VOTERS HERE FAVOR NIXON AND BRISCOE

Voting was heavy in the General Election held here Tuesday. A total of 550 votes were cast and workers were up until 12:00 a. m. Wednesday tabulating the results.

Richard M. Nixon defeated George S. McGovern in what is called the "clearest choice" in a century of presidential elections.

At press time Wednesday the post for Governor was yet to be decided between Dolph Briscoe and Henry C. (Hank) Grover.

The Gorman voting box tallied 388 votes for Nixon, 139 for McGovern.

Briscoe received 310 votes and Grover 210. Ramsey Muniz, 1, Raza Unida Party, and John Schmidt 4, American Party.

In the hotly contested U. S. Senate race between John Tower and Barefoot Sanders, Tower received 308 and Sanders 221. Tom Leonard, Socialist Workers Party got 1 vote.

Bill Hobby, 396 for Lt. Governor (D), Meyer Alewitz, 1, Socialist Workers Party, and Alma Canales, 7, for Raza Unida Party.

John Hill received 386 for Attorney General (Democrat), Thomas Kincaid received 2, (Socialist Workers Party).

Robert S. Calvert received 389 votes for Comptroller of Public Accounts (Democratic) Anne Springer received 4 (Socialist Workers Party).

For State Treasurer, Jesse James (D) received 308 votes; Maurice Angly, Jr., (Republican) received 217; and Ruben Solois, Jr., (Raza Unida) received 2.

Bob Armstrong received 383 votes for Commissioner of the General Land Office (D); and Howard Petrick, (Social Workers) polled 2 votes.

For Railroad Commissioner Byron Tunnell (D) polled 341 votes; Jim Segrest (R) received 157; Fred R. Garza (Raza Unida) polled 1.

Joe Hanna, (D) received 373 votes for State Rep. District 54; Jack Hetzel (R), received 142; and Joe Guerro (Ra) 1.

For State Board of Education District 17, James M. Binion (D) received 345 votes and James Rominger, (R) received 142 votes.

Unopposed candidates were elected and included Raleigh Brown, Count of Civil Appeals, Earl Conner, 91st District Judge, Emory Walton, Criminal District Attorney; L. E. (Lefty) Sublett, Sheriff; Nancy Trout, Tax Assessor-Collector; Chester Breneman, County Surveyor; and Albert White, Constable of Precinct 2.

Local voters voted against six of the 14 proposed Constitutional Amendments, giving approval to numbers 6, 7, 8, 10, 13 and 14.


