



CITY CHIT CHAT

Your City Commission met July 20 with the Mayor and all Commissioners present. Others present were Edna Brinegar, Robert Irvin, Albert Biggs, Tom Broom, and Richard Hughes.

Since the last meeting it was determined that the street that we had agreed to open, no longer existed as most of the streets and alleys in that addition reverted back to the land holders in 1935. Mr. Broom met to discuss the possibility of leasing some city lots in Block 5 and 6. The Commission agreed to the lease.

Edna Brinegar gave us some information that she got at the tax school she attend last week. She was required to attend school and become certified as a tax assessor-collector. She is now certified. She pointed out several things that must be done in the area of taxation. As soon as this session of the legislature is completed and we know what tax matters will be acted upon, we plan on starting a study of the complete tax roll and hope to come up with a workable tax base early in 1979. We say that we tax on 30 percent of market value, but if you will look at you valuation and compare it with the market price of your property, you will find that we are possible taxing at 15 percent of lower.

Chief Biggs reported that the Police Department had been active during the month and had issued a number of citations and most of these were convicted in Municipal Court. He reported that he had assisted other law enforcement officers in a number of cases. He brought to our attention that the police car was in unsafe condition and needed repair at once. The Commission approved a motion to do the work that would put the car in a safe condition.

Robert reported that progress was being made on the water line in the west part of town. They are now to the highway and hope to have it completed in the near future. He also reported that several more of the traffic signs had been erected. We are asking you to please take note of these and observe them. They have been erected at the request of local for the safety within our town. All locations of these signs will be published as soon as the project is completed.

We have been having some trouble at the land fill. The gate was torn down recently and was down or open for several days. The gate is now repaired and is again locked. We realize that some people do not like the

The article will be titled "Peanut Power" and traces the coming age of the goober. In the Digest's words, "Once pig fodder, this all-around food now serves as the people's pite and gourmet's delight."

An estimated 43,000,000 Americans who read the Digest each month will get a compact peanut education, flavored with good humor, from the August article.

Explaining how peanuts grow, the article calls it "One of the largest underground movements in the farm world."

High nutritional values and low cost are emphasized, but the article also tells of the restaurant which lists the peanut butter sandwich on its menu at \$27.95.

Among many other kernels of peanut information, the article tells who set the record for pushing a peanut to the top of Pike's Peak with his nose, and how long it took.

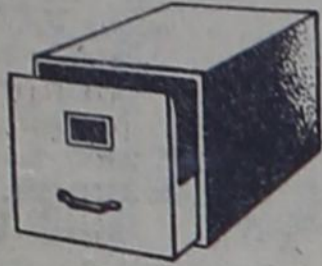

The Sergeant in Charge of the ward almost got a Court Martial on account of my treatment. So I figure those reports were destroyed by him later.

