First Cornstalk **Borer Caught** In This Area

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Agriculture's light trapping program for the lesser cornstalk borer, Texas' most serious peanut! insect pest, has captured the first moth for the 1973 season in the central Texas area.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White announced that the first moths were caught by one of the De Leon Research Laboratory's light trap on May 8. Last year's first catch was confirmed on March 13.

Commissioner White urged farmers to be on the lookout for moths and larvae in fields as soon as their peanuts and other crops are planted.
