DRIVING FOR ECONOMY

Like almost everything else, gasoline and petroleum products are more expensive today than they used to be. Real savings can be achieved by knowing a few basic things about how to drive and maintain your car for maximum economy and efficiency.

For example, fuel economy possibilities start the minute the engine is started. Don't let




the car idle until it warms up; instead gently drive away after it has run no more than a minute. Idling takes minutes of gas-wasting. If the engine burns gas for 10 minutes every winter morning that's roughly 50 minutes per week and, depending on car and idle speed, the gasoline wasted this way could fuel a trip of up to 400 miles. Another tip from Gulf Consumer Information concerns reducing the weight of the car. Fuel economy amounts to about .2 miles per gallon for every 100 lbs. of weight loss. In other words, a bag of traction sand or assorted other odds and ends could total anywhere from 200-500 lbs. If this weight were removed, mileage would be increased by about one mile per gallon. It may sound insignificant, but in the course of a year - based on 1,100 gallons used per household — that could provide enough additional gasoline for a trip from New York to
