Panthers Travel To Santo After Loss To Bryson

The Panthers started out on a high note on Friday night when they played host to the Bryson Cowboys, but didn't score again until the decision had been made and lost by the margin of 42 to 15.

Gorman took the opening kickoff on their own 29 and moved the distance in 8 plays with Jason Warren catching a 17 yard pass from Nick Guthery for the score with 8:44 left in the first. The drive featured Paul Petree as he had runs of 11, 3 and 10 for first downs and also a 9 yard pass. Justin Snider booted the point after and Gorman led 7-0.

The lead was short lived however, as the Cowboys took the ball on their own 20 and scored in one play as Todd Tuel hit Todd Tinny with a pass of about 20 yards and he raced 80 yards for the score just 21 seconds later. Justin Dennis booted the point after and the score was 7-7.

The Cowboys came back on their next possession following a Panther fumble on the Bryson 31. The drive covered 69 yards in 8 plays with Brad Clayton getting the final 1 yard with 2:33 left in the first. Dennis kicked the point after and Bryson led 14 to 7.

Bryson scored again with 8:55 in the second when Todd Tuel got the final yard on a run. The drive covered 46 yards in 9 plays. Dennis kicked the PAT and Bryson was up 21-7.

The Cowboys added another score before the half when they took the ball on their own 13 and scored in 6 plays with Tuel hitting Tinny on a 11 yard pass with 4:35 left in the half. Dennis again added the point after and Bryson was up 28-7.

Then with just 1:28 left in the half Todd Tuel hit Brad Clayton on a 64 yard pass and run play for the score to cap a 57 yard drive. The kick failed and the Cowboys enjoyed a 34 to 7 advantage at halftime.

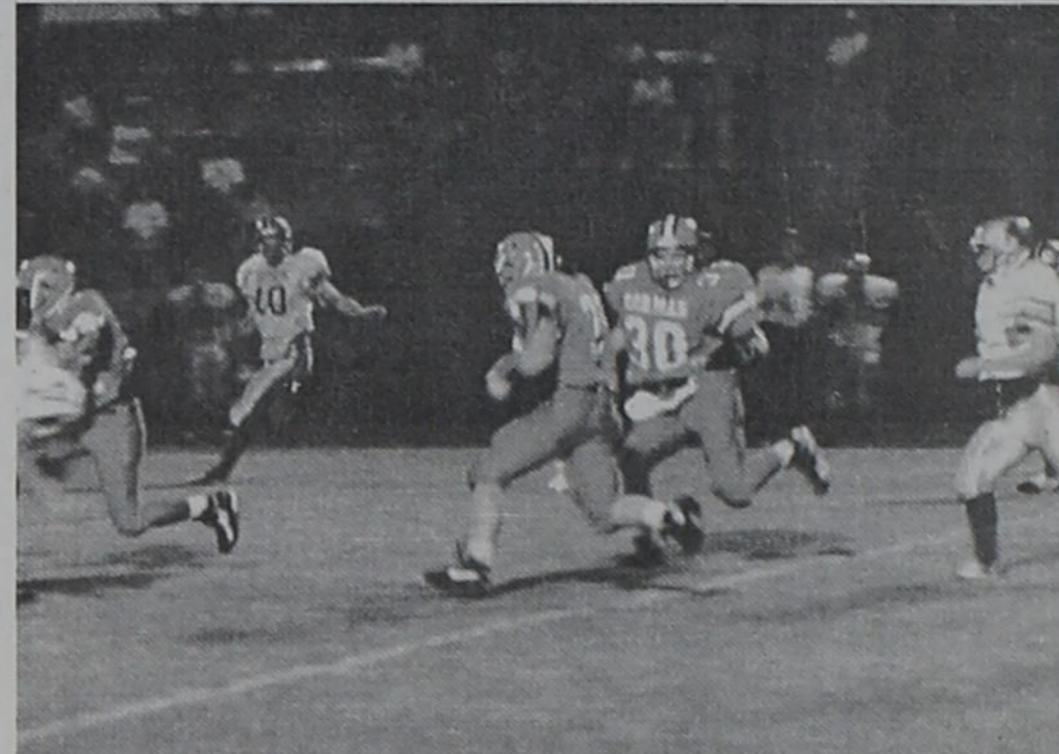
The Gorman Panther Marching Band really entertained the fans with a fine routine at intermission. The band did fantastic.

Gorman came back with 3:36 left in the third when Guthery found Ronald Majors in the end zone on a 25 yard pass play. The drive covered 80 yards in 11 plays and featured runs of 25 and 7 for first downs by Paul Petree and a 6 yard run by Margarito Sanchez for a first down at the Bryson 31. Petree added to two point on a run and the score was 34-15.

Then Bryson came right back and led all pass receivers with 50 yards on 3 catches. Jason Warren had 17 yards on 1 completion and Jason Johnson caught 1 pass for 10 yards.

