COUNTY PEANUT PRINCESS TO BE CHOSEN HERE FRIDAY AT 8

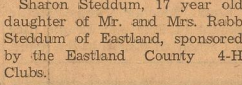

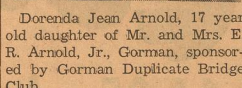

Status Report on Lesser Cornstalk Borer In Peanuts

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White today issued the latest progress report on the status of the lesser cornstalk borer in peanut fields in Central Texas. Commissioner White reported that after a survey of over a thousand acres of peanuts, only a few fields have been reported as having an infestation of the lesser cornstalk borer. He also stated that only a few moths were found in the field.

The De Leon Research Laboratory reports that moth catch in their light traps has dropped sharply. About 75 percent of peanut fields checked have shown a high degree of infestation of seedling disease. Rhizoctonia and diplodia are the two most common fungi present. Commissioner White noted that seed box treatment with seedling diseases and recommends a fungicide should help control that farmers check with their county agricultural agents for the guide that suggests fungicides.

Commissioner White strongly stressed that insecticides not be used until the infestation warranted such use. There are many reasons why this action should be taken.

Commissioner White ended the progress report by saying that, "Lesser cornstalk borer population seems to be low in peanut fields at present. However, past experience has shown that this insect can and does multiply rapidly. Farmers should continue to check their fields often for the presence of this serious peanut insect pest."

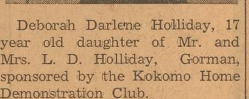

State P'nut Queen Pageant to be held On August 14-15

The second annual Texas State Peanut Queen Pageant will be held at Eastland, Texas August 14 and 15 in the Majestic Theatre. The contest is sponsored by the Texas Peanut Producers Board in conjunction with the Eastland Jaycees.

Rules and regulations and other relevant information have been mailed to various county agents and chambers of commerce in peanut producing counties. Any county desiring information regarding this event should write the Texas Peanut Producers Board, P. O. Box 398, Gorman, Texas 76454.

Texas' first Peanut Queen, Miss Marsha White from Katemcy in Mason County, was chosen from a field of eleven contestants in 1969 to promote this important Texas crop year-round.

To be eligible, the contestant must reside in a peanut producing county, must be single (never been married), not less than 17 or more than 21 years of age as of August 13, 1970, and must have the ability to communicate intelligently with poise and charm, personal appearance, beauty and grace.

Contestants will be judged on a two minute oral presentation on the Peanut Industry, appearance in swimsuit and evening dress, a talent number, and her ability to respond to questions related to the peanut in a brief, unrehearsed interview. She should be able to travel when requested and required to travel with appropriate chaperone approved by the TPPB. If attending school she must be maintaining average or better grades and if not in school, contestant must have been an average or above average student.

The winner will receive the honor of being Texas Peanut Queen, scholarship fund of \$500, and travel expenses as determined by the Texas Peanut Producers Board.

The invocation was given by Richard Watson and Lion O. L. Stamey of Cisco installed new officers.

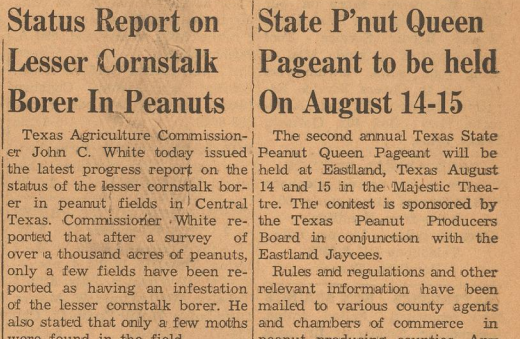
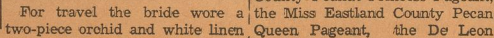
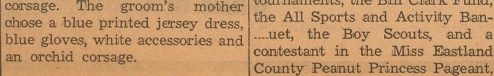
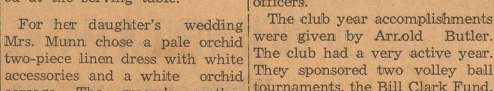
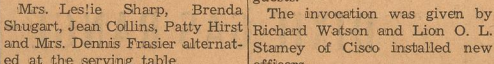
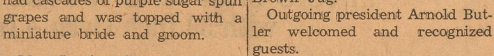
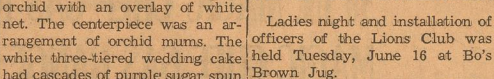
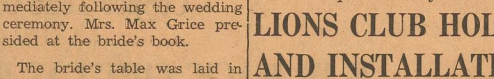
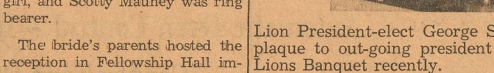

Peach and Melon Festival Princess. The club also bought and installed a new basketball scoreboard and projector for the school, and sponsored a local boy at the crippled childrens camp.

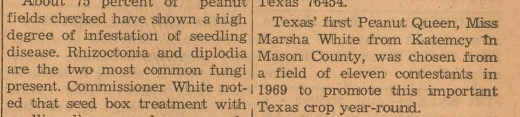

Arnold Butler presented pens to all the new members.

