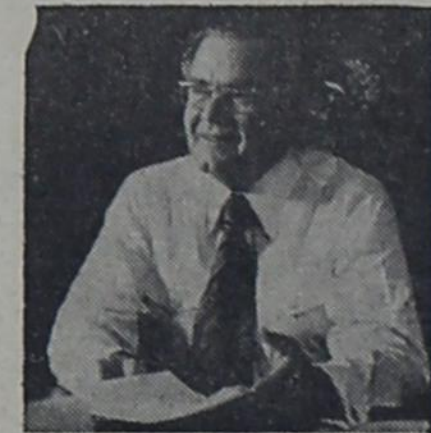

Mental Health Drive Slated Here During May

Citizen Volunteers will be going door-to-door in Gorman from May 4-31 asking for a contribution in the fight against Texas' Number One Health Problem . . . Mental

The Texas Association for Mental Health is a volunteer organization working to improve the quality of mental health services in Texas. In 1957, the Association successfully worked for the passage of the community mental

health center law. This law has resulted in the development of mental health centers which provide treatment, consultation and research in a community based setting throughout Texas.

The Mental Health Association has also had a direct role in updating laws to protect the rights of the mentally ill,

R. L. Williams Is Distinguished Engineer at Tech



R. L. Williams of New Orleans, La., a native of Gorman and the brother of Mrs. Bill Chandler of Gorman, was honored on April 12 as Texas Tech University Distinguished Engineer. The College of Engineering at Texas Tech an-

nually honors outstanding graduates.

Williams is vice-president of Freeport Mineral Company and the Freeport Sulphur Co. The award was made at a noon luncheon at the University Center

"Graduates designated as Distinguished Engineers," Engineering Dean John R. Bradford said, "must achieve distinction in their profession, but also in community service."

Few people have found their professional riches as quickly and permanently as did Mr. Williams. He earned his bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering in 1941 and joined Freeport Sulphur Co. at its Grande Ecaille Mine. After WWII he returned to the company. During his work in the shipping aspect, Freeport Sulphur's system for distribution was revolutionized, and shipping and storing began in liquid rather than in solid form.

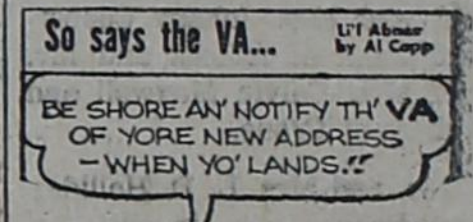
He was made vice-president of the company in 1970 and

undertook the supervision of construction and engineering for the development of the Esberg copper mine in Irian Jaya, Indonesia, a \$175 million project. He later served as resident director of Freeport Queensland, Australia, where he directed construction and development of Freeport's \$350 million Greenvale-nickel-cobalt project.

Williams has made his contribution in the realm of community service as a member of the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce of the New Orleans area. He is a member of Louisiana Engineering Society and has participated actively in its professional development.

16,830,000,000 Pages! That's Fantastic!

Three huge web offset presses work full time in printing *The Living Bible* in Versailles, Ky., Kingsport, Tenn., and Taunton, Mass. Already the 16 1/2-million Bibles which have rolled off these presses have consumed a quantity of paper which, when loaded into railroad box cars, would stretch for six miles. That's 38,744,800 pounds of paper packed in 472 box cars.

Even the 15-inch binding cloth in each Bible, rolled out end to end, would reach from Washington, D.C., to Salt Lake City Utah . . . or 1,762 miles in any direction.

While aside from the actual message contained in each *Living Bible*, the ink used in printing these words has no meaning, the 311,000 pounds of the black stuff would fill six railroad tank cars . . . or a 35,000 gallon olympic swimming pool.

The pages of each of the Bibles are bound to the spine by a high strength nylon thread. Someone has figured that the amount of the thread used to produce the books would wrap around the earth's equator three and one half times. Or, if so inclined, one could fly a kite two-fifths of the way to the moon on this 97,462 miles of thread.

Each Bible has a cover board in front and in back. These are 5 1/4 by 8 3/4 inches, and the quantity used thus far if they could be stacked

so high, would reach 151 miles in the air. This is the distance between London, England, and Paris, France.

Much time is involved in the production of *The Living Bible*. So far, the presses have run 7,900 man hours, or four years of 40-hour work weeks for one person, with a two week vacation each year thrown in for good measure.

It takes that long to print 16,830,000,000 (16 billion—830 million) pages of *Living Bible*.

