All ministers, businessmen and women are automatically members of the bicentennial committee.

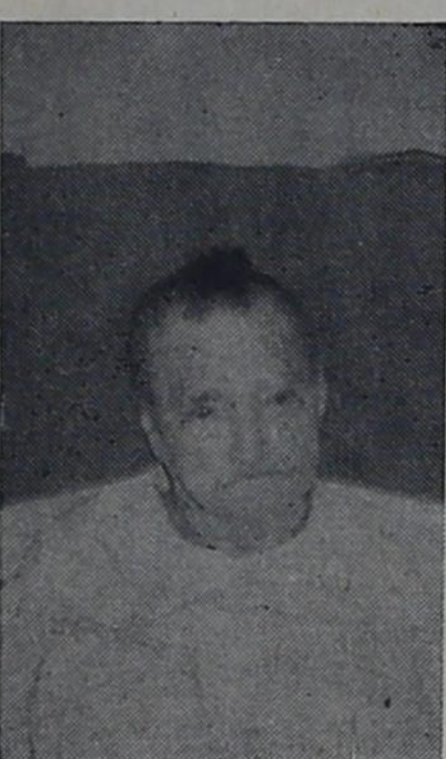
Kindergarten Students Will Register May 5th

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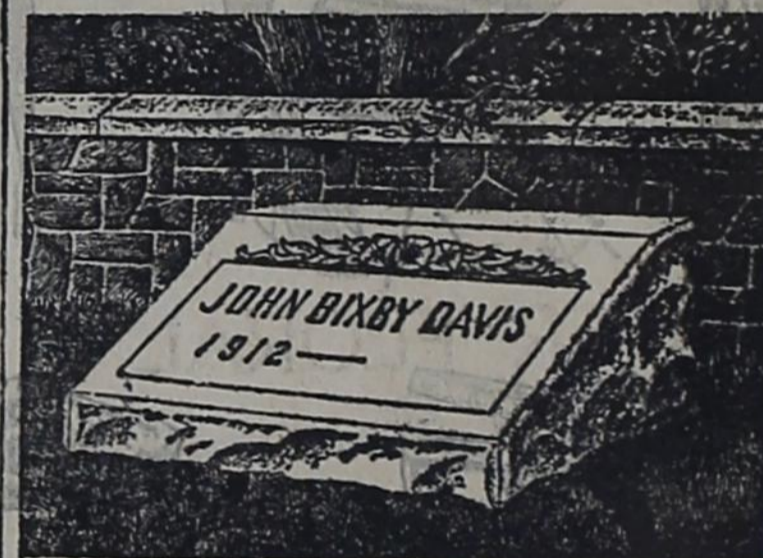
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NUTSEDGE RESEARCH TESTS RESULTS

Published by
Texas Peanut Producers Board
Gorman, Texas 76454

Most of the preemergence herbicides presently in use on peanuts are dinitroanilines which require soil incorporation. These herbicides, in general, give good control of the common weeds occurring in peanut fields. However, nutsedge and certain broadleaf weeds are not controlled by these herbicides and these weeds have become of major importance in some fields in the State where they were not controlled by other means.

Three locations were selected with adequate nutsedge populations for conducting trials. These locations were on (1) the Plant Disease Research Station at Yoakum in Lavaca County, (2) the Joe K. Williams Farm at McCoy in Atascosa County, and (3) the Tarleton Experiment Station at Stephenville in Erath County.

Results of previous nutsedge control tests had indicated that certain materials may have promise for control of this

problem weed in peanuts. The first criteria in the selection of materials was on the basis of their effectiveness in controlling nutsedge. The methods of application, time of application, rates, etc., were then determined from the past performance of the selected herbicide.

The standard herbicide treatment included in these tests was Vernam since it is the only presently cleared herbicide for peanuts which has activity against purple nutsedge. The selected herbicides included pre-land preparation treatments (PLP), preplant incorporated treatments (PPI) preemergence treatments (PreE), and postemergence treatments (PostE). The Nutsedge Control Test 1 a Yoakum was a complete randomized block design test with the individual treatments alone and in certain combinations. A split plot design was used for the other experiments.

Postemergence treatments of the new translocated herbicide glyphosae (Roundup)

were effective for controlling purple nutsedge in 1973 but peanuts were also killed if sprayed by these treatments. Because of the phytotoxicity of Roundup to peanuts, a post-emergence treatment to nutsedge before land preparation for the peanut crop was considered to be the best time of application for testing this material. Research results with Basagran had shown that postemergence applications could be made to nutsedge in peanuts with little or no phytotoxicity to peanuts. Destun was considered to be the most effective preemergence herbicide treatment for controlling nutsedge although some injury had occurred to peanuts. Certain other experimental herbicides were included to determine their effectiveness in controlling nutsedge and tolerance to peanuts.