The Panthers travel to Santo on Friday night to take on the Wildcats in a 8 p.m. game. The Big Red Defense will again be tested and this should be a good one.

Flu shots will now be available from the Texas Department of Health (see dates of clinics below). The flu and pneumonia shots will be charged according to this scale:

If on Medicaid - NO CHARGE - Bring Medicaid Card!
If on Medicare - NO CHARGE - Bring Medicare Card!

All others will pay \$5.00 for the flu shot and \$10.00 for the pneumonia shot.

The Flu shot and immunization clinics will be held in Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, and Gorman. Cost is based on a sliding scale for immunizations. 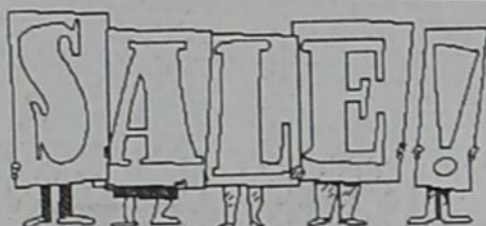

Private Pesticide Applicators Must Be Recertified

Private pesticide applicators who were certified before Jan. 10, 1989 have until Dec. 31 of this year to renew their certification or apply for a private license. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency requires that certification be renewed every five years for private pesticide applicators, such as farmers who use restricted or state-limited use pesticides on their crops.

Two options for renewal are available. Applicators may obtain 15 continuing education units including two credits in laws and regulations and one credit in integrated pest management by Dec. 31, and repeat this process every five years. Or applicators who cannot meet the Dec. 31 deadline have the option of applying for a license. To become a private licensed applicator training course; pass the Texas Department of Agriculture's private applicator test; and apply for a private applicator license which includes a \$50 fee.

Continuing education units may be obtained by completing TDA accredited courses or by applying for credit through appropriate college credit courses or training held by out-of-state sponsors including universities national association or the federal government.

