




Survey on Peanut Diseases, Pests

AUSTIN - Peanut growers in Central and East Texas are requested to participate in a survey on diseases and insects in the 1973 peanut crop, Texas Agriculture Commiss i o n e r John C. White has announced.

Quesionnaires have been mailed to a representative number of farmers in both areas. The questions are on the amount of acreage infested with insects and infected with underground plant diseases. Results of the survey will be compiled and announced in March.

"We hope that farmers will complete and return the questionnaires. The peanut disease program is an important one for continued productivity," Commissioner White said. "The results will be useful in determining the peanut projects for the next two years."

Questionnaires should be returned to the Texas Department of Agriculture, 301 West Navarro, De Leon, Texas 76444, as soon as they are
