



Dr. Earl Puls, Extension Horticulturist, tells us that number-one early peaches are now selling for \$10.00 to \$20.00 per half-bushel. And, in many areas, despite heavy hail dam age, culls are selling at what were formally No. 1 prices.

Many peach growers who thought theri peaches escaped the freeze are now seeing delayed shedding. Much of their shedding can be attributed to the earlier freeze in April. You may find that despite


