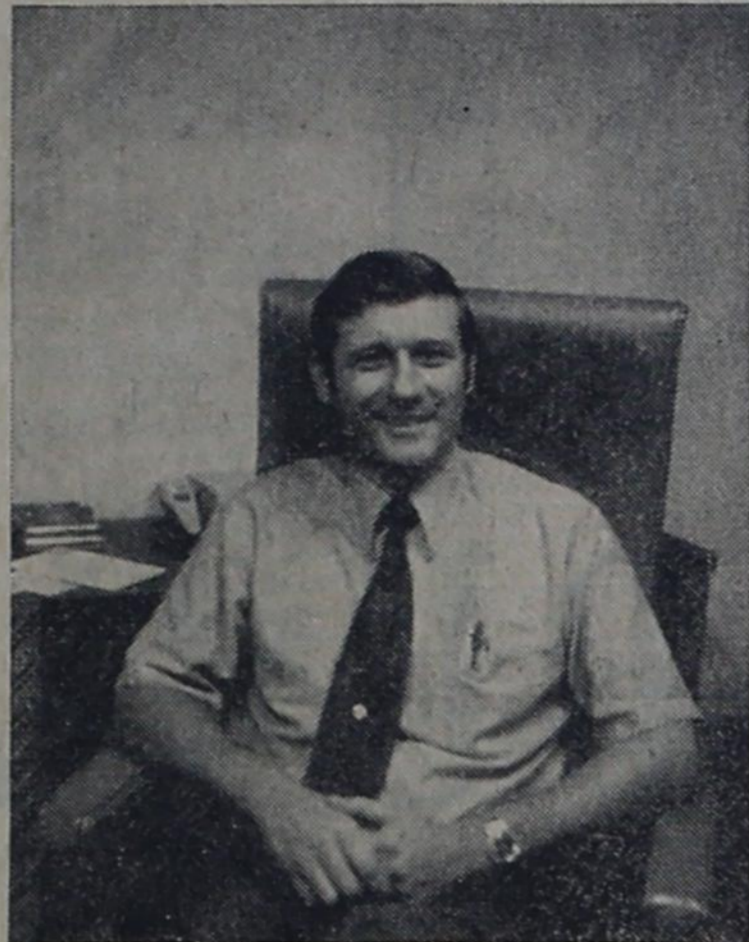

## Know Your School

It is football time once again. Gorman Panthers will open at home on Friday, September 8 with the Dublin Lions at 8 p. m. For this opening game Gorman Peanuts have bought the game and will be admitting people with a complimentary ticket. Tickets are being distributed at several places in town as well as at the school office. I would like to express my appreciation to Gorman Peanuts for sponsoring this game.

There are a number of things each year that I feel need to be called to mind as we start the football season. The high school football games are played under the rules that are established by the UIL. All boys who take part in any game must be eligible under the UIL rules. There is one item that has caused concern in some communities, that is clubs or organizations wanting to provide certain things for the football players. In general, the rules say that players are not to receive any special gifts or favors that all other students do not receive. If any club or organization wishes to do anything special for any or all players, I urge them to check to see if what they intend to do will not make a boy or a team ineligible.

It is the responsibility of the host team to control the crowd at an athletic event. Sometimes this becomes difficult to do. There are several things that you as a spectator can do to help the school carry out this responsibility. Spectators should never gather along the sidelines. This is an area in which trouble can start. A fan can cause the team to be penalized by making remarks from the sidelines to the officials. There is one new rule this year that will apply along the sideline. Rule 1, Section 2, Article 3 states that there shall be limit lines marked 6 feet outside the sideline and the end line. It further states "No person shall be within the limit lines except when permitted to be on the field." The League states that it is important that administrators, coaches and officials see that these rules are adhered to. This rule has two aims, first, to protect people who gather along the sideline and, second, to protect players who might run into people along the sideline. I know that you will cooperate with the school by staying off the sideline as far as possible at all times back of the limit line.

Remember that the boys that you will be watching are not professionals or even college players. They are high school boys and many lack experience and know-how. I am asking that you remember this and not be too critical of the boys. This game and all others will be conducted according to the rules of the UIL and the official football rules, which many times we do not understand. The coaching staff has made an effort to get the boys ready and the officials have been selected who we feel will call a fair and impartial game. I know that we will not always agree with the call of the officials, but remember, they have the last word. As we cheer our team on at the games, let's try to be good hosts, win or lose.

There is another area that is causing some concern in connection with high school athletics, that is the bringing of intoxicating beverages into the stadium or athletic field. Section 1 of HB 531 states, "It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to bring or carry into any enclosure, field or stadium, where athletic events, sponsored or participated in by the public schools of the state, are being held, any intoxicating beverage in his possession while in or on said enclosure, field or stadium." I am asking that everyone cooperate in this matter

# Panthers To Host Dublin In Opener Friday At 8

Well, its time for the moon season to set in, as the Panthers will host the Dublins of Class A in the season opener at Brogdon Field Friday night at 8 p. m., and for the past few seasons it has always came a flood on the same evening.

