**Editorial On  
Natl. Newspaper  
Week Oct. 8-14**

In his "footnotes" column in  
the Fort Worth Star-Telegram

Dr. Gaston Foote recently and pointedly commented upon the failure of so many people to support voluntary institutions of public benefit under the title: "Parking on the Other Fellow's Nickel." He likened them to drivers who look for parking places where others have left unexpired time on

the parking meters. It was a kindly but uncomfortable indictment of many of us who, like myself, are prone to take for granted those institutions, religious, charitable and otherwise, so vital to the spiritual strength, social welfare and democratic unity of society. We are all too willing to let the other fellow pay for the benefits we

receive—ever those benefits that so plainly influence the social and economic well-being of the community. It is not out of place to apply this fact in relation to an event scheduled to occur October 8-14 when National Newspaper Week will be observed, especially in view of what, economically speaking, is happening to so many small town newspapers.

Quoted in the Industrial Review, the chairman of "Newspaper Week '72" said in a message directed to newspaper editors: "You help fill a lot of scrapbooks with items about varied events and organizations. You help fill a lot of churches, meeting places and auditoriums . . . You give columns of space

each week to promotions of clubs, sports, fund drives, . . . But when it comes to talking about yourself and your product, you are shy, retiring, reluctant, usually silent." He might have added that the local paper helps fill a lot of stores with business, too. It does so even when the benefitting business does not use its advertising space, preferring, in effect, to "park on the other fellow's nickel."

The Review commented: "How many of us really understand the significance of the thousands of local papers and the part they play in sustaining our way of life? There is really only one distinction between our 'way of life' and that of oppression-ridden countries — independence of expression. Local papers stand as physical proof that independence of expression is a living fact in the United States. It will continue to be so as long as the local paper remains as an unrestricted medium of opinion and comment."

I would suggest that this 'distinction' points the cultivation, on the one hand, of the vast creative potential that exists in a society of human individuals as opposed, on the other, to a propaganda process of molding a muted society to the will of its masters.

It is in this opportunity for "Independence of Expression"—this cultivation of human resources—that the local paper offers its best service to a community. It makes it an indispensable agency in a free and democratic society.

There is nothing said here to discredit the role of the larger papers. They are equally indispensable; they keep us nationally and regionally informed, alert and—hopefully—unified and cooperative.

But the small, local paper is the "trowel" that cultivates the grassroots of society. Its voice is no less vital for that it speaks with a lesser megaphone, if you will pardon the cockeyed metaphor. Nothing is more closely read.

Contrary to some opinion, the main purpose of a news-

paper is not to furnish publicity. "Publicity" is a deceiving word—a deceit often enough for him whose virtues are exaggerated as for those who might have hoped to profit from those virtues. There must first be something valid to publicize.

The small town newspaper is concerned primarily—consciously or not—with the discovery of local resources and opportunities. It is a catalyst of those human values that can make a town a good and attractive place in which to live: a stimulator of talent that, in the words of Gray's Elegy, might otherwise be "born to blush unseen and waste its sweetness on the desert air."

Properly used and supported, it is an asset upon which a community can depend to keep itself distinctive, vital and growing—in quality as well as size. It offers recognition and encouragement to individuals to create, to adventure in service and citizenship. It is an institution of hometown power, belonging only to that community fortunate enough to claim its confidence and devotion. It is a rare tool for the hands of community builders.

Surely it deserves at least a selfish support.

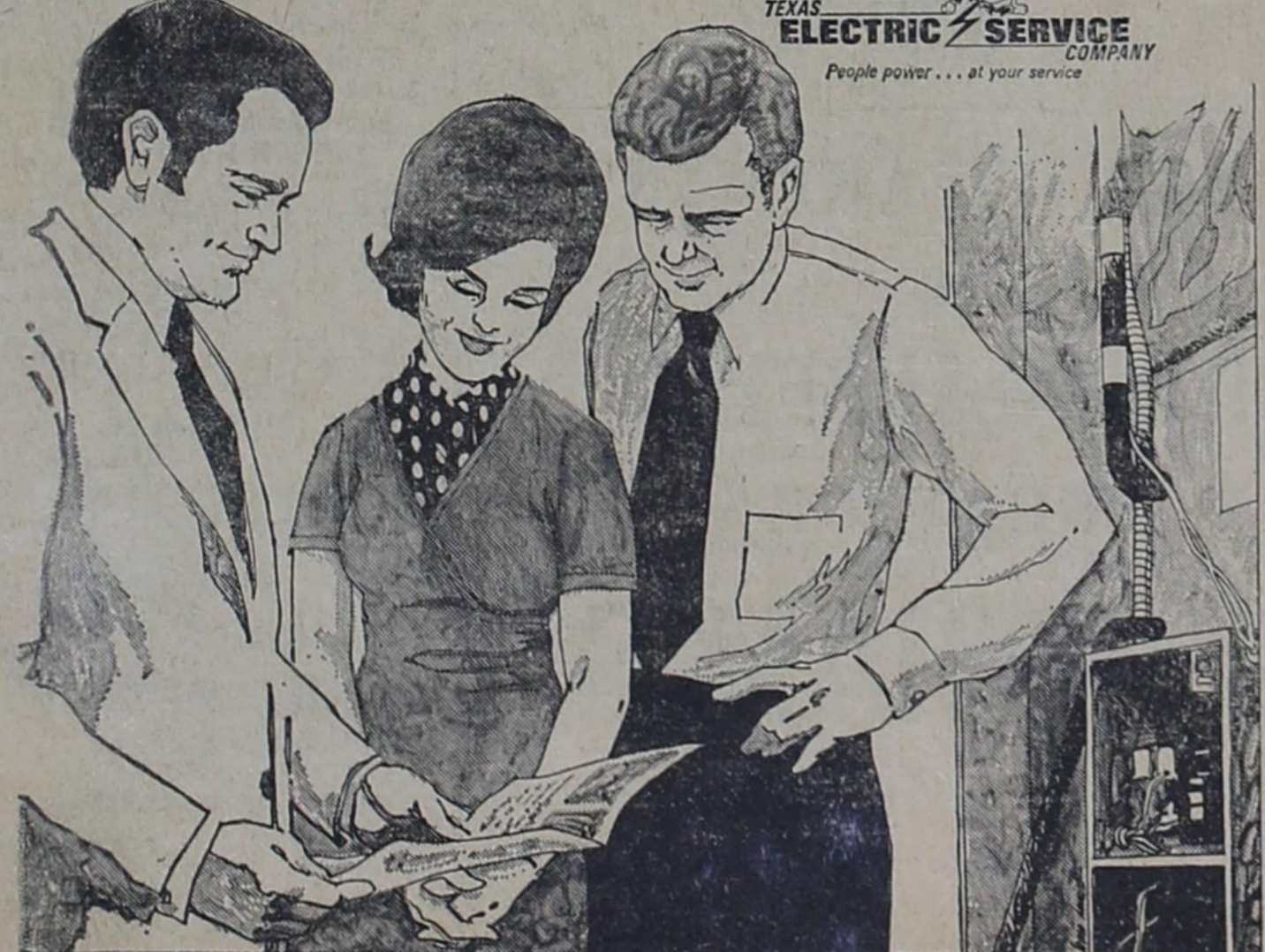
