



All residents of Gorman will be furnished a Permit at NO COST, and may get same at the City Office. UNLOADING ANY KIND OF DEAD ANIMALS WILL NOT BE PERMITTED UNDER ANY CONDITIONS.

PERMITS will be issued to other persons who are not Citizens of the City of Gorman at the following prices:

> ANNUAL PERMIT - \$18.00 MONTHLY PERMIT — \$ 2.50

For those people who do not desire to purchase either an Annual or a Monthly Permit, may pay on an individual load basis, as listed below:


> PER PASSENGER CAR LOAD — \$1.00 PER PICKUP LOAD - \$2.50 PER TRUCK LOAD - \$5.00

Non-Residents of the City of Gorman may purchase any of the above Permits from the City Office or the Attendant on Duty at the Land Fill.

Any person, dumping or unloading any waste material, dead animals, & etc. on roads leading to or adjacent to the City of Gorman Solid Waste Land Fill will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.