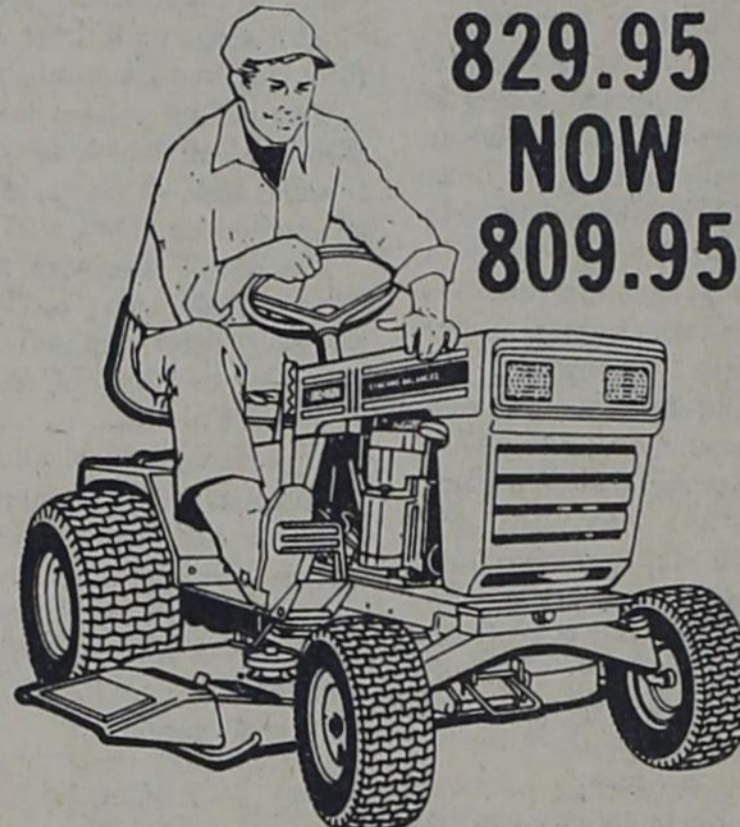

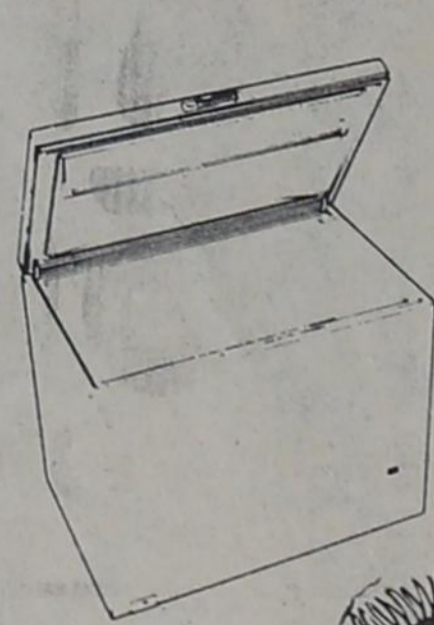

Special activities include a reception honoring all couples in the county who have been married 50 or more years, the oldest man and woman resident of Eastland County and other awards.

