
WSC Presents Rehab Plaque To City

Snowden To Seek 17th. Dist. Congress Post



TYE - Jim Snowden, former Mayor of Tye, has officially announced his candidancy for the 17th Congressional District seat being vacated by Omar Burleson. Snowden, was elected to five two-year terms as Mayor of Tye, a small city near Abilene, and is presently serving on the City Council. Snowden was previously employed at the Base Documentation Manager at Dyess AFB in Abilene but retired from that position November 1, to devote full time to campaigning.

When asked why he was entering the race, Snowden replied, "The prime motivation came from a letter written by Attorney General John Hill, which was placed in a capsule in a capsule to be opened 100 years from now. In this letter John Hill warned that the people should start protecting themselves from the abuse of mass bureauracy. I thought at the time that he was exactly right but 100 years too late. I think we must began now!" A one-time stock farmer, Snowden is also deeply concerned over the fact that the "little man" is invariably ignored in this era of big time politics.

Snowden gained the spotlight in the Big Country area through his service on the 42nd District Court grand jury from late 1976 to early 1977. He initiated the grand jury investigation of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (TABC) in Abilene for alleged abuse of power and violations of the Texas Liquor Control Act. His main objective was to see that the Liquor Control Act was enforced equally among the public as well as members of the TABC, and that no one's rights were abused.

The son of a former county judge of Garza County, Snowden was born September 23, 1921 and attended public schools in Tahoka (Lynn County). On November 1, 1942, he enlisted in the Army Air Corps, and was assigned to the pilot cadet program at Texas Tech in Lubbock.

Statement From James Peppers

In announcing my candidacy for Commissioner for the city of Gorman; I would like to say that I believe one's citizenship constitutes an obligation of trying to improve the community in which he resides. Since, coming to Gorman it has been a pleasure for me to work with the Fire Department, Chamber of Commerce, Little League Baseball, and the Gorman Schools. Several factors caused me

to seek the position of Commissioner, none of which is that I have an axe to grind, but only to serve, if I may to improve our com-

One factor which I believe could be of most benefit is to seek Federal funds by the way of a grant, one grant that is available is the Community Developement Blank Grant Program. This is for small cities which requires no matching funds for the city. It does not require that we have a high rate of unemployment, or that we have to have a large number of minorities. In recieving grants of this and other types, we could do much to our streets, sewage, and water lines that at the present time is taking much of our local tax money.

I will oppose any increase of any gas rate, electric rate or water rate unless it can be proven absolutely necessary.

At the present time all of the City Commissioners receive free water; I think this should be discontinued, because commissioners in the past, members of the school board, or hospital board members receive compensation for this service. I think the City Commission should not be exempt from paying for services like any other

I feel much can be accomplished through mutual cooperation, and by some of the above mentioned suggestions. This could be done with no increase in local taxes.

As a citizen of this community, and feeling a responsibility toward it, I am offering my services as a Commissioner and will appreciate your consideration in the City Election April 1. -GP-

REPORT ON WASHINGTON

Following is a report of a series of meetings held in Washington, D.C. on March 2 and 3. The group met with almost the entire Texas and Oklahoma Congressional delegation, testified at a Hearing held by the Senate Agriculture Committee on Peanuts and met with USDA personnel.

All Southwest Congressman contacted pledged their active support in behalf of our effort.

The principal thrust of the entire effort was to seek a modified disaster relief program for growers of segregation 2 and 3 peanuts for the years 1978-81. A brief

Such a provision could cause heavy and unnecessary losses to growers who have frozen peanuts). More than 22,000 tons of 1976 crop peanuts marketed in the Southwest were classified segregation 2 because of freeze damage.





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
