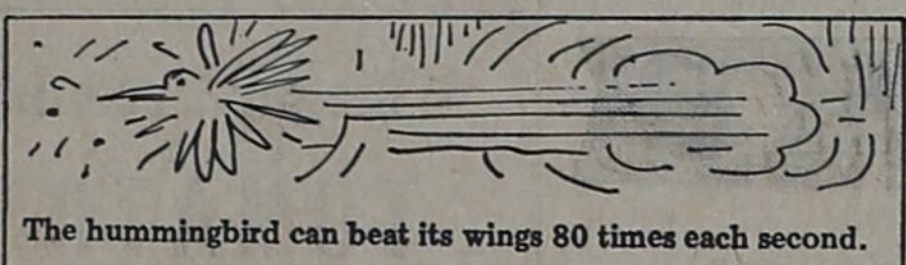

## THE GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

County Agricultural Agent While the autumn leaves are on the trees they make beautiful scenery, but once they fall on the lawn they are not so pretty. These leaves should be removed from the lawn, not only for appearance sake but also to prevent damage to the grass.

Now, what do you do with the leaves? Why not compost them and provide a ready source of composted soil for use in preparing flower and shrub borders, potted plants and as a top-dressing for the yard.

The simplest method of composting leaves or other vegetable matter is to build up alternate four-to-six inch layers of vegetable matter with two to four inches of good garden soil. Sprinkling a commercial fertilizer on each layer of vegetable matter will hasten decomposition. One-half pound or one cupful of 0-10-10, 10-6-4, 10-20-0, or the equivalent fertilizer mixture, per 10 square feet of vegetable matter layer is sufficient.

Manure, if available and free of weeds, may also be added to the soil layer.

The compost pile should be 4 to 6 feet wide and of any desired length. The top layer should consist of soil and the surface of the pile should slope toward the center, forming a basin to hold water.

The layers of leaves should be watered thoroughly as they are spread out. When the pile is completed, additional water should be added periodically to keep the material moist but not soggy.

The compost should be turned or mixed with a garden fork or shovel every three or four months. Within 6 months to a year, the compost should be ready for use.

Peanut harvest is near completion in Eastland County. Rains delayed harvest for about two weeks in late October, but by November 1st growers continued with peanut harvest. Since that time all but five to ten percent of the crop has been harvested.

Many growers said the rains did more good than harm. It softened the soil that had become dry and hard. Some good yields are still being reported.

The pecan harvest was also delayed because of the wet weather. Some of the pecans that had fallen were washed away and buried in the soil. The wet weather also caused some of the pecans to sprout.

The Eastland County Pecan Show will be held in Eastland December 1st and 2nd. We hope you are saving an entry of every variety of pecans you grow. An entry consist of at least 40 pecans. They must be grown in 1972 and must be entered by the person who grew them.

This will be the 20th Annual Pecan Show in Eastland County. J. M. Cooper started the pecan show idea here in 1952. The idea spread rapidly and now pecan shows are held in about 30 counties. The shows have been a big factor in the development of better quality pecans.