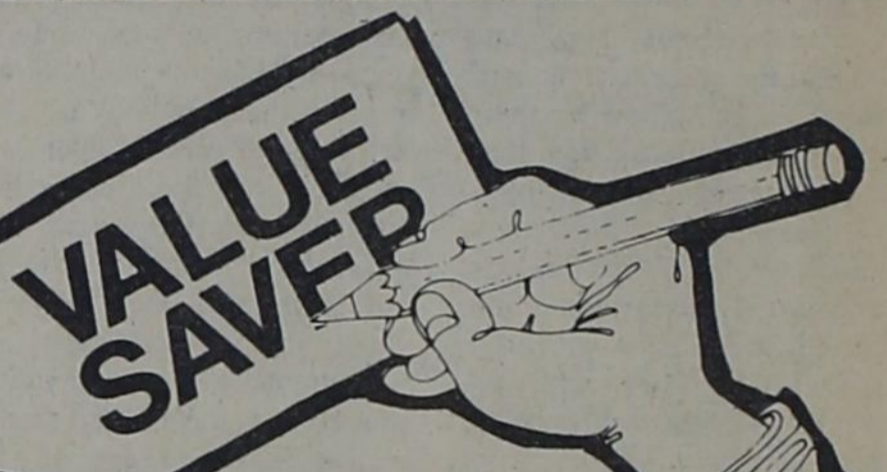

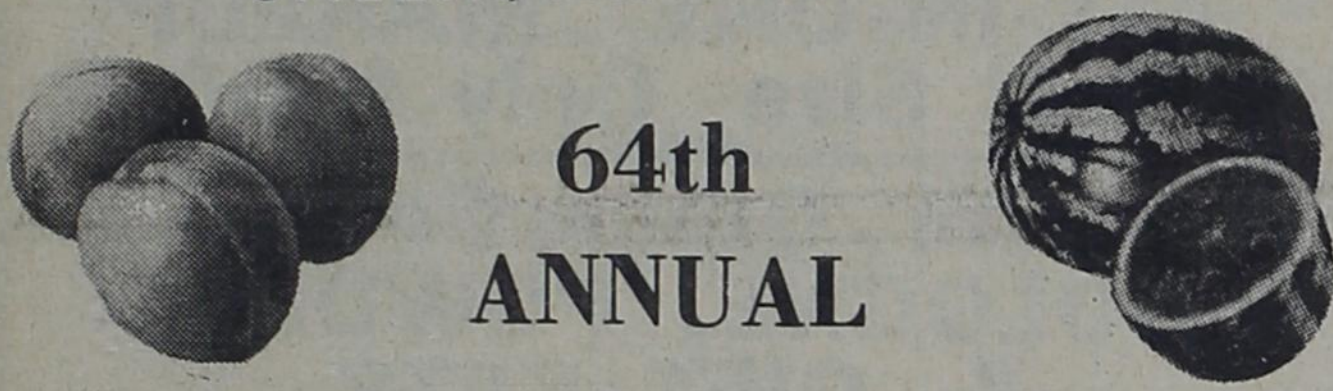

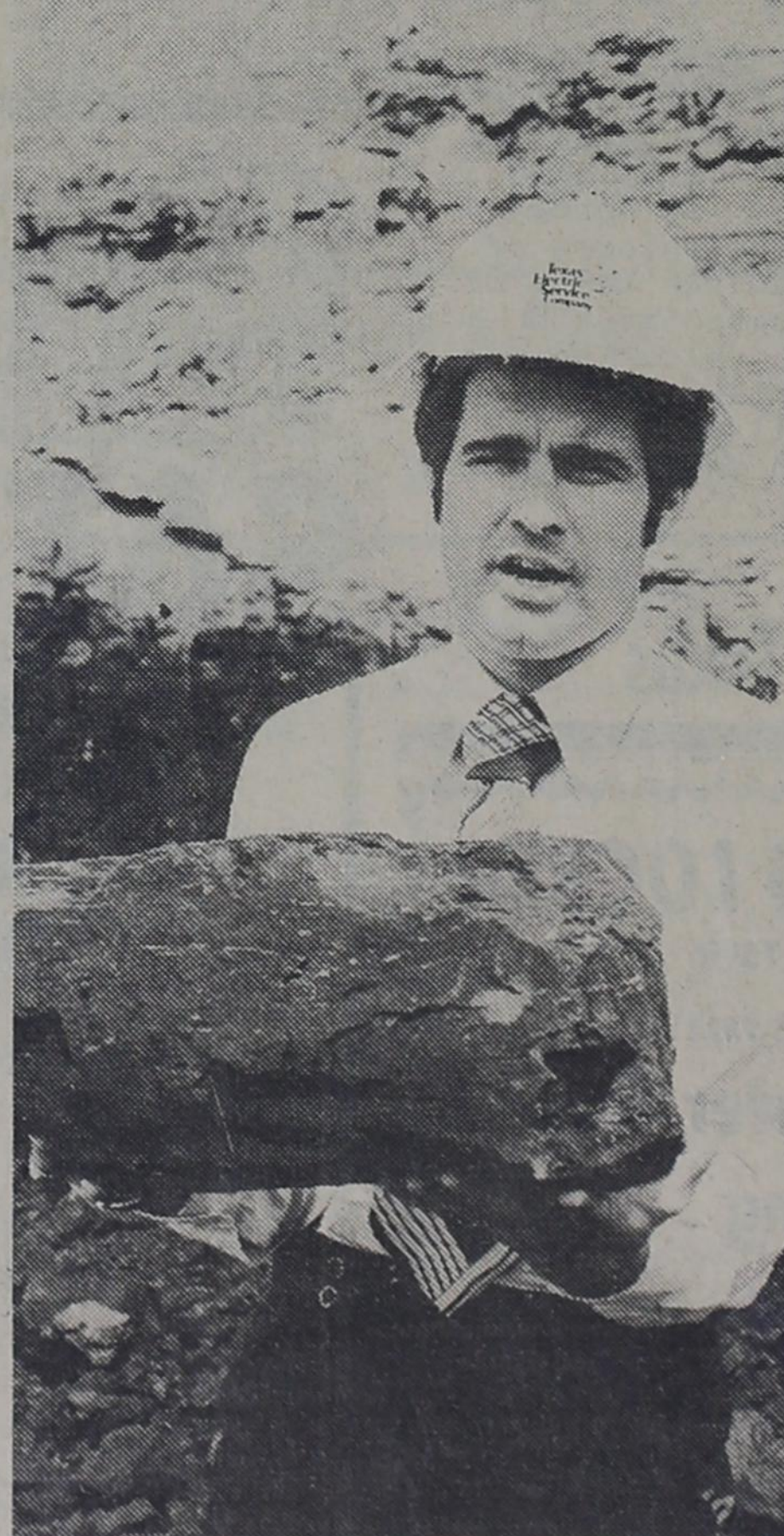
