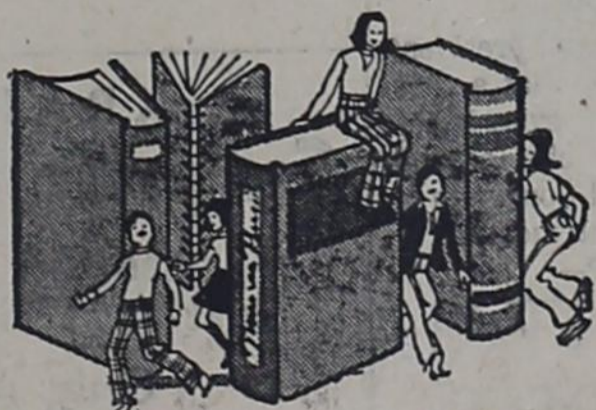

Oil News

An Eastland County wildcat re-entry has been completed as a Lake Sand discovery six miles south of Cisco.

It is James E. Russell Petroleum, Inc. of Abilene No. 1 Alma Dunning. The application to re-enter was originally filed by Joe Amason & J. J. Brian of Abilene.

Location is 375 feet from the north and 990 feet from the west lines of Section 81, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

Absolute, open flow was 3,800,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 3,164-76 feet. The pay was treated with 500 gallons of 15 percent acid. Operator set the 1 1/2 inch casing at 3,256 feet. The hole was cleaned out to 3,325 feet and plugged back to 1,220 feet.

The venture was plugged in 1956 at 3,715 feet as E. P. Thomas No. 1-A R. H. Dunning.

No. 2-A J. W. McFarlane will be drilled 2,300 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of Section 64, Block 11, T&P Survey.
