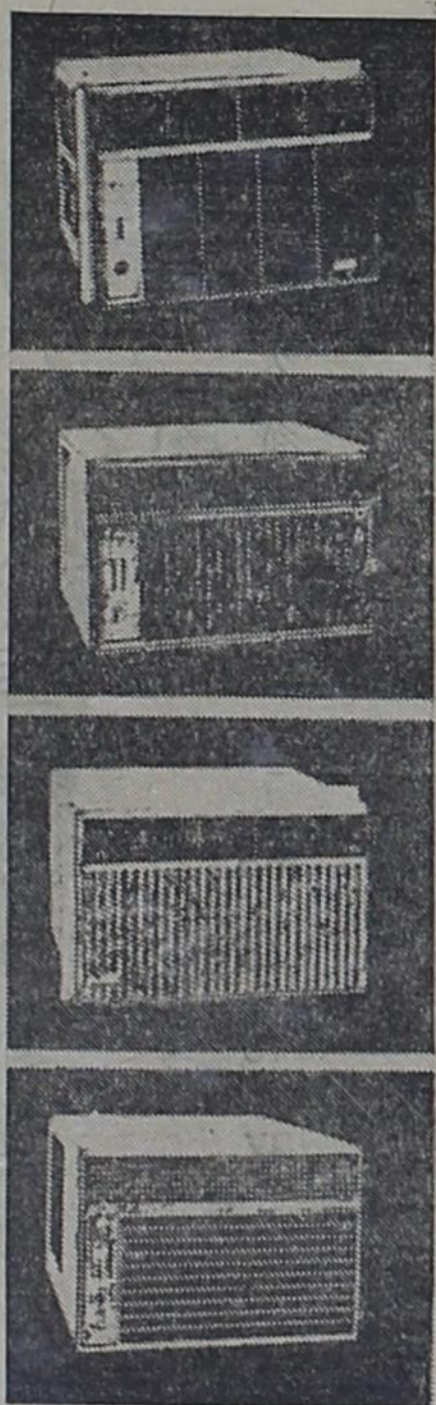

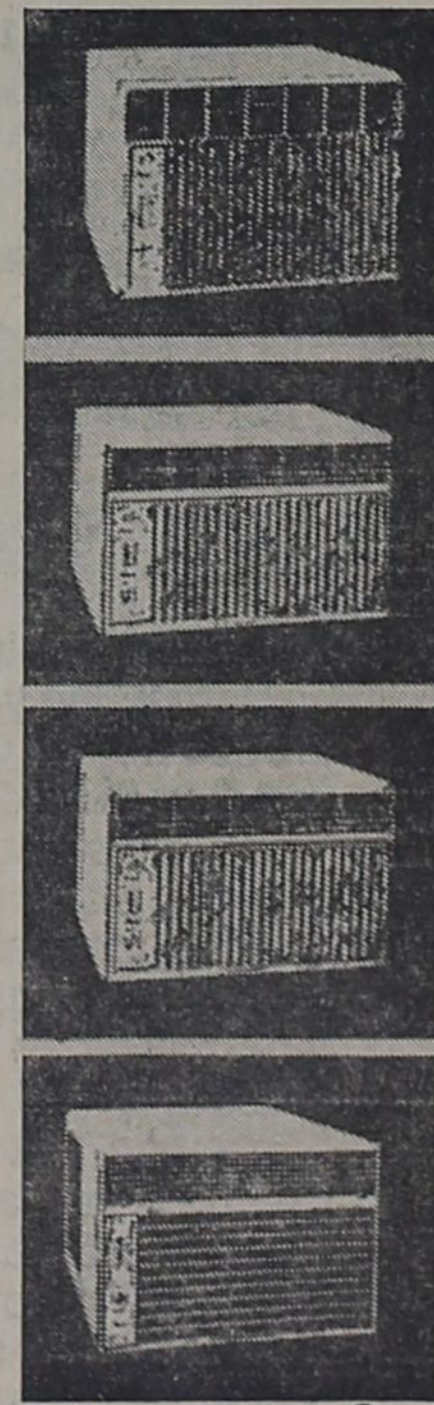
