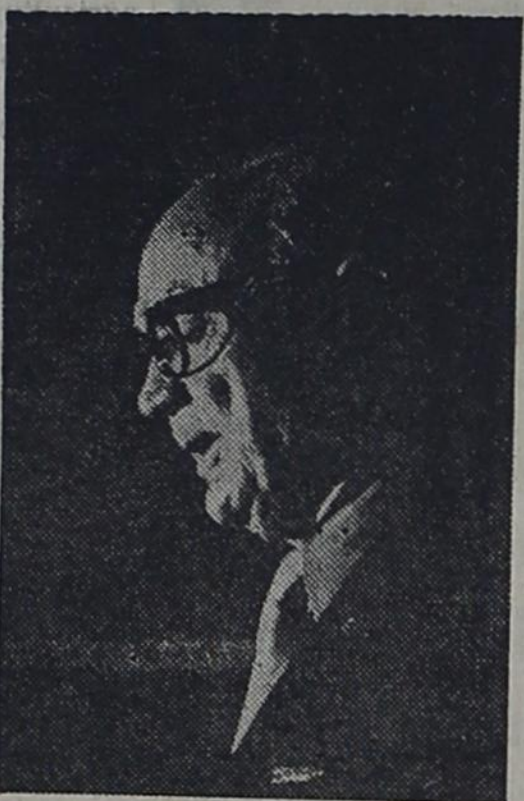

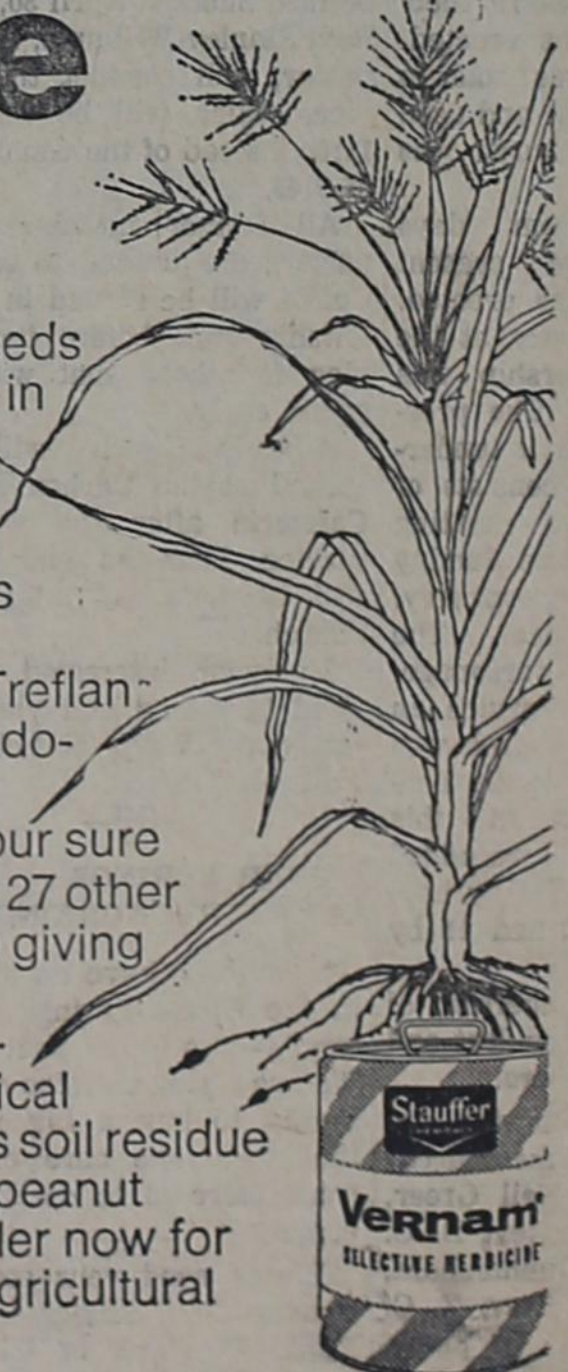

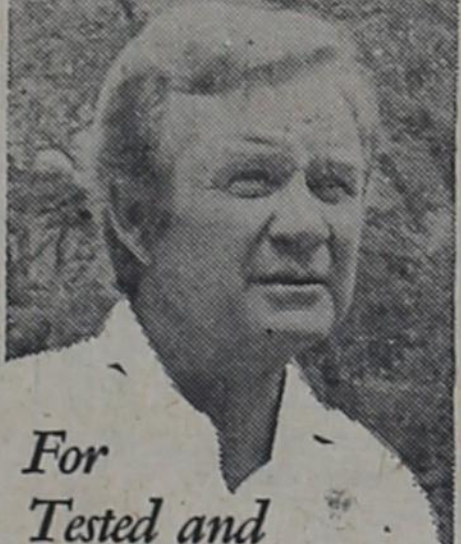

### WASHINGTON "As it looks from here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. - THE NEWLY ALIGNED 17TH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT takes on a new complexion for the third time since 1966. In 1947 there were 12 counties in the District with about 230,000 people. In 1959 Parker and Scurry Counties were removed, 12 new ones were included, giving the District a total of 24 Counties. Seven additional counties were added for a total of 14. Effective in January 1967, Parker and Scurry Counties were removed, 12 new ones were included giving the District a total of 24 counties. Seven additional counties were added effective in January of 1969, making it a 31-County Congressional District. In the 1971 redistricting plan, it remains a 31-County District, with a population of 467,912, though not the same 31 counties.  
**TWELVE OF THE ORIGINAL COUNTIES** comprising this District prior to 1967 will still remain a part of the 17th Congressional District as a result of this latest redistricting. Further, of the 467,912 people in the proposed new District, effective in January 1973, 357,180 of those persons were originally in the older constituency.

**IN STUDYING THE NEW ALIGNMENT,** it is reassuring to note that the new District lines encompass an area of North & West Texas which is very compatible insofar as the economy is concerned, even though the geography is somewhat spread out. With two of the new counties Montague and Cooke, on the Oklahoma border to the northeast; Floyd County on the northwest bordering Hale County and above Lubbock County and with McCulloch and San Saba on the southern border the newly aligned District includes a varied economy of cotton, cattle, wool, grain, oil, leather goods, military, education, peanuts, industry, business, transportation, and recreation, among other aspects of the economy.

