Resist the temptation to set your thermostat lower than you need to.

Air conditioning engineers recommend that thermostats be set at 76 to 78 degrees for comfort and economy. Every degree below this requires units to work harder and use more electricity.

However, if you plan to be away all day, you can economize by raising the setting five degrees. Turn off the unit when you go on vacation, unless there are items that might be damaged by the heat. If so, leave the unit on, but raise the setting at least five degrees.

Here are some other things you can do to keep your costs as

low as possible: Enjoy cleaner air and lower costs by keeping the filters clean. A dirty filter causes the unit to work harder. Check them at least once a month. If it's a permanent-type filter, clean it according to the manufacturer's directions. Disposable filters should be replaced at
