I have yet to see the day when the majority of people in our community will fail to stand up and be counted for the best interest of our area.

May you enjoy good health, and God's blessing during the coming year.

The following information on Social Security is being published in this space so that you will be sure and see it.

Every citizen in the United States is directly or indirectly affected by Social Security.

Survivors of disabled workers who died in 1970 or 1971 without having filed a social security claim, may now do so for them up through January 31, 1973.

Persons who started their social security retirement benefits at or after age 65 now have their checks increased in 1973 by 1-2 or 1% for each month in 1971 or later that a full check was not payable because of high earnings; this is to be an annual affair.

Divorced wives, 62 or older, whose marriage(s) lasted 20 years are now eligible for social security pay on their former husband's record, any month he gets a check.

Some grandchildren can now be paid social security benefits on the grandparent's record if both parents are deceased or disabled.

Students can receive in social security checks from a disabled, retired, or deceased parent to the end of the term in which age 22 is reached.

A disabled son or daughter of a retired, disabled, or deceased parent may now get social security benefits if the disability began before age 22.

Children receiving social security checks due to their own disability may enroll for Medicare benefits with the 25th month of such disability benefits, but no earlier than July, 1973.

The waiting period during which no social security benefits can be paid has been shortened to five instead of six months, effective Jan. 1973.

Disabled widows may enroll for Medicare as of the 25th month of disability benefits of July 1, 1973, whichever is later.

A dependent widower may get social security checks in 1973 or later at age 60.

A widow - or dependent widower - whose social security entitlement begins at 65 or later will get 100% of the husband's or wife's benefit rate, effective with check for Jan. 1973 or later.

A widow - or dependent

widower - who remarries after age 60 may continue to receive social security benefits at half of the wage earner's basic rate, unless more can be paid on his new spouse' record.

Extra social security credits after 1956 for members of the armed forces will now be \$300 per calendar quarter for years in which the maximum creditable had not already been reached.

Payments by an employer to a disabled former employee after Dec. 1972 will not be taxable nor creditable for social security purposes for years after the year in which disability began if no work is performed.

Employees of a Federal Home Loan Bank are mandatorily covered by social security from Jan. 1, 1973 on; service back to 1967 may be purchased if done by July 1, 1973.

Non-farm self-employment income for social security credits may - for '73 and later - be computed for some years on an optional basis such as farmers have had since 1955, provided a profit of \$400 or more was made in two or three preceding years.

Tax rates for the self-employed for retirement, disability, survivors, and hospital insurance under social security go to 8%, 1973-77; 8.25% 1978-80; 8.35%, 1981-85. 8.45%, 1986 and later.

Men born after Jan. 1, 1911, or after Jan. 1, 1912, or after Jan. 1, 1913 will have their social security benefit computations approach, then reach, the same formula as has been used for women since 1956; the 3-year advantage formerly applicable to women ends with 1975.

Persons whose social security retirement benefit is less than \$170 may get an increase on Feb. 2, 1973, depending on how many years in the 1937-54 period credited them with at least \$900; 1955-58, \$1050; 59-65, \$1200; 66-67, \$1650; 68-71, \$1950 1972, \$2250.

Widows - and dependent widowers - whose entitlement to social security started at or after age 60, will range from 71.5% of the wage earner's retirement rate (factual or computed) at 60, to 100% at age 65, with graduated amounts in between effective with check due Feb. 3, 1973.

Starting in 1973, a social security beneficiary is due a full check for any month in which earnings are \$175 or less, no matter how high the annual total.

Starting in 1973, a social security beneficiary need account only for his earnings up to the month of attainment of age 72.

In determining formula for offsetting disability benefits against a Workmen's compensation award, social security will use the highest of these three "current earnings": (a) the average on which social security payment is based, (b) the highest 5 consecutive years of earnings, or (c) in 1973 and later, the highest one year in the six year period ending with onset date of disability.

Fraudulent actions involving social security punishable as a crime now include securing a social security number by furnishing false information.

Medicare coverage - regard less of age - is to be available July 1, 1973, and later to a person insured under social security, or to the spouse or dependent child of such person, if kidney transplantation or hemodialysis is needed, starting with third month af-

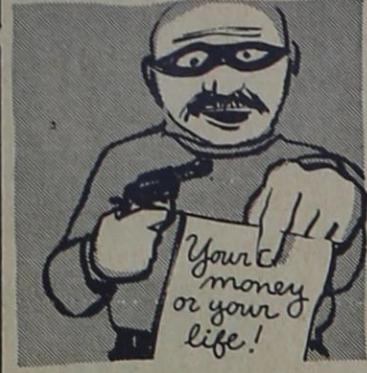
Amendment against self-incrimination.

Nevertheless, the court ruled that he would have to make the sample or face punishment for contempt. The court said handwriting is not a form of testimony but a neutral, objective fact.

**Forced Handwriting**

During a holdup at a gas station, the robber handed the manager a threatening note. Some months later, when a suspect was brought to trial for the crime, he was asked to make a sample of his penmanship for purposes of comparison.

But he flatly refused to do so. He invoked his constitutional protection under the Fifth



"The constitutional privilege," said the court, "does not protect a man from being compelled to stand up, sit down, walk, speak, or submit to photographing or fingerprinting."