Nearly 17 million copies of *The Living Bible* have been sold since this paraphrased version by Dr. Kenneth N. Taylor was issued just after Thanksgiving in 1971. There is no way to measure the spiritual impact of this Bible in the idiom of the day, except to say it has been fantastic.

Sales of *The Living Bible* could have made Dr. Taylor a wealthy man, but they haven't. Every cent of the royalties from these Bibles goes into a foundation which underwrites the paraphrasing of the Bible in over 100 languages other than English.

When this task is completed, approximately 93 percent of the world's population will be able to read the Bible in a contemporary version of its own native language.

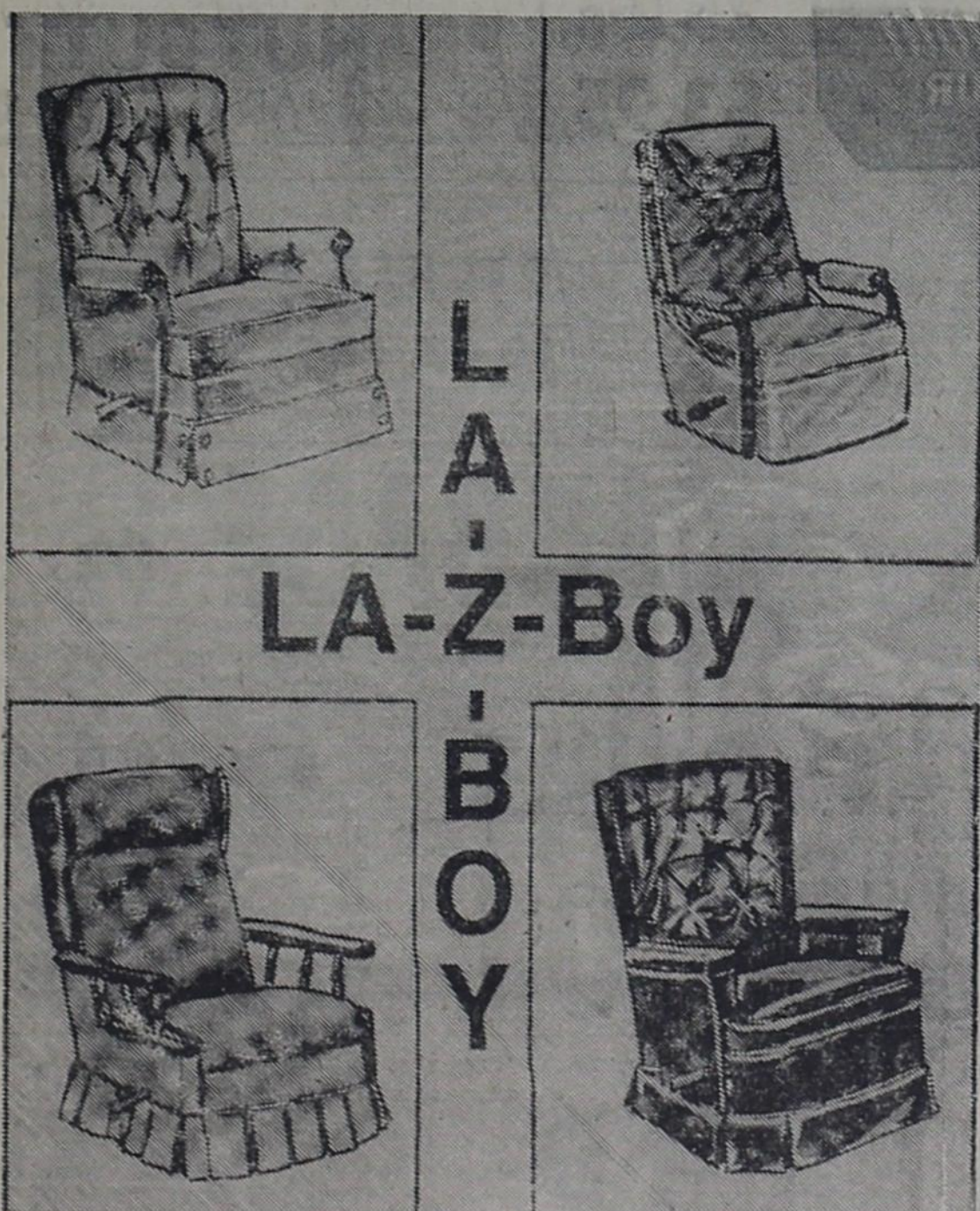
