You are, of course, conversant with the situation. The Texas Central is subsidized by peanut processors in the area who purchase their peanuts from hundreds farmers whose only income is from peanuts.

From the officials of the Texas Central, joined by the growers and shellers of peanuts in the area, I learn that unless there is rail transportation, the economy of the area would be in a most serious circumstance. You, of course, will be well aware of the economics involved and I would not presume to relate details, but it seems that if the Texas Central could be granted a five day per diem relief from the Santa Fe, they could continue to provide the continue operation.