Almost always, courts have ruled this way when an accused person is reluctant to demonstrate his handwriting. In fact, he may even be called upon to write in an unnatural style if that will help clear up the case. Thus:

The defendant in a forgery trial was requested to write something with a backward slant, since the document in question had been written that way.

Again, the court said he would have to comply. The court reminded him that the odd style of writing would be especially helpful in exonerating him if he was truly innocent.

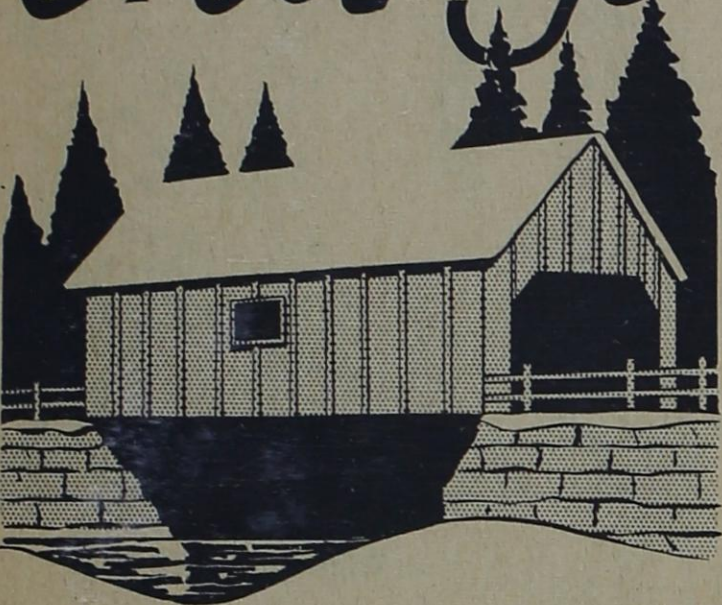
Still, a defendant might properly object to the content, rather than the form, of the writing. In another case, involving fake claims against the government, the defendant was asked to write down the specific names that had been used in the falsified papers.

This time, when he refused, the court decided he was justified. The court said that by complying with the request, he might be tying himself directly into the crime.

Compelling him to do so, added the judge, would be "an infringement upon the spirit" of the constitutional privilege.

# Judge Reveals Plans For Eastland Revenue Check

EASTLAND (RNS) — Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey said Friday that the first \$55,000 federal revenue sharing check which was received this week will probably be split between the transportation (road and bridge) fund and the general fund.

He said the general fund money will probably be used for "priority spending" such as law enforcement and public safety.

Bailey said a second check is due to arrive about Jan. 15. Bailey said that the County Commissioners felt that each of the four county precincts should receive about \$6,600 of the money destined for the road and bridge fund, and that the money will be earmarked for labor, machinery, fuel, trucks, etc.

Thursday Bailey attended a statewide meeting in Austin which was designed to instruct public officials on proper ways to spend the funds.

During the meeting, dates were set for area workshops throughout the state for state, county and city officials. To be discussed at the area meetings will be detailed information on proper methods of reporting expenditures and standardizing forms of accounting.

Bailey said he and other officials will be attending the workshop set for Jan. 9, at Breckenridge.

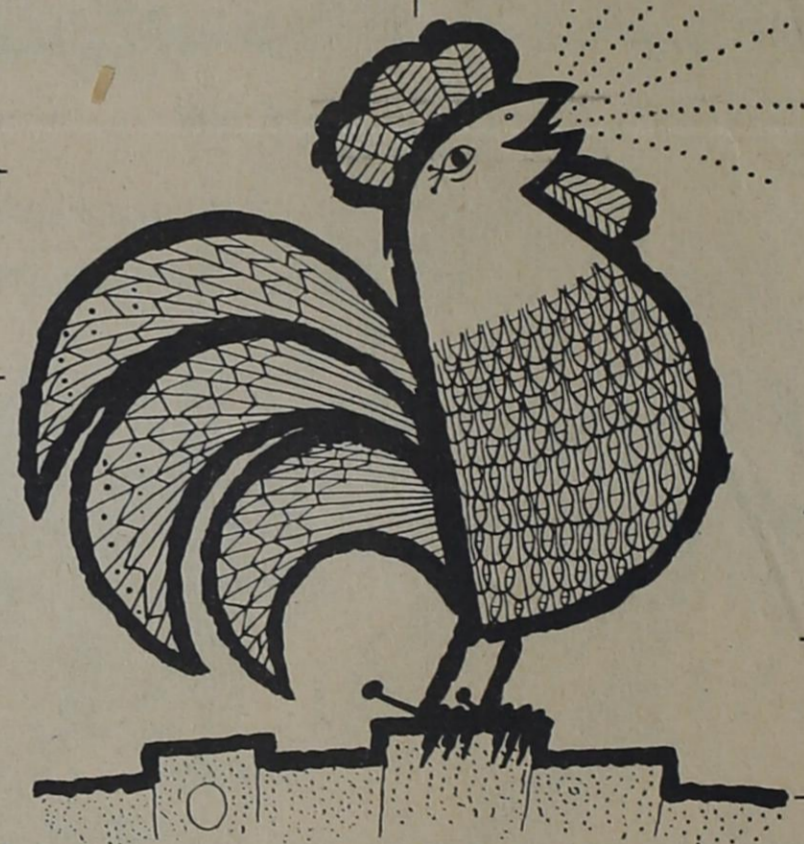