**THE 31 COUNTIES NOW COVER 29,404 square miles.** There are 183,648 housing units. There are seven communities of 10,000 population or more, with Abilene the largest city, with 89,259 people - about 17 percent of the entire District population. The other cities of 10,000 or more include Brownwood, Gainesville, Big Spring, Sweetwater, Mineral Wells and Snyder.

**THESE FIGURES ARE NOT TOO significant** except that they do point out the tremendous territory included in this new Congressional District. With the Congress staying in session throughout most of each year, it can be readily understood that it might be a little difficult for Congressman to visit in all parts of the District very often - but with time it will be done.

**IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO GO FOR A SUNDAY DRIVE,** and stay within the Congressional District, try driving from Big Spring to Gainesville - 328 miles, moving from the southwest to the northwest corners of the District. A little shorter trip would be from the northwest to the southeast corners - from Floydada to San Saba, a distance of 314 miles within the District. Shorter trips within the District could include Brady or Gainesville - 290 miles, or Abilene to Gainesville - 218 miles, or Abilene to Floydada - 181 miles, and even a little shorter, from Abilene to San Saba is just 141 miles.

**THE 29,404 MILES IN THE 17th District** compared with the combined area in square miles of the States of Massachusetts, New Jersey, Delaware, Rhode Island, Hawaii, the District of Columbia, the Canal Zone, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands total 29,48 square miles. Within those states and territories 18,470,787 people reside. As a further comparison, each of the States of Ohio, Maine, Virginia, South Carolina and Tennessee cover less than 43,000 square miles. And each of these States, except Maine, has over 2 1/2 million people residing within its borders.

