Thoughts At Christmas Time

This season of television has presented, night after night, delightful stories of how the Grinch stole Christmas, and why The Bear Slept Through Christmas. Perry Como and Andy Williams have sung their way into our dens and living rooms . . . singing of stars, bells and mistletoe. These shows have given the children wonderful memories of this Christmas season.

And who can forget the words written for this season: **THE NIGHT BEFORE CHRISTMAS, THE STORY OF FROSTY THE SNOWMAN, LITTLE DRUMMER BOY.** What visions and dreams these timeless stories have given all who have read them. And, of course, Luke has given the world the most beautiful of all Christmas stories; the birth of Jesus Christ. In fact, Luke's is the first of all Christmas stories, and without it, other's may not have been written.

But in this short column, I would like to give you the words of Halford Luccock, a great Methodist preacher in

the 1920's and 1930's, hoping that his thoughts will enrich your Christmas season and your understanding of Christ, our Lord. It is entitled "The Baby Grew Up."

The Christmas story is the story of a baby. That is a part of its inexhaustible pull on the mind and heart of humanity. But it is also a liability. For a great many people become so entranced with the beautiful story of a baby in a manger that they miss the chief point of the story, and hence do not feel the compulsion which it lays on life. We can become so charmed with the story of a baby that we grow sentimental about it; it does not ask that we do anything about it; it does not demand any vital change in our way of thinking and living.

But the chief point of the story is that **THE BABY GREW UP!** He grew up to become the sternest challenge to a word of hard power that had ever been made. He was no sentimentalist; he was a terrible realist! Everything opposed to love and brother-

hood in our world, he declared flatly, is doomed and damned—for the reason that at the center of the universe is a God of loving purpose to all men.

The great question for us is this: Is our Christmas still only a story about a baby, or is it more, a deathless story about a Man, the Son of Man, into whom the baby grew, who can redeem the world from its sins, and who calls us into partnership with his great and mighty purposes?

I need not add anything. We have been asked the question. How will we answer it?

All of us at First United Methodist Church wish all of you a very Merry Christmas and a Christ-filled New Year.

Q. Know why we kiss under the mistletoe...who was the first to use holly in December...from which country the poinsettia came...how the cherry tree figures in Yuletide?

A. Kissing under the mistletoe is said to have begun by the ancient Romans, who viewed the plants as a symbol of peace. Enemies, meeting under the mistletoe, were supposed to embrace and declare a truce. The Romans were also first to use holly, at their December Saturnalia festival. The poinsettia comes from Mexico. Joel Poinsett, first American minister to Mexico, brought it here in 1836. The traditional cherry tree, according to the well-known "Cherry Tree Carol," bent its bough so that the Virgin Mary could place its fruit.

Q. When did settlers bring Santa Claus to the New World, and which three men created today's popular image of Santa Claus?

A. The Dutch brought Saint Nicholas (Sinter Klaas, for short) to the New World; later his name became Americanized to Santa Claus. Author Washington Irving first described Santa as riding through the skies in a reindeer-drawn sleigh. Clement C. Moore described Santa as fat and jolly, with a snowy beard, in his famous poem, "A Visit From St. Nicholas." Cartoonist Thomas Nast drew him that way.

Q. Who fixed the date of Christmas on December 25th? In what century was Christmas first declared a legal holiday?

A. Pope Julius, about the year 349 A.D., decreed that Christmas should be celebrated on December 25th. In the 6th century—the year 543, to be exact—Christmas was made a legal holiday in Rome.

Keeping The FAITH



"Each day comes to me with both hands full of possibilities...I discern all the verities and realities of my existence, the bliss of growth, the glory of action, the spirit of beauty." Helen Keller

Occurring in her book *My Religion*, this eloquent statement is an accurate description of how a dynamic woman saw love, color, and light while being physically imprisoned in a world of silent darkness.

Overcoming severe handicaps which would drive most of us into despair, Miss Keller chose to live and to devote her life to the service of others. But how and where did she find this constant strength and courage? What inner resources of faith helped her to transcend physical limitations?

It was the philosophy of 18th century scientist, philosopher, and theologian Emanuel Swedenborg which brought light to her darkness.

"[Swedenborg] shows us that in every event and every limitation we have a choice, and that to choose it is to create. We can decide to let our trials crush us, or we can convert them to new forces of good. We can drift along...or we can throw ourselves upon the guidance of the soul within..."

With poetic beauty and with deep understanding, Helen Keller describes in *My Religion* the spiritual odyssey that brought her to a faith unhampered by narrow sectarianism. *My Religion* is a powerful and inspiring legacy from one of the century's greatest personalities.

