319 STUDENTS ENROLL IN SCHOOL HERE

Gorman Schools began the fall term of school on August 18th with a total enrollment of 319 students. Elementary grades enrolled 198 students and Kindergarten 16.

Eighth grade had the largest enrollment of 34, followed with the sixth grade with 31; second grade, 30, first, 23, fourth and seventh, 21 each, and third and fifth grades with 19 each.

High school has an enrollment of 105 students with the sophomore class having the largest enrollment of 32; seniors with 28, juniors, 25, and freshmen, 22.

Enrollment is up 25 students over last year's total. 294 students were enrolled the first week of the 1974-75 school year.

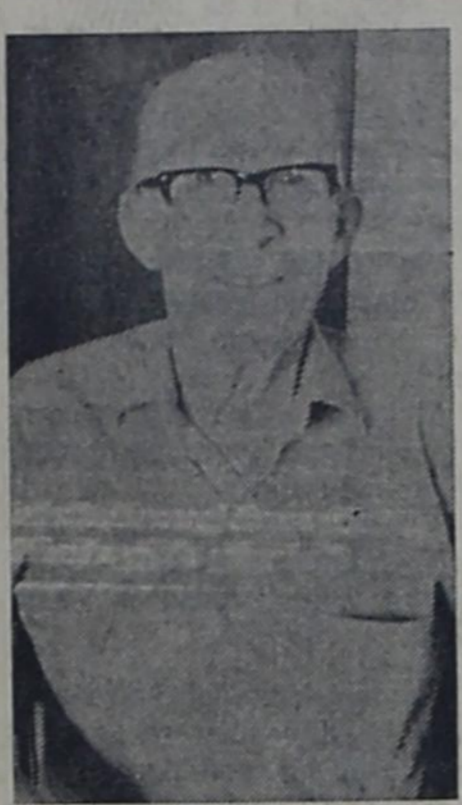

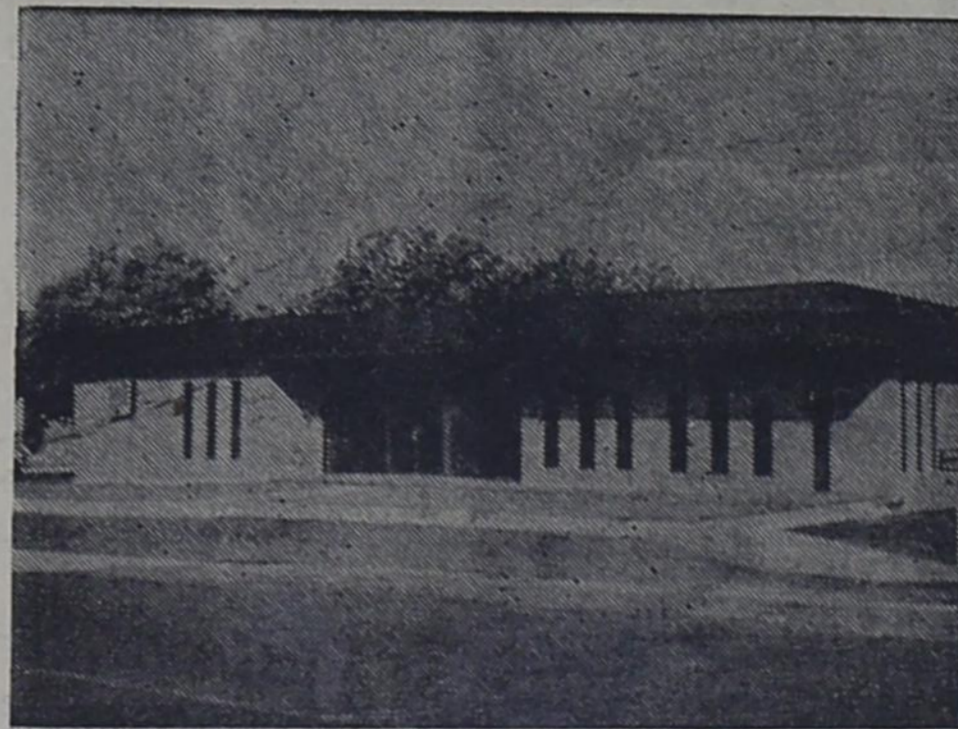

crops. John helped us conduct a number of peanut weed control and peanut fertility demonstrations. Several producers in Eastland County were well acquainted with John because he had helped many of them with special problems in this area of soil fertility.

We will long remember John Chapin for his willingness to help others, his good humor, and straight and honest answers.

Pecan aphids are causing a lot of concern throughout the county. These are soft-bodied yellow or black insects that suck sap from leaves. A sticky substance called "honey dew" is excreted by these insects, creating an ideal medium for development of sooty mold fungus. Heavy infestations of aphids may cause defoliation in late summer and fall, reducing the nut crop in the current and succeeding year.

Aphids may be controlled on yard trees by spraying with Malathion or Guthion. Commercial pecan growers

may use Cygon, Malathion or Zolone.

Non-Residents of the City of Gorman may purchase any of the above Permits from the City Office or the Attendant on Duty at the Land Fill.

Any person, dumping or unloading any waste material, dead animals, & etc. on roads leading to or adjacent to the City of Gorman Solid Waste Land Fill will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.
