Panthers Blank Santo 28-0; **Host Evant For Homecoming**

The Gorman Panthers remained unbeaten in District 14A with an overwhelming victory over the Santo Wildcats on Friday night by the score of 28-0.

On their second possession of the first quarter the Panthers got the ball on their own 40 and went the distance in just 5 plays with Margarito Sanchez getting the honors from one yard out with 3:07 left in the period. The drive featured runs of 14 and 7 by Sanchez and a beautiful run of 37 by Cisco Madera to set the Panthers up with a first and goal at the Wildcat 1. Richard Svarosky kicked the point after and the Big Red were out front 7-0. The second quarter was played on fairly even terms with neither team managing a scoring drive. The ball exchanged hands several times via the fumble route. On the second half kickoff the ball was returned to the Gorman 43 on a fine return. From there the Panthers scored in 7 plays with Dathan Wright racing in from 25 yards out for the score with 8:12 left in the third. The drive featured runs of 8, 7 and 3 by Blake Guthery, a 3 yard keeper by Cody Foster, a 7 yarder by Wright and a 4 yarder by Sanchez. Svarosky booted the point after and Gorman was up 14-0.

Then after holding the Wildcats on downs at the Santo 38 the Panthers put on a drive for another score, going 62 yards in just 2 big plays with Dathan Wright grabbing a Foster pass and raced 37 yards for the score with 10:09 left in the fourth. Svarosky kicked the point after and Gorman had a 21-0 edge. After holding the Wildcats on

their next possession the Panthers got the ball on their own 8 when Wright intercepted a pass. From there the Big Red scored in 7 plays with 3:50 left when Cody Foster rolled out to his left on a option for 5 yards before pitching out to Madera on a play covering 34 yards. The drive featured a 10 yard run by Foster, runs of 4 and 13 by Sanchez, and runs of 19 and 3 by Blake Guthery. They also overcame a 10 yard holding penalty. Svarosky added the point after kick and the final score was 28-0.

Sanchez led the Panthers on the ground with 122 yards on 18 tries, Guthery had 84 on 12 carries, Madera got 71 on 4 trips, Wright had 40 on just 3 carries and Foster was 24 on 5 keepers. Wright had an outstanding game, both on defense and offense.

The Big Red Defense really got with the Wildcats in the second half after giving up 100 yards in the first half but only allowed 16 more yards in the final 2 quarters to stop the Cats. Gorman will need another stellar performance, both offensive and defensive when the host the always tough Evant Elks in the Homecoming Game on Friday night in an important District 14-A race. Go Get 'Em Big Red!







day time. Susie authored an investment policy which was approved by the Commissioner's Court which generated greater interest earnings. The Code of Criminal Procedure, Article 4.17 (transfer of certain misdemeanors) states: "...on a not guilty plea before a non attorney county judge, the judge may transfer the case to a district court having jurisdiction in the county ... " The use of may indicates that the transfer of the case is at the discretion of the county judge. If the county judge does not transfer the case, he can try to case. The Court of Appeals has also ruled that the trial of a criminal case before a non-attorney county judge does not violate due process. Judges of the constitutional county courts must be "well informed in the law of the state," but are not required to be lawyers. Intensive training provided by the Texas Department of Public Safety academy; required hours of continued training over the last 29 years; a bachelors degree in law enforcement; and over 20 years experience as a Texas Ranger, has Gene "well informed in the law of the state." He has investigated crimes and prepared cases for prosecution. This preparation included insuring at all elements of the crime, as set out in the penal code, were met; all physical evidence was obtained, collected and maintained so as to be admissible in court; and all interviews and interrogations were conducted in a manner that did not violate the rights of the defendant, but provided justice for the victim. Gene Kea has first hand knowledge and understanding in the law of the state. As a non-attorney county judge, I can and will devote 100% to the business of Eastland County. During this campaign I have made several visits to each community in the county to meet as many of you as I could. If I missed meeting you, let me take this means and opportunity to ask you to vote for the experience and dedication that I will bring to the office of County Judge of Eastland County.

The Methodist Food Bank of Gorman.




Quietly tucked away among the Cottonwoods on the corner of Roberts and Potter in west Gorman, is the United Methodist church. Quiet except on Fridays, because that's when the back door starts to see lots of action in preparation for the Friday afternoon operation of the Food Bank.

The Food Bank is open every Friday from 3 to 5pm. In the month of September, it helped 154 Gorman

families for a total of 292 people (or roughly 20% of Gorman's population).

Most of the church members are retired from the work force, but not from community service. Over the past years, they have tried several projects to help others, but when the Food Bank got started, it almost took on a life of its own. Like most good ideas backed with hard work, it kinda developed and enveloped itself.



It started with Brother Bob investigating the story of the "lost Senior Center bus" and the failed "commodities" program, to see if it could be returned/restarted. After many dead ends, he eventually came in contact with Emmett Payne of Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. in Coleman, Texas. In March of 1998, Emmett, CTO admin. asst. Barbara Metcalf, and the Executive director of the Food Bank in Abilene, Inc., Nancy Gibson, met with Brother Bob, at the parsonage in Gorman and made some far reaching decisions. The Methodist Church applied to be a local Food Bank, working in connection with the Food Bank of Abilene, Inc.

With the problem of supply solved, distribution was the next hurdle. In talking with recipients of the old "commodities" program, Brother Bob learned of several previous policies that either didn't fit Gorman's community or were wasteful or unfair. The present method started with the old method and evolved through trial and error. It is basically simple. Distribution was set up like a regular grocery store, where people could choose what and how much they wanted or needed (or could use, so they didn't get too much to use before it spoiled) until their money ran out. The only difference being, the Methodist Church supplied the money.

Actually it is play money, (called "SAWBUCKS" because of the picture of a carpenter's saw and antlered deer on one side) that is distributed according to the size of the family. Different foods are priced differently, according to availability. A two person family unit would get ten sawbucks. That would be enough to select the following (from the variety on the four tables of food): vegetable oil, peanut butter, tuna, soup, corn flakes, rice or beans, pineapple, raisins or prunes, bread or tortillas canned corn, green beans or refried beans and tomato sauce, or a similar variety. A family can come to the Food Bank twice a month, but not two weeks in a row. This program is not intended to completely supply all the food necessary for a family to live on. Rather, to supply as much as possible from the surplus food supply available. That way, the family's limited amount of money could be used on luxuries, like electricity, water, rent, and school clothes. To handle the problem of storage, the food is picked up in Abilene on Friday morning, set out on tables in
