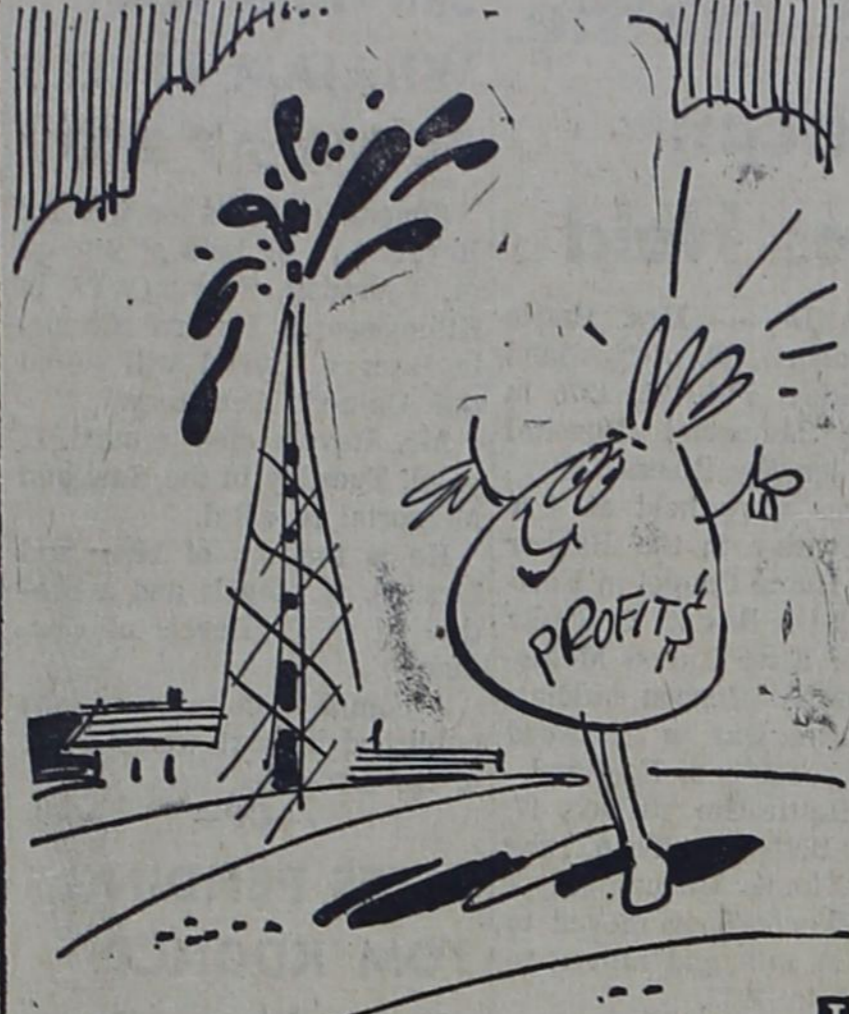

### IT'S THE CUSTOM

Many Americans travelling abroad are unnecessarily fearful about getting through customs. It's neither difficult nor dangerous if you follow these suggestions from the Holiday Inn travel writers:

1. Your purchases can be exempt from duty if you dutifully fill out the customs form, if they are for your personal or household use, if your trip was not made just to buy them and if you didn't order them in advance.
2. You're allowed to bring in duty free items worth \$100 including 100 cigars (not Havanas) and one quart of spirits. Certain art objects and antiques over 100 years old are exempt from this and may come in for free whatever their cost.
3. To avoid overloading your luggage while you travel, send gifts back marked "Gift — under \$10." You may send as many as you like, but at present, you can send no more than one a day per person.
4. If you have any questions about whether you can take a particular item home, consult the U.S. consul, or pursue the matter with the purser on your plane.



Hopefully, these hints will keep you from holding up those border lines and help you become accustomed to customs!

### PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)**  
Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)**

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

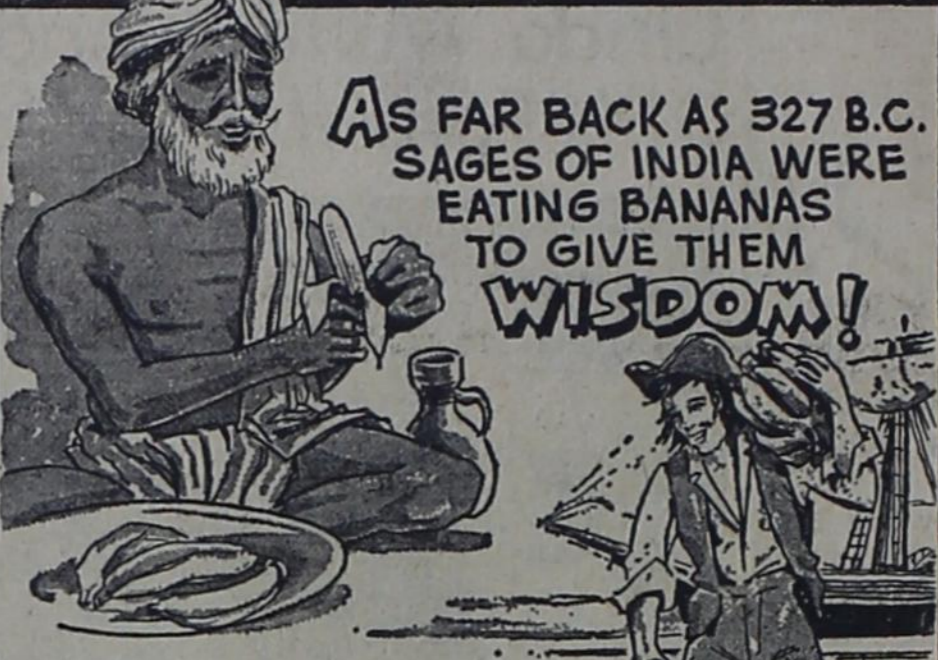
Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$.10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

### MAKING FAMILY LIFE MORE FUN

#### HOW TO BRING IT CLOSER TOGETHER

When your family gathers, does it simply come together — or actually draw closer together?