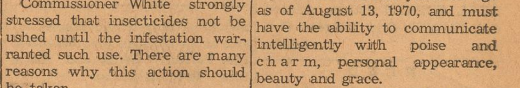

The Peanut Report

Peanut planting is in full swing. The majority will be planted within the next two weeks. Moisture situations are ample across the three county area.
Early planted peanuts are showing signs of damping-off caused by Rhizoctonia. The young peanut plants are weakened and sometimes killed as they emerge, causing uneven stands. Moderately cool, wet weather favors the development of this fungus. When plants develop quickly during warm, dry weather there is less damage from Rhizoctonia. Symptoms are visible on the root in the form of a brown decayed area. The surviving sprout is girdled and its growth will be disrupted.

Thrips are the only insect at present found to be on peanuts. The damage they cause is a crinkled deformed leaf. The plant does not get off to a good start. Tests show where this insect was controlled on early peanuts, but no increase in production was reported. Thrips will delay the peanut plant and make it look stunted. Late peanuts need all the growth they can get. Control measures should be taken when the plants are showing no growth and 60-70 percent of the leaves are damaged. This insect is classified as an early season insect.

No Lesser Cornstalk Borer larvae have been found damaging peanuts yet. Charles Rogers is still finding adults in his light trap. Therefore, we should begin looking soon after the plants emerge.

Leaf Minor are showing up on the bottom leaves. These insects can be identified by a tunneling in the leaf. Under heavy infestation, the lower leaves will shed. The adult fly will deposit their eggs in the leaf tissue. After hatching, the pupa will tunnel in the leaf leaving scarred areas. When mature, the adult will emerge from the leaf to begin another generation. Control measures are not economical.
Leaf Spot is beginning to show up on early planted peanuts. This is due to the cool, wet weather. The lower leaves will be the first ones affected. Control measures should begin, if this cool moist weather continues.

BROWNWOOD - The body of Roy Tom Byrd, 40, principal of a junior high school at Killeen, was recovered early Sunday from the waters of Lake Brownwood.

Byrd drowned Saturday in 15 feet of water when he fell from a pier at a motel.

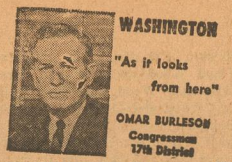

THE WOMAN TOOK A FINAL LOOK AT THE WHITE FIGURES on the spinning wheels and then in her purse. In a soft voice she said to the checker, "I have got to take something back." The little girl at her side looked up at the others, not realizing their bored and impatient attitude.

DOUBTLESS THE CHECKER HAD BEEN THROUGH THIS BEFORE and tried to be helpful and even cheery.

"HOW MUCH ARE YOU SHORT?" he asked the woman. "IT WAS THE CHECK," she said. "It wasn't as much this time."

WITH THE CHECKER'S HELP THEY LOOKED OVER her cart of groceries. There was a large bag of rice and about three pounds of cheap hamburger meat. There was a box of laundry powder and two loaves of yesterday's bread, which can be bought for 10c off the regular price.

THEN THERE WERE SOME FRESH VEGETABLES, some toilet tissue and a quart of skim milk. Included were potatoes, Wieners and a large box of cereal. There were several packs of soft drinks, some peanut butter and king sized cans of beans.

THE EYES OF THE TWO, THE CHECKER AND THE WOMAN, went over the items almost one by one.

BACK TO THE SHELVES WENT A JAR OF RED CHERRIES, two or three oranges, some vanilla ice cream and a jar of jelly.

BACK WENT ABOUT EVERYTHING THAT MAKES THINGS a little nicer — to improve on the plebeian.

THE WOMAN WAS STILL A DOLLAR SHORT, so back went

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

TO ALL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS

An old proverb says that a fool, among other things, may be known by his anger without cause, his speech without profit, his change without progress, and his inquiry without object. Today some of the theories being advanced for "watching" and "containing" law enforcement would suggest that, in addition to these quirks, fools may also be known for their lack of common sense and judgment.

Crime terrorizes communities throughout the country. In some areas, people are afraid to be on the streets, particularly at night. It would seem, therefore, that preventing crime and helping police to bring violators to justice would be a primary and reasonable concern of all citizens. Unfortunately, the light of reason blinds some people.

Groups have been established to gain "community control" over police departments. Some, receiving financial support from well-meaning but misled organizations, have set up "police watching" programs. Some spokesmen advocate that each city ghetto be given public funds and authorization to form its own racially segregated police force. Others say college youth should not be subjected to contacts by police officers, and that only specially trained, highly paid, unarmed, elite police forces should be used to handle civil demonstrations. If these ideas and techniques seem half-baked, it is because they are. But the intent of those who foster such schemes is clear: They want to negate the rule of law. To do this, they must first create public distrust of and ill will toward those who enforce the law.

Our system of government provides adequate and proper safeguards for remedial action against indiscretions of policemen. Certainly, we do not need to resort to sidewalk kangaroo courts made up of militants and malcontents who cannot even discipline themselves. Further, we should remember that frequently those who defy the law are prone to criticize and attack agencies charged with enforcing it.

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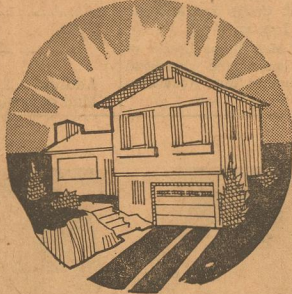
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
