

Two Screwworm Cases Found In **Eastland County**

Two cases of screwworms were found in Eastland Coun- hear the beautiful songs y last week reported County praise sung. Agent DeMarquis Gordon. He said these were the first conirmed cases of screwworms n Eastland County in six or even years.

One case was found near Gorman and the other near Rising Star. The confirmed cases are being treated by eleasing sterile flies. These terile flies mate with native screwworm flies causing the

"Hot-spot" treatments consist of 100,000 sterile flies being dropped on a single confirmed case. Fly releases are also being made at the rate of 500 to 800 sterile flies per square mile in a major portion of Eastland County.