With patience, tact, and a little common-sense psychology, you can strengthen the bonds of family friendship without cramping anyone's style. Here are some good ways to increase family fun.

1. Start a family project. This could be planning next summer's vacation, turning the basement into a family room, even learning French on records; anything will do as long as the whole clan can share the fun and the work. Establish a family kitty to which everyone contributes a quarter a week (pennies or a nickel for the small fry); when the piggy bank is ready to burst its seams, take them all out to dinner and a show. The kids will get a kick out of seeing the money mount — and a valuable object lesson in thrift. A bigger project, but one which won't break the family budget, is a long weekend trip away from home that includes staying at a Holiday Inn. A change of scenery, shared by the whole family, with delicious food that Mom gets a holiday from preparing, can refresh everybody. And of course, kids under 12 sleep free in their parent's room unless extra bedding is required. Once you've finished a family project, start another one right away. Don't let the habit of pulling together fade away.

2. Give your home a magnet. In many homes, the TV set is the center of interest,

but too often it makes for only a passive gathering of the clan. A piano can be the decorative focus of a room, if someone can play it for the others to gather around for sing-along fun. Another good old favorite that's staged a spectacular comeback is the billiard table; put one in the basement and watch the family flock to it!

3. Choose a fitting family sport. Physical fitness experts tell us that American children lag far behind their European counterparts in muscle tone and development — with

their sedentary parents not in such good shape either! A pleasant prescription for fitness and fun is a weekly bowling night; most bowling lanes have special lightweight equipment for women and children. Family biking excursions are another happy idea — and bicycling as a health aid for all ages has been endorsed by medical experts. Fresh air fun can be gained from family camping trips.

4. Buy gifts that give family pleasure. Next time someone has a birthday, make sure he gets at least one present, small or large, that can invite family participa-

tion. A low-budget example is a board game for two to six players. If you want a higher-ticket item, buy a movie camera or still camera. If you'd like to give your family a lasting home entertainment center consider buying a stereo and records to suit every member of the family. Or you can put that long weekend at a Holiday Inn in this category.

5. Do the "big little things." Watch for opportunities to do little favors for other members of the family. Do them without fanfare. Sooner or later, they'll respond in kind. Relieve a child of chores on the night before a big exam; not only will he appreciate it, but his grades may show your thoughtfulness! A parent is in a position to order his kids to do something — but try asking their help before commanding it. You'll find it makes a big difference in family rapport. The lady of the house can make a practice of serving everybody's favorite food once a week without being coaxed. Or mother can be given a regular "vacation" day when the other members of the household can pitch in to relieve her of her regular chores. Once you start, you'll find an endless number of "big Little" things to do for loved ones.

Put these ideals to work, and you may well find yourself agreeing with the philosophers who say that happiness is a relative thing!

### NEWS OF Travel

#### TRANS-SIBERIAN ADVENTURE

As the experienced traveler knows, one of the best ways to see a country is to ride through it on a train. And that is especially true in the Soviet Union, where the smart vacationer can watch the spectacular beauty of the changing landscape from the solid comfort of one of many modern passenger trains.

You can get aboard practically anywhere in Europe. Soviet international railway routes, with a total length of about 70,000 miles, link Moscow with the capitals of nearly all European countries. If you travel Soviet Railways, you not only view the varying vista, you get a good rest, fabulous food and prompt arrival at your destination.

You can traverse Siberia by train from Moscow to the port of Nakhodka on the Sea of Japan. Soviet Siberia lies beyond the Urals and is a veritable gigantic nature preserve, with some 53,000 mighty rivers, more than a million lakes and seemingly endless forests thickly populated by fur game.

You can stop off at Novosibirsk, a large scientific and cultural center. It is also known for its Opera and Ballet Theatre, one of the largest in the country, which is often called "the Siberian Bolshoi Theatre"; the Regional Lore Museum with a host of exhibits about the history of Siberia; the Scientific and Technical Library, which has a fund of 5 million books and a splendid collection of rare manuscripts. You may also visit Irkutsk, a



big industrial and cultural center of East Siberia, only a half-hour's drive from legendary Lake Baikal, the world's deepest lake with marvelous sandy beaches for the summer tourist to enjoy, or Khabarovsk, a big industrial city in the Far East that serves as a transport junction to all parts of Russia and the coast of the Sea of Japan.

You may also enjoy a side trip to Bratsk, one of the newest cities in Siberia, which has been built up over the last few years in the heart of the Siberian taiga. Today it is a port city on the shore of the huge, man-made Bratsk Sea. The city's main attraction for tourists is the Bratsk Hydro-

power Station, one of the largest in the world. Its dam (126 m. high) extends for almost 5 km., curbing the course of the turbulent Angara River.

The shortest transit route from Europe to Asia lies through Siberia. But you needn't fear the ill-famed Siberian cold. Though winter there is rather severe, people easily tolerate it, and in winter the cities look like fairy tale towns with frosted trees sparkling in the sun.
