RECRUITING OFFICER TO INTERVIEW APPLICANTS IN GORMAN EVERY TUESDAY

A representative of the Army and Air Force Recruiting Service will be in Gorman at the Post Office each Tuesday hereafter from 10 A M until 12 noon to interview applicants for enlistment or reenlistment in the Army or Air Force. It was announced by S-Sgt. James Hendrick, NCO in charge of the Eastland Recruiting Office.

Special emphasis is now being placed on the recruitment of high school graduates for specific trade schools of their choice in the Army or Air Force. Spring graduates this year may file application for technical training now and remain in school until after graduation.

Officer procurement for both branches is also being pushed by the Recruiting Service and full information for appointment from civil life to Army and Air Force Officer Candidate Schools and to Aviation Cadet pilot training is available.
