your City Commission met in regular session on Thursday, July 6, 1978 with the Mayor and all Commissioners present. There were a number of items that were discussed and acted upon.

Donnie Skaggs CPA De Leon met with the Commission and presented the city audit for the fiscal year ending on May 31, 1978. Mr. Scaggs reported that he found the City books in order, but suggested some minor changes in entries in the accounting system. A summary of the audit will appear in the next issue of the Progress. A complete audit is on file in the City Office.

Bills for the month of June was presented for review and were approved for payment. Tom Broom met with the Commission to discuss the opening of the street down to his house. This matter was discussed and it was decided to have the street surveyed out and to grade it and put some kind of gravel on it to make an all weather road. An engineer from COG in Abilene will be down this week to help locate the street.

The group reviewed several pieces of property for tax purposes that had not been discussed for the purpose of adjusting tax values. The Commission will be meeting in the future to act as an Equalization Board to discuss tax changes with those affected.

The Commission was informed that three people had been appointed to serve on the Housing Authority Board for the next two years. Those appointed were: Brent Lasater was reappointed with James Mears and Dorothy Hatcher appointed as the other two. The Mayor met with them and reviewed some rain.
