



Split Application of Temik on Peanuts O.K. Under New Texas State Label

The Texas Department of Agriculture has approved a state label for two applications per season of Temik 15G aldicarb systemic pesticide to control nematodes in peanuts, according to Union Carbide Corporation. It allows for one application at planting and a second at peg initiation. The federal E.P.A. label includes an at-planting application only.

According to Union Car-bide, the split application can increase yields substantially by providing extended protection against nematodes. A 1976 study by Dr. Thomas Lee of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Stephenville showed a florunner peanut crop treated with a split application of Temik yielded 3,450 pounds per acre, compared with