All herbicide treatments were applied broadcast at 20 gallons spray per acre. The preland preparation treatments were applied as postemergence treatments to the nutsedge and after at least two weeks the plots were disced and rows marked off. The preplant incorporated treatments were all incorporated with a power tiller at time of application. The preplant injected treatment of Vernam in the Tarleton Experiment Station test was applied with a two-row Pearman disc injector for comparison with the preplant incorporated Vernam treatment.

The Starr variety of peanuts was planted in all nutsedge control tests except in Atascosa in which the Florunner variety was planted. Weed control and phytotoxicity data were collected from all tests. Yield, grades and value data were also obtained from all tests except the Tarleton Experiment Station test which was not planted until September 21 due to extreme drought conditions which persisted until rains occurred in September.

Excellent top kill was obtained

with the preland preparation postemergence treatments of glyphosae (Roundup), especially at the 2 and 4 lbs. per acre rates at Yoakum and at Stephenville. The 1 lb. per acre rate of Roundup gave approximately 75 percent control of the nutsedge plants two weeks after application, while the control for the 2 lb. and 4 lb. rates were rated at 85- and 95-percent, respectively. Within three to five days after application of the Roundup the nutsedge plants began to progressively turn yellow and then brown. This control continued after the peanuts were planted as indicated by the control ratings recorded, which were made on July 19 and August 19. The best nutsedge control ratings were obtained in this test with Destun 4S, Roundup @ 2 lbs. plus Vernam, Roundup @ 2 lbs plus Vernam plus Basagran and Roundup @ 2 lbs alone. Destun caused stunting of the peanuts which persisted throughout the season resulting in a significant reduction in the yield of pods per acre. Vernam at 2.5 lbs. per acre alone gave satisfactory control (78 percent) of nutsedge for approximately four weeks but this control had dropped to 30 percent in the August 19 ratings. S-21634 at 6 lbs. per acre gave satisfactory (86 percent) control in the July 19 rating.

The treatments giving the longest control of nutsedge as shown in the August 19 ratings with over 90 percent control were Roundup plus Vernam and the treatments containing Destun. Significant differences occurred between treatments in pounds of pods and value per acre but this was primarily due to reduced yields resulting from the Destun and MBR 12325 treatments.

At Yoakum Destun gave excellent control of nutsedge but it also caused stunting and reduced yields. Postemergence applications of Basagran at 1.5 lbs and S-21534 at 3 lbs were approximately equal in nut-

sedge control. The yield data were extremely variable due to very wet soil conditions before and at harvest time.

In Atascosa County poor nutsedge control ratings were obtained with the Roundup treatments in this test. The test area had been power tilled approximately two weeks before treatments were applied and only about 20 percent of the tubers had germinated to produce plants at time of application of the Roundup treatments.

Vernam at 4 lbs per acre PPI and postE applications of Basagran at 1 and 2 lbs per acre gave good to excellent control of nutsedge in this test. Vernam at 2 lbs and Destun at 3 lbs. per acre did not satisfactorily control nutsedge. Destun and Vernam at 4 lbs per acre significantly reduced yields of pods per acre. This is an excessive rate of Vernam and in this course sand was phytotoxic to peanuts. The Basagran treatments were applied later than had been planned but even with some nutsedge plants beginning to form seed heads, excellent control was obtained. The conditions were ideal at time of application for getting the

Basagran into the nutsedge plants, i. e. high relative humidity, excellent soil moisture with the plants actively growing.

At the Tarleton Experiment Station the Roundup treatments were applied 100 days before the land was prepared, preplant treatments applied, and peanuts planted, control of nutsedge averaged 76 and 66 percent for the 2 and 4 lbs per acre rates of Roundup, respectively. The control rating at time of discing the plots for land preparation was 75 percent for Roundup @ 2 lbs. and 90 percent for the 4 lb rate. Vernam PPI at 2.5 lbs per acre was significantly better than the same rate preplant injected. This difference obtained in control of nutsedge by Vernam with the two methods of application may be due to difficulty of application with the disc injectors in the check plot because of plant residue. This was not a problem in the Roundup treated plots, and in these plots the two Vernam treatments were equal. Silver-leaf nightshade plants were present in this test, and the Roundup treatments also gave excellent control of this difficult to control weed.

Physical conditioning, discipline and teamwork are emphasized during Marine recruit training. Classes include instruction in close order drill, Marine Corps history, first aid, uniform regulations and military customs and courtesies.

Results of these studies indicate that certain herbicides and mixtures of herbicides are promising for nutsedge control in peanuts. More research is needed to investigate rates, time of application, combination treatments as well as herbicide applications combined with land preparation and cultural practices before the peanut crop is planted.