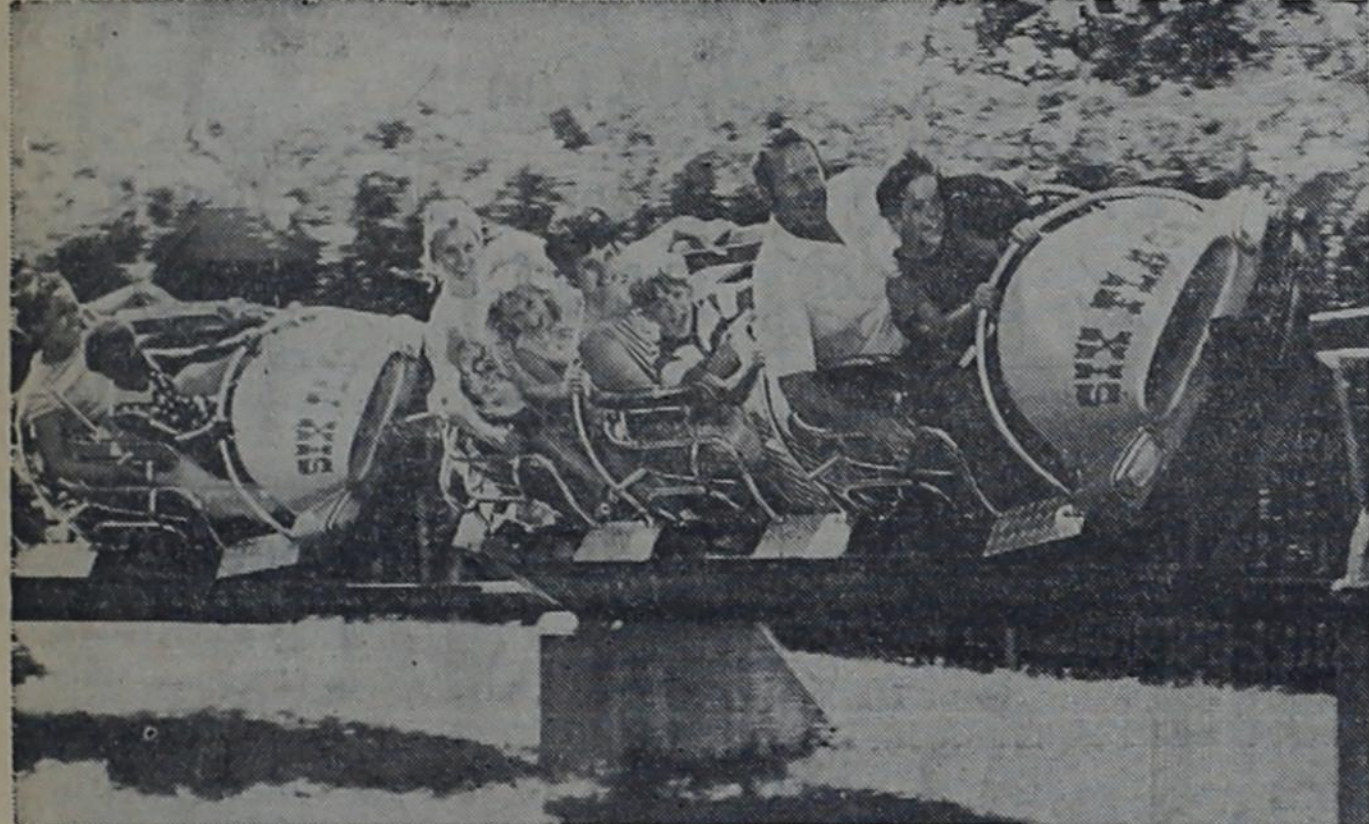

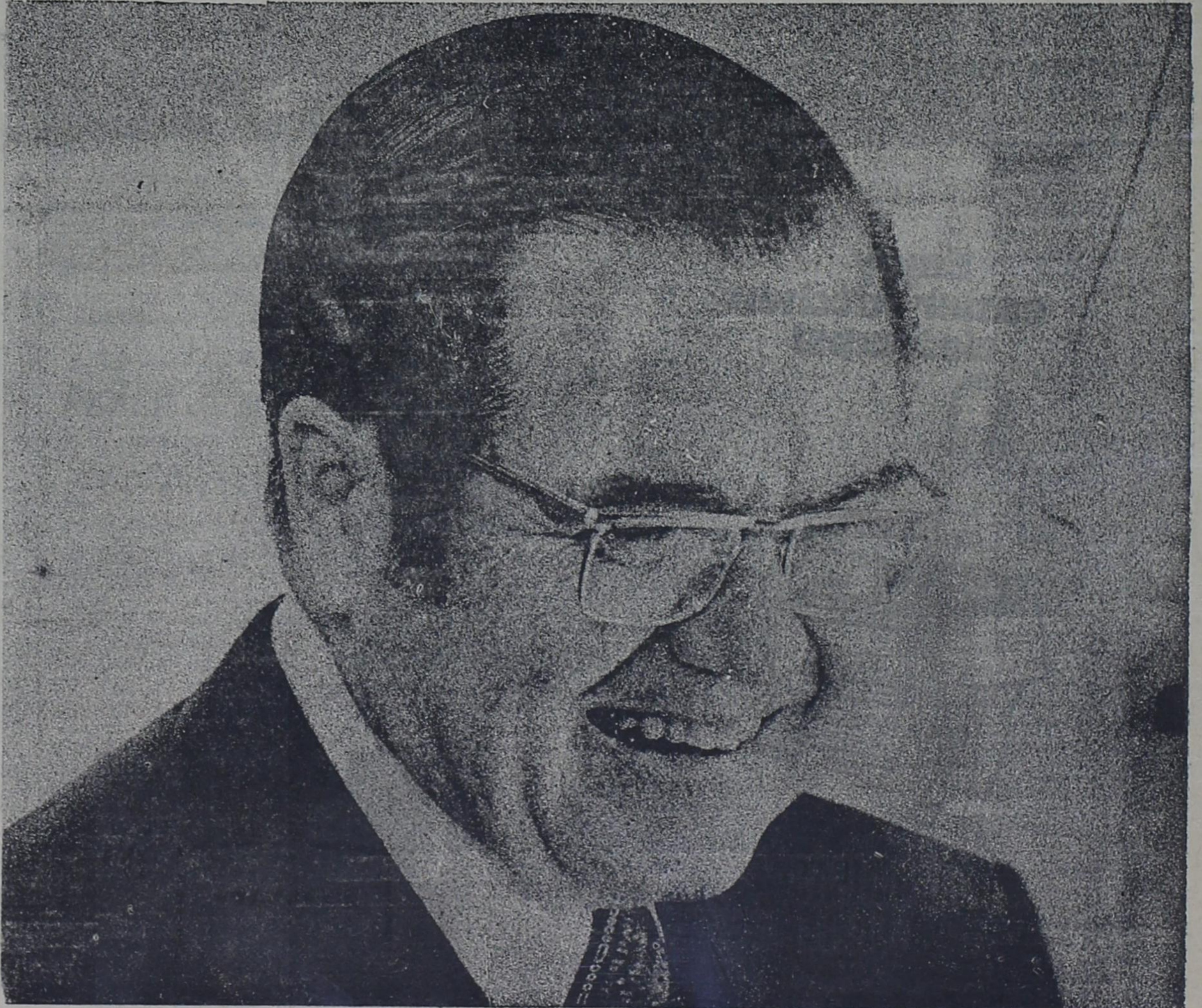
The antique Carousel, once primarily white, has been embellished with glowing hues of red, orange and yellow.