Suddenly, the angel was joined by a vast host of others—the armies of heaven—praising God:

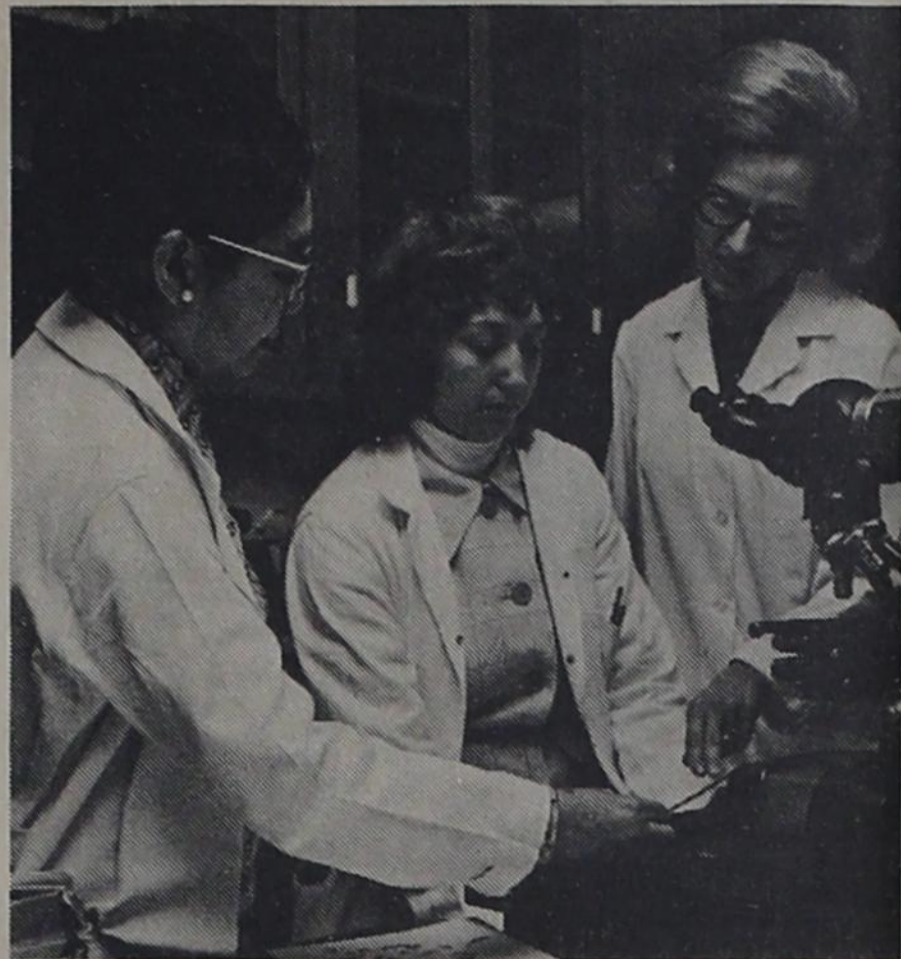
"Glory to God in the highest heaven," they sang, "and peace on earth for all those pleasing him."

Genetics Graduate Program Gets Help Through \$50,000 MOD Grant

It began five years ago with a dream. Today, because of that dream, the likelihood of a couple finding out whether their future children will be born defective has been improved.

Since 1969, when Sarah Lawrence College of Bronxville, N.Y., became the first college in the country to offer a graduate program in human genetics, more than three dozen women have been awarded master's degrees as associates in genetic counseling. Graduates are qualified to work with doctors and other health professionals in helping prospective parents understand how birth defects occur and the odds of their having a defective baby.

This fall, thanks to a \$50,000 grant from The National Foundation-March of Dimes, seven of the 20 incoming students in the program will receive one- or two-year scholarships. Another part of the money will help pay professors' salaries and buy books for the school's genetics library.

The program was the "dream" of Dr. Melissa L. Richter, dean of graduate studies. Recognizing the growing demand for genetic counseling services and the large population of college women living in the New York City area, she proposed that the two be brought together through a genetic training program.

Younger Students

It began in the fall of 1969 with 10 students. Since then, two other colleges—the University of California at Berkeley and Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N.J.—have also started their own programs.

Inevitably, most of the original students were local women whose families tie them to the area. The March of Dimes scholarships are designed to attract younger and more mobile students from around the country. Forty per cent of this year's incoming class are young, single, free to move about the country, and interested in patient care rather than research.

The program consists of

30-credit hours of classroom courses and 10-credit hours of field work, spread over one to two years. Classroom courses include human and cell genetics, human physiology, and abnormal human biology, techniques of counseling, and sociological aspects of health care.

New Specialty

Field work consists of clinic training at any of seven participating medical institutions in the New York City area, plus supervised research under established investigators.

Genetic counseling is a relatively new medical specialty, developed within the last 20 years. Most couples who seek counseling are already parents of a child with birth defects, or are concerned that a relative's problem may be hereditary and want to find out the chance of recurrence. Others may be members of families or ethnic groups in which a particular disorder occurs more frequently than in the general population.

Although most genetic counselors today are physicians specializing in medical genetics, graduates of programs such as Sarah Lawrence's will find plenty to do. As assistant counselors, they

will work as part of a team with doctors and other health professionals, interviewing patients, checking medical histories, constructing family pedigrees, or performing analyses. Sarah Lawrence graduates are also trained to provide psychological support to families with a genetic problem.

Recipe for using electricity more efficiently for cooking.

When cooking foods in liquid — whether in an electric skillet, crock pot, Dutch oven or on your range — use the lowest heat setting that will maintain a boil.

