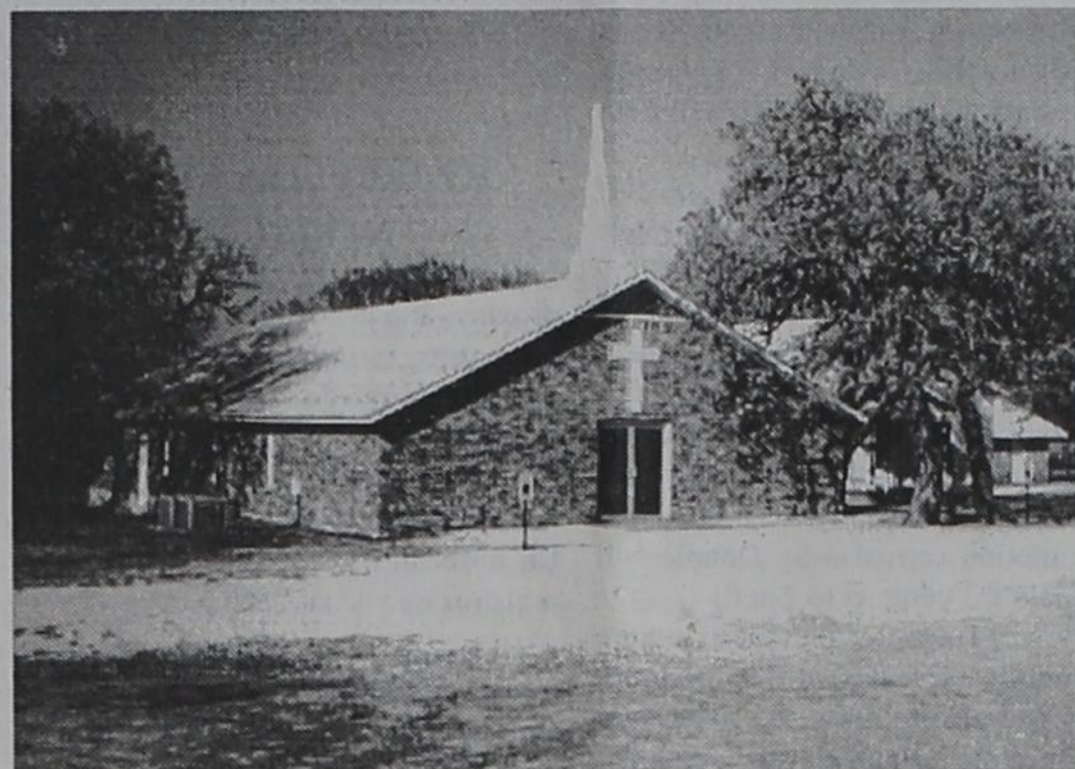

St. Joe Baptist Church 100th Anniversary Sunday, Apr. 11



St. Joe Baptist Church

On the second Sunday in April, 1899, the Baptists of the St. Joe Community met at the school building for the purpose of organizing a church. The church was organized with 13 charter members. So on Sunday, April 11, 1999, St. Joe Baptist Church will celebrate it's 100th Anniversary.

The 13 charter members and those that were added to the church worshipped at the school building until the first church building was constructed in 1904. It stood for some 55 years. The tabernacle was built in 1912.

In his book, The Fiddler Changed His Tune, Carl L. Stewart, the son of charter members of the church, relates a story told to him by his mother about how St. Joe Baptist Church got its name. According to this story, a man became angry when the building was not built on the spot he desired. In his anger, he cut off his connections with the congregation. Later, as the man passed the construction of the new building, a carpenter said, "There goes old St. Joe". Since his name was Joe, "St. Joe" soon became a familiar by-word. The church adopted the name of St. Joe Missionary Baptist Church with Bro. G. A. Warren as Pastor and W. H. Stewart as clerk.

Four Sunday School rooms were added in 1955 while Bro. Roy Hill was Pastor.

In January 1958, the following were appointed to serve on the building committee: Roy Oglesby, Frank McCrum, D. S. Williams, George Morris, and Monroe Morris. Then on January 29, 1959, the congregation moved out of the old building. The building was torn down in one week. Construction on the new building started on February 5th and by April 29, 1959, St. Joe Baptist Church began moving into the new

building. This Sanctuary, along with two Sunday School rooms and the hall were built while Bro. Vernon Roberson was Pastor.

The fellowship hall and kitchen was added in 1968 while Bro. Bob Watson was Pastor.

The brick educational building was built in 1971. Central heat and air was added in May, 1972; the organ in 1974; and the baptistry was added in October, 1974. All of these things were built while Bro. Dossey was Pastor.

On March 12, 1990, a building committee was formed to oversee construction of the new sanctuary. Members of this committee were as follows: Gerald Fronk (chairman), Marvin Jones, Benny Morris and Larry Sherrard. Glenn Sparger and John Hodges were added to this committee on December April 8, 1990 while Bro. Joe Stewart was Pastor.

Southwestern Peanut Growers To Nonimate Committee Member

Peanut Growers of the Southwest -- primarily Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Arkansas, California, and Louisiana -- will meet at the Oklahoma State University Extension Service Building, 930 North Portland Avenue (at intersection of Northwest 10th and Portland), Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on Saturday, April 17, 1999, to elect a grower member and alternate to the Peanut Administrative Committee.

The meeting is scheduled for 9:30 a.m. (CST) in conjunction with the Annual Meeting of Oklahoma Peanut Growers' Association. The nominations portion of the meeting will occur early in the meeting.

Lane Campbell, Compliance Officer, Peanut Administrative Committee, will conduct the nominations.

Robert R. Tabb, Manager, Peanut Administrative Committee explains that the Committee administers the Peanut Marketing Agreement. The Committee is made up of growers, shellers, and the Area Association Managers, and recommends peanut marketing regulations to be issued by the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture under the Agreement. These regulations apply generally to the entire industry.

The Grower member position to be filled is currently held by Billy F. Coe of Hydro, Oklahoma. The Alternate position is occupied by Donnie Sadders, of Hrdro, Oklahoma. Both terms expire on April 30, 1999. Both men are eligible for renomination.

A special program of interest to the peanut industry will be held in conjunction with the meeting, says Jack Coppedge, President of Oklahoma Peanut Growers Association. He invites and urges peanut growers from all Southwestern Area states to attend and participate in the nominations.

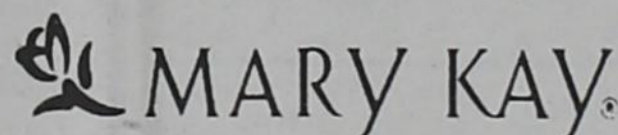
