**CHRONIC DISEASE
CLINIC**

Many persons in Texas, and the rest of the United States, have unknown chronic diseases that may someday become serious problems if not properly diagnosed and treated. An indication of the size of this problem in Texas can be seen in light of statistics released by Social Security officials, in which they estimated that forty-six percent (46percent) of Americans have one or more chronic conditions.

To provide for early detection of chronic diseases, the 65th Texas Legislature has appropriated funding for multiphasic screening projects designed to identify persons in whom a potential chronic health problem may exist. When a problem is indicated through screening procedures, the individual is referred to the physician of his choice for diagnosis and treatment. There will be no charges for any of the multiphasic screening tests. However, any diagnostic or treatment charges for services from the private physician will be the responsibility of the patient.

In support of the health system in Eastland County, The Texas Department of Health will conduct Multiphasic Screening Clinics on a regular ongoing basis. The screening for each person will be available on an annual basis, with approximately one-half hour required for counseling and screening on the first visit. Nurses will establish a permanent file, which can

Peanut Transfer Discussed

Across the county line transfer of peanut allotments are still not permitted is the latest word according to David Martin, County Executive Director, Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Within county transfers of peanut allotments have been authorized since 1967 and will again be allowed this crop year.

Although across county transfer of peanut allotments are not permitted, combination of farms is permitted. Martin added, "Different tracts of land or farms are combined for administrative purposes in administration of farm pro-

grams. Basic regulations are that all land owned and operated by the same person be combined into a single farm. The combined peanut allotment could be planted on any part of the combined farm.

The regulations regarding the combination of farms have been relaxed substantially in the past few years. Prior to 1973 farms were required to be no further than 20 miles apart. The mileage limitation has been removed and regulations now permit combination of differently owned farms without regard to productivity," Martin said.

The combination of farms across county lines have also been permitted for several years. When farms across county lines are

combined, the farm records are then transferred from the transferring ASCS County office to the receiving ASCS County office.

"In the past years, farms have not been combined across more than one county line, but these regulations have also been relaxed," Martin said. Regulations do not prohibit the combination of farms across more than one county line if the receiving ASCS County Committee determines that the combined farms will be operated as a single farming unit with the same equipment, management, labor and financing separate from any other. The receiving ASCS County Committee must also consider if the equipment is or could be freely interchanged between the different farms. The Texas State ASC

'78 Peanut Price Support Levels Announced

WASHINGTON - National average support levels of \$420. per short ton for 1978 crop quota peanuts and \$250. per short ton for 1978 crop additional peanuts were announced today by Secretary of Agriculture

Committee reviews all combination of farms across the county lines to assure that the intent of the regulations are being carried out. A decision has not been made concerning the maximum distance between farms that combinations across county lines can be approved or the number of county lines a farm combination can cross," Martin concluded.

Bob Bergland. The \$420. quota level is the legal minimum and the additional level is based on estimated export demand and prices.

The two tier level of support is new and required by the Food and Agriculture Act of 1977. For the 1977 crop, there was only one support level and \$430.50 per short ton, or \$410.50 per ton after a deduction of \$20. for storage, handling and inspection. This deduction will not be made under the 1978 program.

Quota peanuts are those grown within the poundage quota established for the farm for the 1978 marketing year. Additional peanuts for the 1978 marketing year are those sold from the farm which are in excess of the quota peanuts.

Only Segregation I farmers stock peanuts will be

eligible for the \$420. price support rate. Segregation I means the peanuts are eligible for domestic use and may be milled and sold for the manufacture of peanut butter, roasted peanuts, salted peanuts and other edible products. Segregation II peanuts, which includes more mixed types or more broken kernels or other damage, and segregation III peanuts, which have visible mold that may produce aflatoxin, will be eligible for the \$250. price support rate.

Producers may obtain price support on 1978 crop farmers stock peanuts through warehouse storage loans, farm stored loans and purchases. The warehouse storage loans are available in the south-eastern area through GYA Peanut Association, Camilla, Ga; Southwestern area, Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, Gorman, Texas; and Virginia-Carolina area, Peanut Growers Cooperative Marketing Association, Franklin, Va.

Secretary Bergland also announced the sales policy for peanuts acquired through the price support program by Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) and sold for domestic edible use. Sales of quota and additional peanuts for domestic edible use, including use as seed, will be made by CCC at not less than 105 percent of the quota loan rate, plus costs, if sold on or before December 31, 1978, or 107 percent of the quota loan value if sold after that date (exception: sales of additional peanuts for domestic edible use, if sold and paid for during the harvest season at time of delivery by the producer, will be made at not less than 100 percent of the quota loan value, plus costs).

Sales policy for peanuts sold for export and domestic crushing will be announced at a later date.

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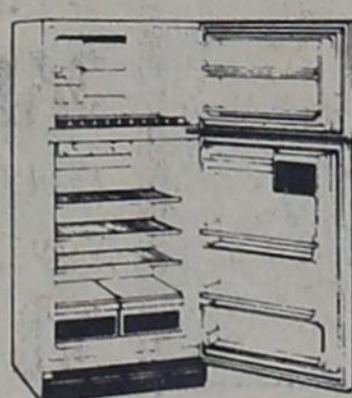
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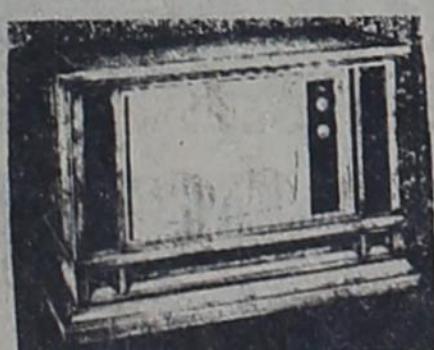
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