Don't open the oven door unnecessarily. Opening the oven door when the oven is hot can cause heat loss and extended cooking time.

For toasting bread, use a toaster or portable toaster-oven instead of your range oven. The smaller appliances are more efficient for this job.

Reduce cooking time by thawing meats before cooking them. When recipes call for a preheated oven, don't turn it on too far in advance — usually 10 to 15 minutes will do.

Use flat-bottomed pans. The flatter the pan, the better the contact with the electric unit. Be sure the pans have tight-fitting lids to reduce cooking time and moisture loss. Match pan size to unit size to avoid heat loss.

Plan one-dish meals that can be cooked in a portable electric appliance such as a skillet, deep fat fryer, Dutch oven or crock pot.

Munch For Brunch Or Lunch



You don't have to be an egghead to know that a beefed up brunch or hot lunch is nothing to beef about, particularly if it's easy, quick and economical to prepare, yet able to please all the palates in your household. This delicious dish can settle the hash of the hungriest.

HEARTY ROAST BEEF HASH

- 6 eggs
- 6 teaspoons cream
- 3-11 1/2 ounce packages of Stouffer's Frozen Roast Beef Hash

He's easy to make with common things you probably already have around the house. Top a plastic egg with a pompon from some gift

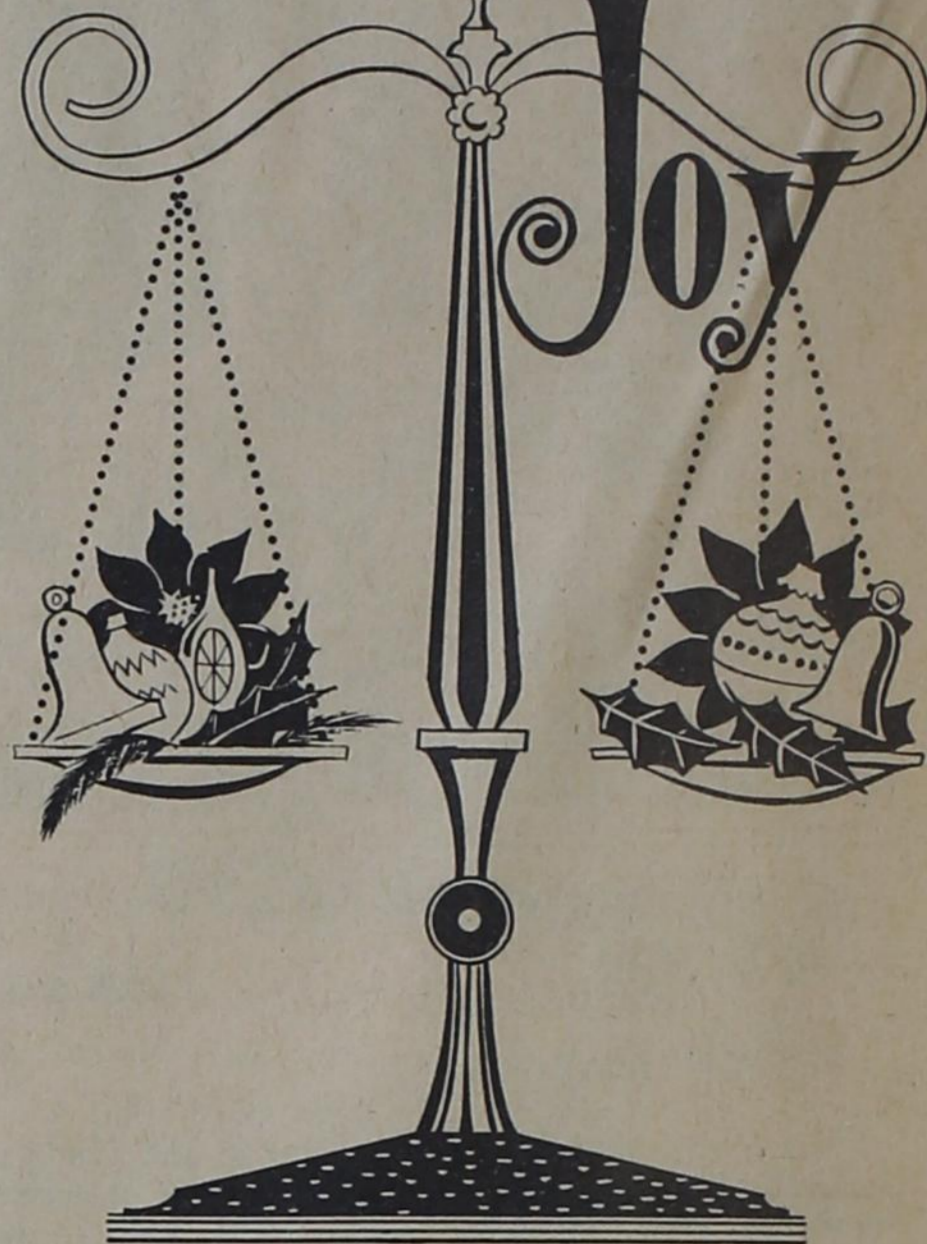
