



Dallas, Texas - A regional-wide series of meetings of Southwestern industrialists, on the problem of inflation, taxation and fiscal policies, will be held in Texas and Louisiana during the month of March, it was announced today by D. I. Johnston, Regional Vice-President, National Association of Manfacturers.


