



### We're diversifying the fuels we use to generate electricity. It's necessary, but expensive.

Natural gas is the major fuel for our generating plants, with oil used on a standby basis. Both are in increasingly short supply.

To reduce our dependence on natural gas and oil, we began several years ago to diversify to lignite and nuclear fuels which are not used extensively for any other purpose than the generation of electricity.