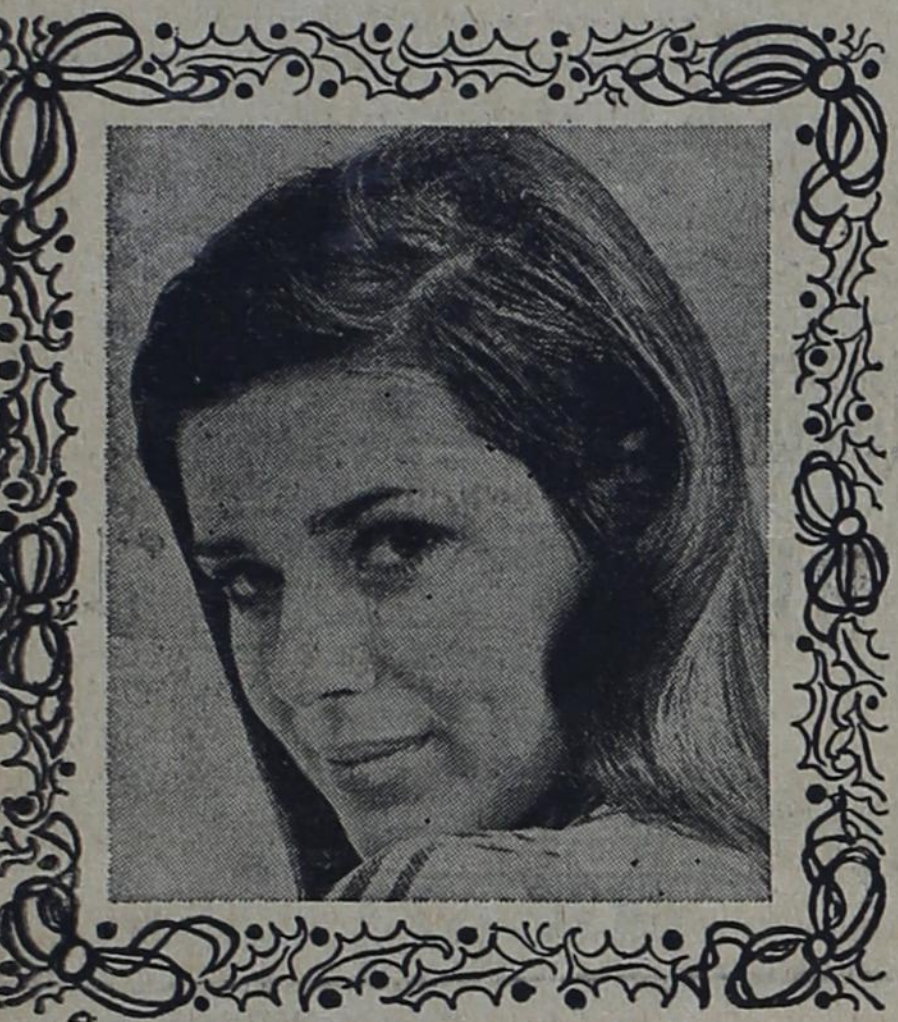

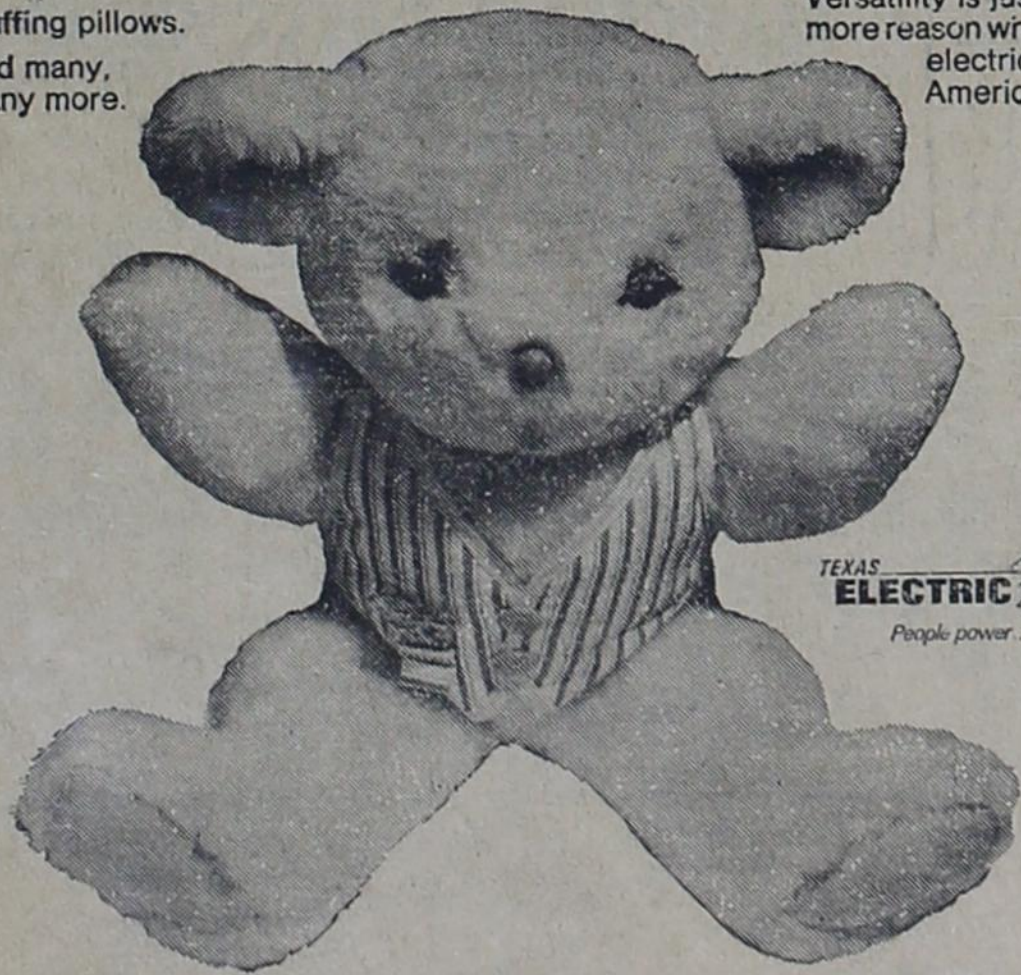
