Dr. Kimble graduated from the College of Physicians and Surgery at Keokuk, Iowa in 1890 and began the practice of medicine in Eastland County at Jewell, near Gorman. He later moved to Gorman where he resided until his death. He was an active and loyal member of the Methodist Church serving continuously as a steward for 54 years. He had a large part in every building program undertaken by the local church and helped in every forward movement of the church at large. The Methodist Home at Waco was one of his special projects and he always contributed to it generously.

He was a civic leader, too, in his community and his state. He served as Mayor of Gorman from 1922 to 1930 during a critical erain the town's history and helped to put the city administration on a firm financial basis. He served on the Gorman School Board for a number of years, always leading in the plans for expansion and growth. He served for several years as trustee of Hankins College when it was located in Gorman. He also opened up what was known as The Kimble Addition to the city for settlement.
