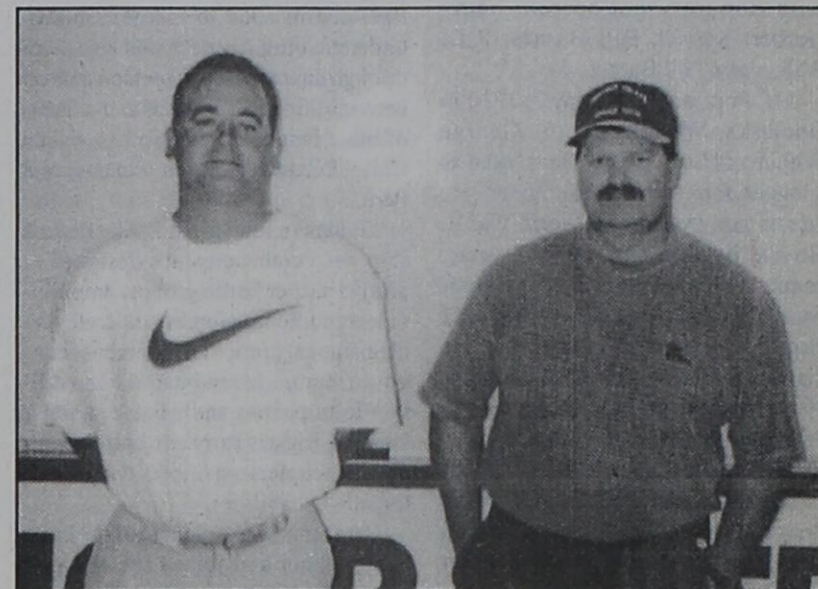

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Sharing with Bro. Bob

My brother, Brother Bob, has to be out of town for a few weeks. He asked me to share with you some of my memories of our summers spent in Iowa. I hope you enjoy them.

Some of my favorite memories come from the summer vacations my family spent in Iowa with my maternal grandparents, Ellis and Gertie Howard. Staying on their farm was always a special treat. To four "city" kids from Burkburnett, Texas, visiting Iowa was like a trip to another charming world. Sometimes our visits corresponded with hay-baling time. Grandpa did not usually hire anyone to bale the hay; relatives and neighbors chipped in and helped. We baled a neighbor's fields one day, then they came to the grandparents' farm the next day to help us. During this work, a certain kind of camaraderie prevailed.

Since we started at sun up, it should have been hard to get us kids out of bed. However, we eagerly jumped up in order to eat breakfast and not miss a ride to the fields. Grandpa cooked a "field hand's" breakfast that was ready when we came downstairs (I remember wondering what time she had to get up in order to prepare all this). Grandpa would have already been up for hours feeding animals and getting chores out of the way so the day could be devoted to the hay. When he came back for breakfast he would kid us by saying, "Are ya up for all day?" I guess he thought we were slugabeds. Anyway, we rode with him to the fields and felt like we worked as hard as field hands until about 11:00 a.m. when we went back to the farm house for a hearty lunch (called dinner).

For our lunch Grandma usually cooked fried chicken, mashed potatoes and gravy, corn on the cob, salad, and

fresh-baked yeast rolls (all from scratch). Real butter and homemade apple butter topped the savory rolls. Mouth-watering smells assailed me as I came through the door. She also always had homemade lemonade made with real lemons. It was delicious, sweet, cold, and wonderful with the lemons still in it. She served it in colored aluminum glasses that enhanced the coolness and taste of this delightful nectar. There was always ice cream and something else good (cake or pie) to go with it. She bought ice cream by the gallon, and there was always plenty to have seconds. Actually, when Grandma cooked anything, there was enough to have seconds and thirds. The neighbors seemed happy to help the Howards. They knew there would be great food and plenty of it. When we got in the house, the tables (yes plural--tables) were set, and everything was ready to eat. There seemed to be enough food for 100 people. To insure everyone had a seat, Grandma had set up many different kinds of tables with various table cloths. We kids felt important because we were fed like field hands-- even though maybe we hadn't been as helpful as we thought we were.

I remember being very proud the year I discovered I could actually lift a rectangle bale of hay and slide it across the wagon to be slung onto the pile. Finally, I considered myself a genuine field hand (well, mostly). I never thought of it as work; the fellowship and laughter and friendly teasing made everything fun. Even though I had never been told that I was too little to help, I still strived to do as much as my older brothers, Bob and Bill. Taught that we could do anything, there was always something (however small) we were trusted to take care of. At my grandparents', being allowed to help was a privilege and a pleasure. We were made to feel special and loved and valuable.
