In the General Election on Tuesday, only 271 votes were cast.

Omar Burleson received 243 votes for U. S. Congress. Gov. Dolph Briscoe received 217 votes and his Republican opponent, Jim Granberry, 46; S. W. (Sam) McDonnell, American Party, 3 in the race for Governor.

Bill Hobby polled 218 votes for Lt. Governor and Gaylord Marshall received 42.

John Hill received 225 votes for Attorney General with Tom Cole polling 37 votes.

Bob Bullock received 221 votes for Comptroller of Public Accounts and Nick Rowe polled 41.

State Treasurer Jesse James polled 220 votes and the Republican, Robert G. Holt, received 45.

Bob Armstrong, 228 votes for Commissioner of General Land Office, Mary Lou Grier, 35; William Rayson, 2.

Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White was re-elected by a margin of 234 to 33 over Zack Fisher.

Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon was re-elected by a 224 to 36 margin over Joe R. Cain, Republican.

Mack Wallace polled 224 votes for Railroad Commissioner (unexpired term) to win over Dale W. Seffes with 35.

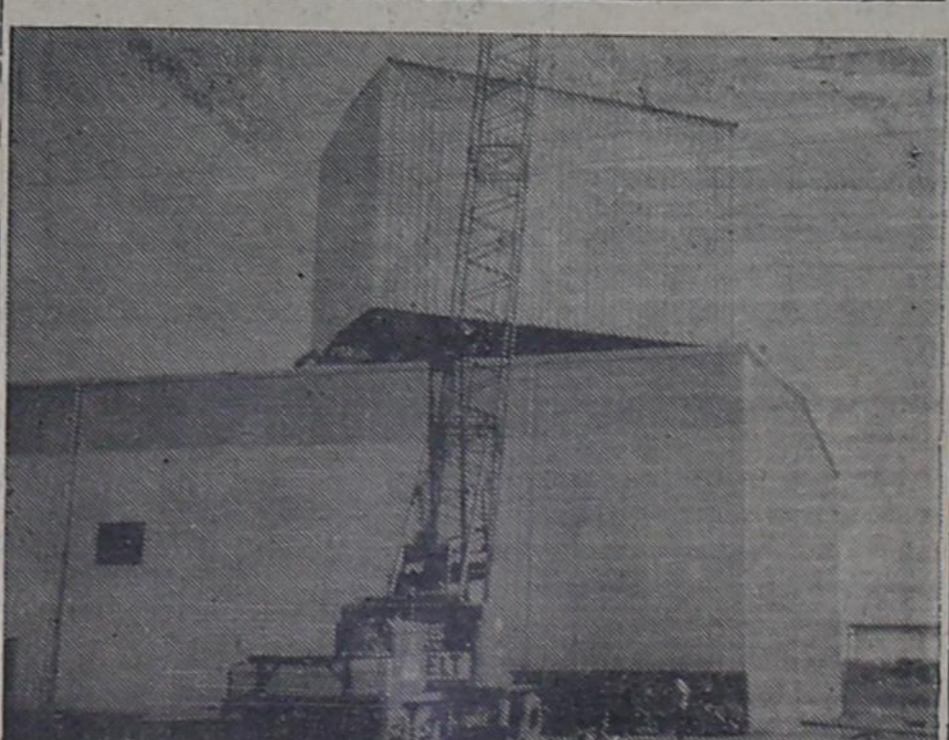

The building lifted will house equipment for grading shelled peanuts into various sizes. Gorman Peanut Co. expects to begin shelling peanuts soon and is presently drying, cleaning, buying, and storing all segregations of Spanish and Florunner farmer stock peanuts at Comyn.

New Oil Discovery



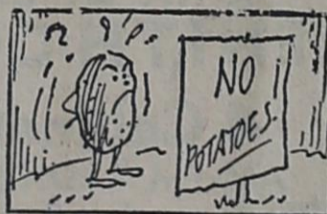
Gulf Oil Company-U.S. announced that a significant oil discovery has been made by this Mariner II semisubmersible rig in the Gulf of Mexico, 110 miles southeast of New Orleans. The discovery well is the first wildcat to be drilled on acreage leased by the Federal Government in December, 1973. Gulf (50%) and its partners-Texaco and Tenneco (25%)—paid \$61 million for the lease on the 5,544-acre tract. The company said multiple oil bearing sands were logged and cored to a depth of 8,391 feet on the well which has been projected for 10,000 feet. Although development drilling on the tract will continue in 1975, Gulf said oil from the new discovery probably will not begin flowing to U.S. consumers before 1976, due to the long lead times necessary to build and install production facilities. The Mariner II rig is owned and operated by Sazie Fe Drilling Company.