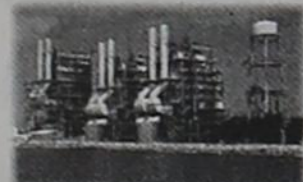

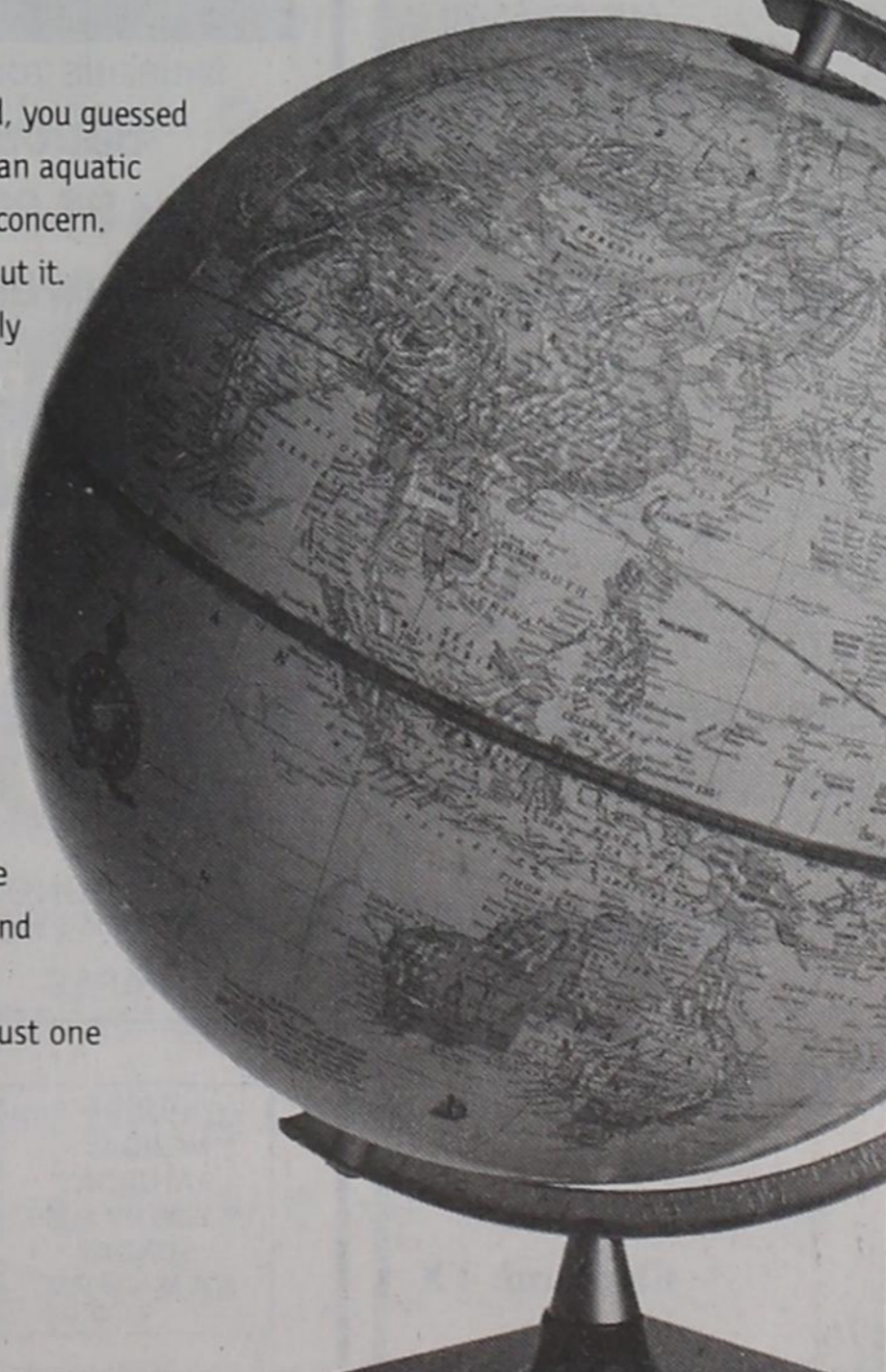

Agriculture

KEEPING HAY FRESH FOR HORSES

Across the State of Texas, the month of September typically produces the last cuttings of hay for the year. Many horseowners have just purchased enough hay to get through the winter and into the spring of next year. The hot August and early September weather allowed hay to be cut and cured out well in many areas of the state. But proper storage of this hay is a key to maintaining freshness and avoiding mold.

Horseowners who have plans to store hay through the winter will need to be sure the bales are stacked on palates or boards to elevate them off the ground. This usually keeps ground moisture from ruining the bottom row of bales. It also allows for some air circulation, which is important for continued freshness.

If possible, hay should be stacked as loosely as possible, allowing air to move through the stack. Loose vs. tight stacking decreases overall storage capacity of a given area, but it can help keep hay from developing mold. Furthermore, it greatly decreases the chances for spontaneous combustion in freshly baled hay.

Horse hay is often stored in tin or metal buildings. In certain areas of the state, the roof of such a structures may sweat, allowing moisture to drip down on the top row of bales. Placing a weatherproof tarp between the roof and hay can help preserve these top bales from mold due to moisture damage.

Hay that smells the least bit moldy or musty should not be fed to horses. A white or bluish, powdery appearance and excessive dust may also indicate mold. Horses that are not overly hungry often refuse to eat moldy roughage if given a choice. However, hungry horses will consume moldy hay which can cause health problems. Before round bales are made available to horses, the outer layer of spoiled or weathered hay may need to be removed.

It's a bit of a challenge to manage stored hay such that it remains suitable for consumption by horses. Barns need to be closed in enough to keep moisture off the hay, yet open enough to allow some air flow. Horseowners in the more humid areas of Texas will often have to work a little harder at keeping stored hay 1) off the ground, 2) dry and 3) well ventilated can save hundreds of dollars between now and the first cutting of 1996.

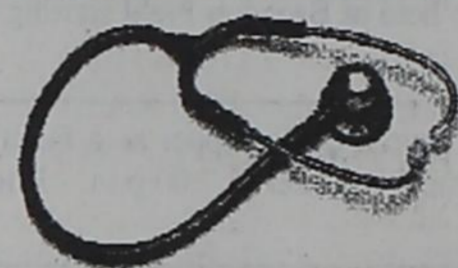

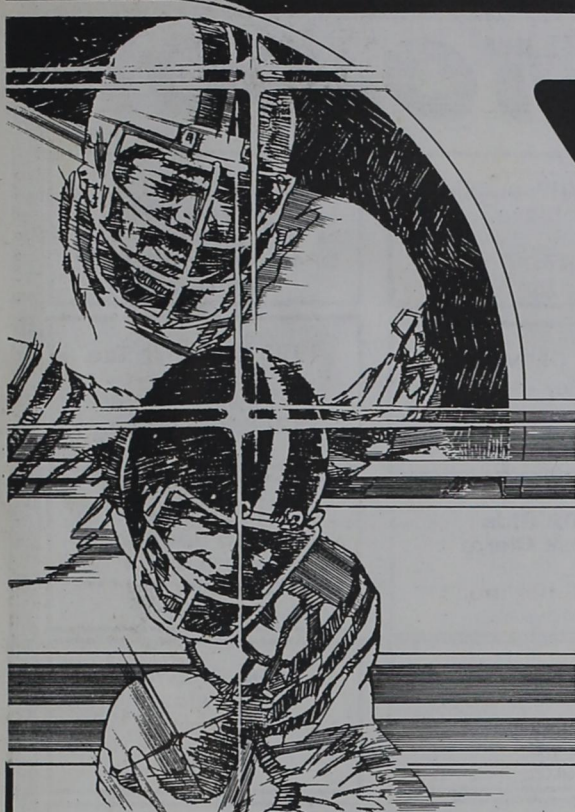