The game on Friday night has been dubbed "The Little Peanut Bowl" by this writer due to the fact that Gorman Peanuts has bought the game and have tickets available at several places in Gorman. This is a very big gesture by this outstanding firm and it is sincerely appreciated by the football fans, as well as the schools represented in the game. If you do not have a ticket before game time they will be available at the gate. And, of course, Gorman Peanuts will pick up the tab.

## Public School Kindergarten

Mr. Garrett states that he is running this article so that he might answer some questions that have been asked about why Gorman does not have a public school Kindergarten.

As some know, the Legislature in 1969 passed the Public School Kindergarten Law, which states that beginning with the school year of 1977-78, any child in the state over 5 and under 21 years of age at the beginning of the school year (which is still September 1) who has not yet graduated from high school, shall be entitled to the benefits of the Basic Foundation School Program for the ensuing school year. Such eligible child shall be admitted tuition-free to the public schools of the district in which he, his parents, or legal guardian resides. Provided, however, that for the school years 1969-1970 through 1976-77, the qualifying age limits at the beginning of the school year shall be in accord with the following table: 1969-1970 through 1972-73 the beginning age shall be 6 years and 0 months; for the 1973-74 through 1974-75 the beginning age shall be 5 years and 7 months; and for the school years of 1975-76 and 1976-77 the beginning age shall be 5 years and 4 months.

The law does make provision to operate a public Kindergarten for the educationally handicapped child. An educationally handicapped child is defined as one who cannot speak, read, and comprehend the English language, or a child from a family whose income, according to the standards of the Texas State Board of Education, is at or below the subsistence level.

Under the conditions as set forth in the law, the Gorman Schools do not have enough pupils falling in the educationally handicapped group to offer the Kindergarten program. If such a program had been started, the teacher teaching such qualified students would have been charged to the district as a Classroom Unit which would have affected our overall educational program.

If you have further questions, I will try to answer them for you, states Mr. Garrett. —GP—

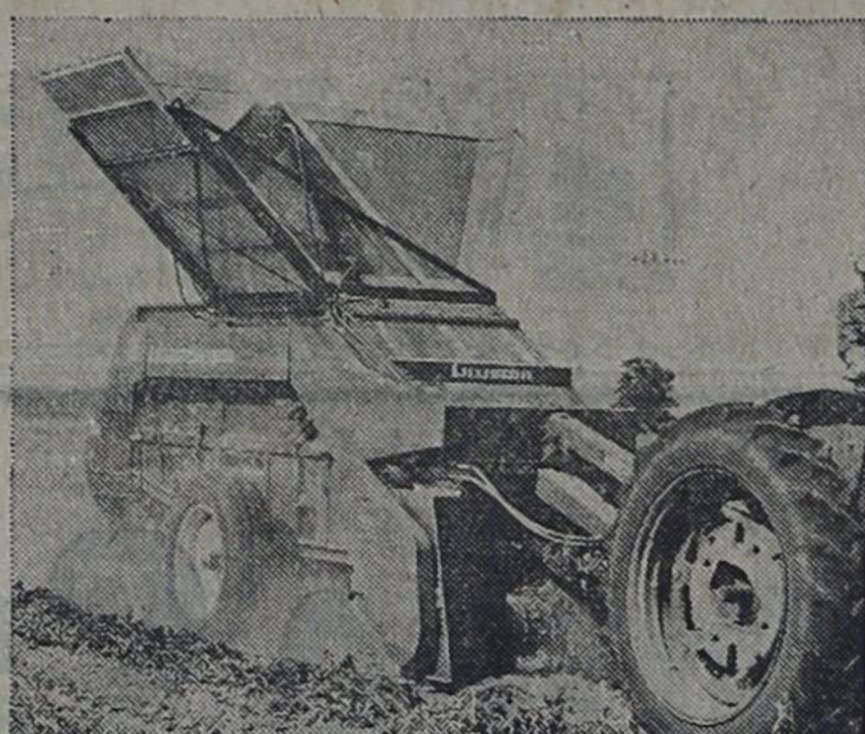

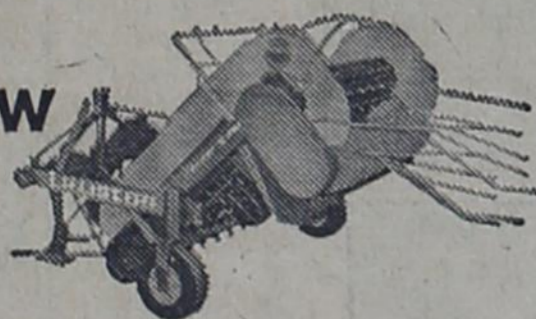

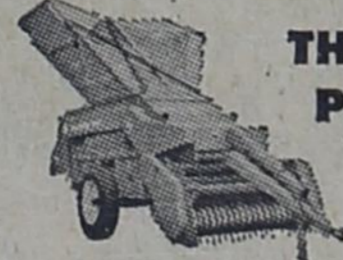