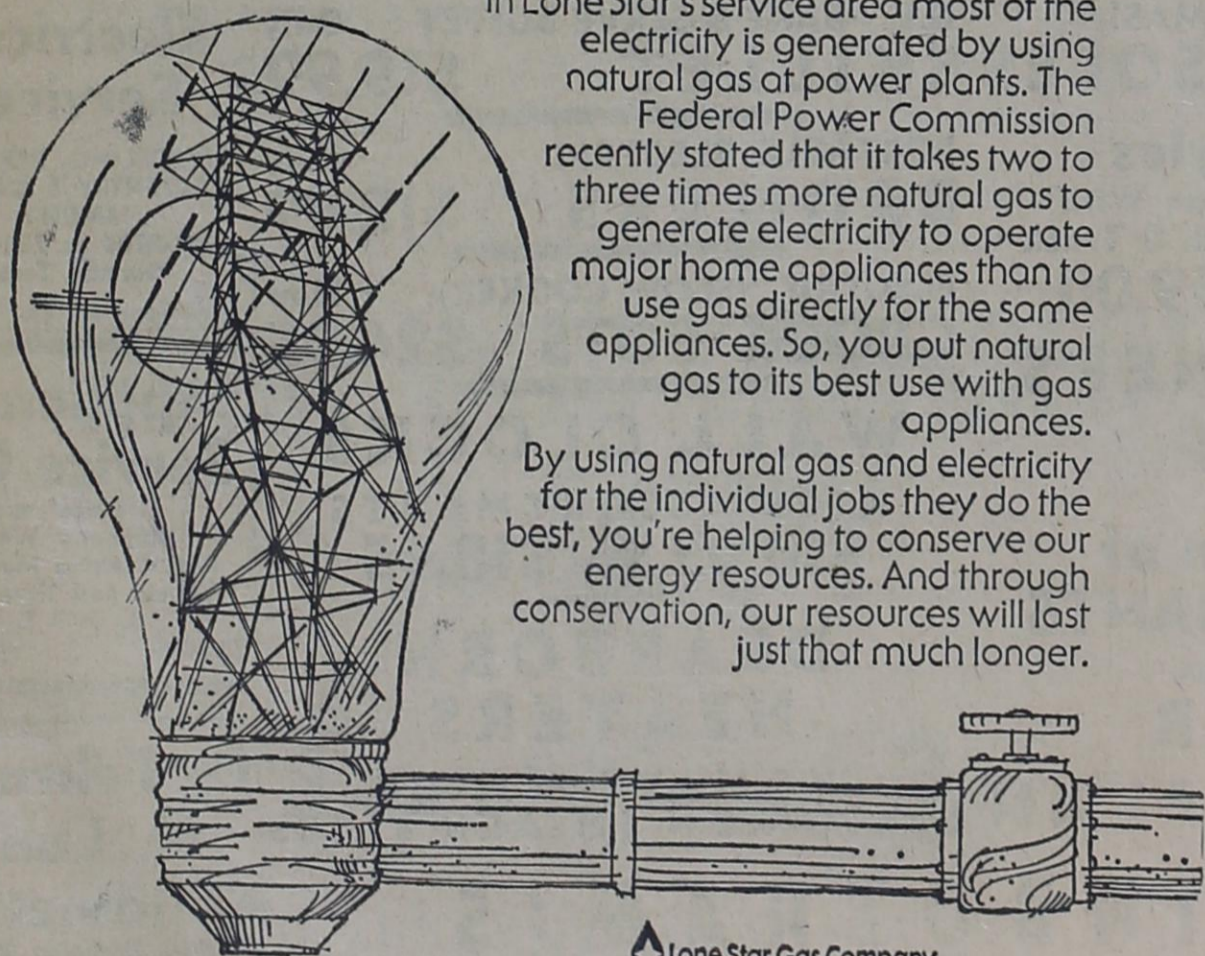
