Received the following letter this week from a new subscriber in Modesto, Calif. Dear Sirs:

First, I'm very sorry to learn of the "big fire" for Gorman at least! One of the concrete block buildings was built by my father, Dr. Allen Lightfoot, in 1909. We lived in Kokomo at the time. I was 5 years old then. The first fire I remember ever seeing was when the cotton gin at Kokomo burned. I am one of the few people on earth I suppose that lived in every town (or village) around Gorman - - Rucker, Kokomo, Carbon, Duster and then Gorman! We lived in Gorman during the oil boom days (1919 through 1920). Gorman had four movie theatres and the 4-story brick hotel was built. The Texas Central built a new depot about that time. My father also had a wooden store building built just north of the depot on Main Street. A Mr. Comer ran a grocery store for many years there. He had a daughter, Ruth, that taught school here.

Mr. Cole Nunally, Mr. Ed Layton, Miss Kate Love and Mrs. Gray were teachers there when I finished the 7th grade. I wonder how many still there remember them? Some of my classmates were Charlie Underwood, Herman Foster, Rudolph Haile, Whately Hamrick, Arnold Kirk, "Bubba" Fuller, Lottie Mae Morrow, Myrna Mason, Faye Jobe, Pryor Smith, James Hudson, Prentiss and Guy Craig, Jess L. Hankins and "Pacer" Whitney.

My grandma was Josephine Ellison, a sister of Jim Ellison. Their father owned the ranch and spring known as Ellison Springs. She married a man named William Keith whose father was Capt. John Keith of the Texas Rangers.

The Keiths lived near Round Grove where my father was born. The area was infested with Indians then. So one of the oldtimers wrote. Some of them moved to Downing, Comanche, then on to Dallas. I was born at Downing. The Lightfoot family moved from Arkansas to a ranch west of Downing and between De Leon and Comanche. They had 12 children, six daughters and six sons. Mr. Dallas Jobe of Gorman is the son of one of these daughters.

I visited in Gorman for a few hours in 1973. I was surprised to see how the population of Gorman had decreased!

FARMERS UNION MEET SET HERE FOR SEPT. 11

Texas Farmers Union District IV Director Jerry Warren, of Gorman, has announced that a district meeting will be held in Gorman at Fountain Blu Restaurant, Hwy. 6 west, on Wednesday, September 11 at noon. A dutch treat luncheon will precede the meeting.

The district farm organization leader said that the district meeting is being held to set the stage for the pre-state convention activities. According to Warren, county organizations will soon be adopting resolutions and electing delegates to attend the state convention in Houston during December.

"In view of the current farm situation and Farmer's Union efforts to secure a more stable economic situation for producers, I believe this district meeting will provide a rallying point to plan our fall program to benefit family farmers and ranchers in this region," stated Warren.

Warren went on to say, "It is very important that all farmers, Farmers Union members, and others come to our district meeting to see what Farmers Union is doing and to learn how a farm organization can make it possible for a farmer or rancher to represent himself better."

A team of Texas Farmers Union leaders and staff will attend the Gorman meeting. Included in this group are Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco, Texas Farmers Union Vice-President Joe Rankin of Ralls, Director of Organization Chester Jones of Waco and Staff Assistant Bob Mullins.

Others that will participate in the meeting in addition to District Director Jerry Warren will be District Vice-Director Joe Morgan of De Leon and District Sec'y, Mrs. Jerry Warren of Gorman.

Naman emphasized that it is important with a new administration in Washington that the efforts of the farm organizations be consolidated, so that a common front for agriculture can deal with the new administration.

The Gorman meeting is one of nine scheduled throughout the state during September. District IV is comprised of Coleman, Comanche, Eastland and Erath Counties.

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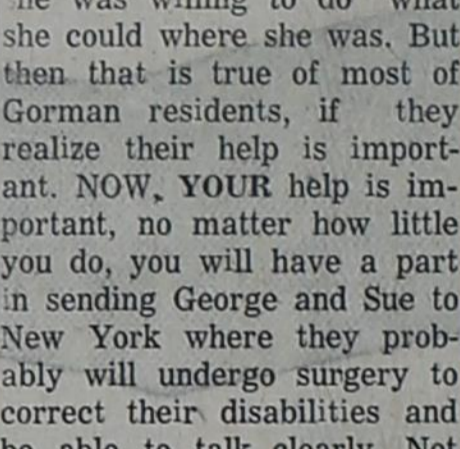

National Guard Reserve To Receive Back Pay for 1972

A back-pay windfall is in store for everyone who was in the active military, reserve forces, or the National Guard during late 1972.

The payments, totaling several hundred million dollars, are owed to the military according to a court decision.

The one-shot back pay due stems from a ruling by the U. S. Court of Appeals that former President Nixon illegally delayed the government pay raise scheduled by law for October, 1972.

The Second Supplemental Appropriations Act, signed on June 8, 1974 provided the military services with funding authority for retroactive payments to military personnel, including those who have since separated or retired.

The decision came in a lawsuit brought by the National Treasury Employees Union after Nixon delayed until January, 1973 the automatic raise required under the Federal Pay Comparability Acts. The active duty basic pay increase was 6.7 percent.

The Texas National Guard is now processing the payments for current and former Guardsmen. Persons who were in the Guard or Army Reserves or on active duty during that period and remain in that status today will receive the money automatically in the next few weeks.

Others who have moved from active duty to the Reserves or from one Reserve component to another must request the payment. Reservists who have separated or retired since October 1, 1972 are also eligible for the back pay.

Persons eligible for the back pay should write their last unit of assignment. The letter should include full name, Social Security Number, rank, current mailing address, date separated, and the duty station during October-December 1972.
