Stenholm Reverse Rally For

A "reverse caravan" of Charles Stenholm supporters will leave Eastland County at noon Saturday, May 20, en route to Stamford by way of Abilene, to wish the candidate well in his run-off bid for election for Congress, 17th District.

A great number of such caravans bound for Stamford are expected from throughout the 33-County 17th District.

The Eastland County delegation will include supporters from all towns in the county, and it is tentatively being scheduled for vehicles to leave the County courthouse about 12:30 p.m., with brief stops planned for Baird and Clyde, and arriving at the Abilene Stenholm for Congress Headquarters on Cypress St. about 1:45 p.m. where they will be met by Abilene supporters, before continuing northward to Stamford.

Candidate Stenholm will greet the assembling supporters at the Campaign Headquarters at Stamford, from about 2:30 to 5:30 p.m.

Most of the supporters will be "brown bagging it" for lunch Sunday, in their effort to show grass-roots support for the farmer-businessman in the June 3 run-off. Persons wishing to join the caravan are welcome and should be at the Courthouse by 12:30.

Stenholm is leading candidate in the May 6 Primary over seven Democratic opponents.

Norris Starr is Eastland coordinator; Bill Terry is Ranger coordinator; J.C. Fletcher, Cisco coordinator; and Robert Dyer of Cisco is area coordinator.

The reverse caravan is believed to be the first on record in which the supporters "go to the candidate" to express their support and confidence to him.

Stenholm is seeking the office to be vacated with the retirement at years end of Cong. Omar Burleson.

The eighth grade graduating class has been honored with several parties the past week.

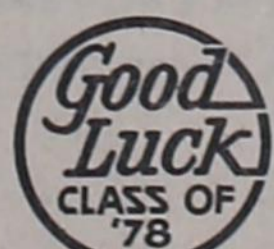

I want to correct the beginning of my report for last week. I began it with: "My Gosh! What a hot day the 24th of April was; (Not My God). Thanks for the mis print. Well, we had a nice 1.4 fche shower last week. Tho we could use an awful lot more. I remember in 1908

we lived on the place that I bought in 1921. My dad laid off the land and plowed I think it was four rounds in Jan. It was so dry that he quit. We had a shower on May 16 and he just started planting cotton. It was not even laid off. He planted about 10 acres and quit. On the evening and night of the 20th, it rained and hailed and rained. The creek thru that place rose higher than I have ever seen it in the last seventy years. Water lapped over the planted cotton at least two feet deep. Dad knew he would

have to plant it over and we went down to the bottom field to see a hen he could start planting it again. There was a perfect stand and that back water just made it richer. That cotton made a bale per acre that year. It was before peanuts wer planted in the ocunty. So there were no sand to wash away.

In the pasture of that thime there was a long hole on this the creek that was at least seven feet deep. When I moved on the farm in 1924 that hole had disappeared. It was just a sand bermuda place with a small ditch there. When the Boll Weevil hit this Conty in 1914 everything on the sand turned to planting peanuts and letting the sand blow away.

When we lived there in 1906-1911 you could plant melons in the cotton and raise some very large ones. You did not have to worry about diseases on melons and fruits in those days. There were birds of every description on the farms then. Tho there were no pesky sparrows in the farming parts of the ocunty.

There were no paved roads, radios, T.V. or Movies. You always had plenty

to do. No going anywhere at night during the school days. It was your job to study. In the Summer they would have Singing Schools for all.

Money was generally always very scare. Christmas was for eating and visiting. Presents were few and far between. Sometimes to far between.

The 84 gang is still taking it blow and easy. Too busy on that garden wolk. Monroes neighbors gathered his first ness of English Peas. I wonder if he let Grandma have them or take them home with him this morning. (Sunday) Some are still on that poke salad line yet. They are just like a bunch of goats after the first green leaves in the Spring.

Our office gang are so honory as usual. They all try to cheat. I sure have a time trying to keep them straight. I may have to play as they do and cheat with them.

Well, yesterday I voted against some liars and for some that were liars.

Ore good thing we thinned them down to at least two in a hill this time. I lost some votes and came out ok on the other ones. I cannot see how a man can spend three

million dollars on a race that will not pay one tenth as much in salary on a four year term.

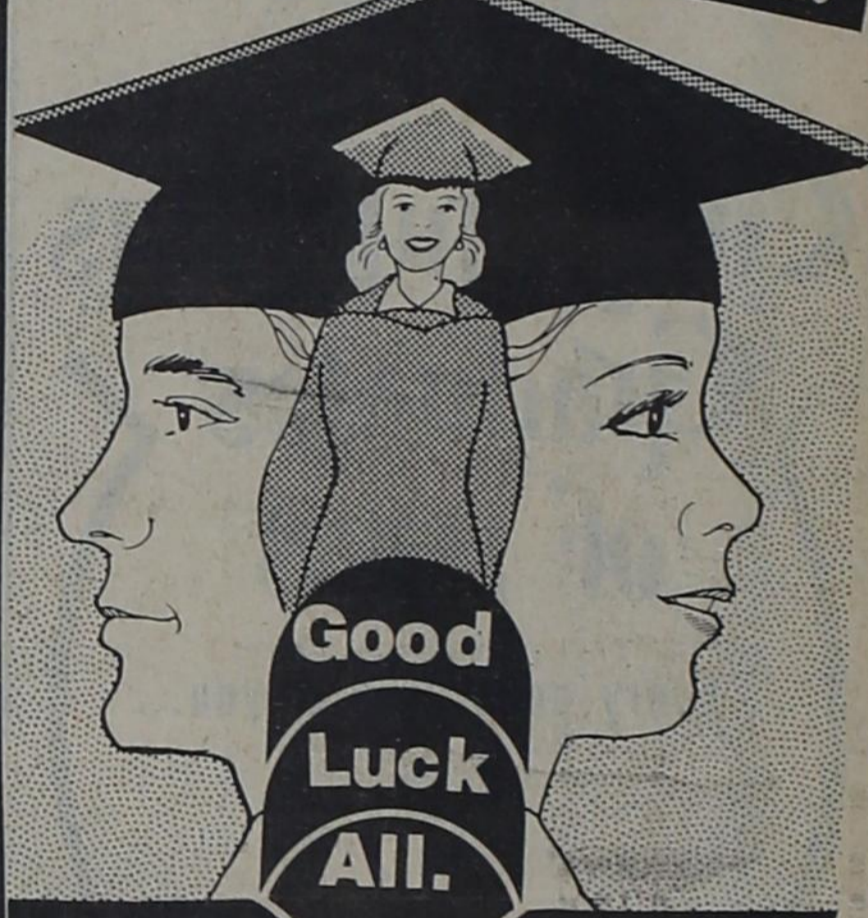

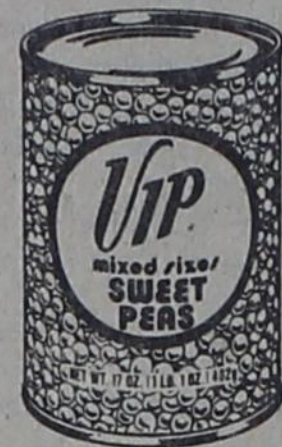
