It is great to have a restaurant open in Gorman again. The Pantry opened Wednesday, October 1 for business and will have a formal opening at a later date.

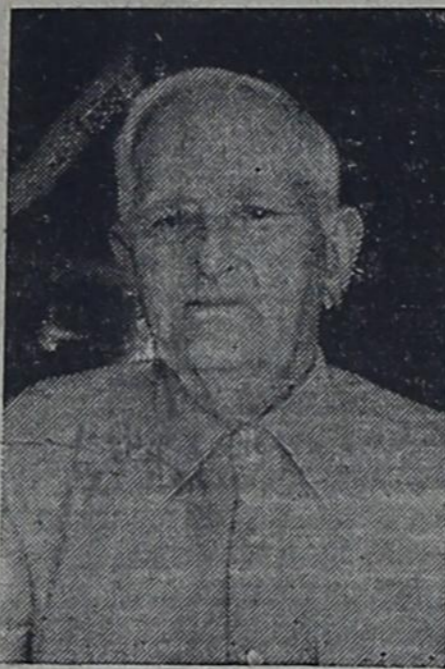
The dining room has a homey and inviting atmosphere with its brown and white checkered table cloths and window curtains.

## Panthers Slip By Hico Tigers 14-0; To Host Evant Elks Friday Night

The Gorman Panthers traveled to Hico on Friday night to take on the Tigers in the Tiger Den and managed to slip out with a 14-0 victory, which was still under question until late in the fourth period, when the Panthers pushed across the insurance tally to ice the game.

The Panthers were expecting a tough game and that's exactly what they got. The Tigers were ready and they never gave up to the pressure of the Panther offense or the tough Panther defense. It was truly a battle all the way.

The Panthers got on the scoreboard with 7:33 left on the clock in the second period when Billy Burgess raced the final 5 yards for the TD. This capped a 79 yard drive by Gorman in 9 plays. The pass try for two points failed and the score stood at 6-0.

Hico failed to score just before the halftime intermission after intercepting a Panther aerial in the Gorman 24. The drive died at the Panther

11 yard line where a stiff defensive effort prevented the score.

The 6-0 score held up and the two teams fought tooth and nail with neither team getting the upper hand until mid-way of the fourth period. The Panthers moved the ball to the Hico 15 early in the fourth, but just couldn't push over for the tally.

However, late in the fourth period following an interception by Bill Burgess on the Hico 45, the Panthers offense cranked up a beautiful time-consuming drive that covered the 45 yards in 10 plays, with Mel Maxfield rolling out to his left on a QB roll-out for the final 5 yards untouched. Time remaining on the clock was 4:13. Maxfield also added the two pointer to make the score 14-0 and help insure the victory.

Hico then started a drive which consumed all but 25 or 30 second of the game, but again could not penetrate the Panther defense inside the 3 yard line. The Panthers took over on the 3 and then killed the time on the clock for the victory. The Panthers pretty well controlled the game most of the evening but just could not push across the additional tally to insure the win.

Again this victory was a total team effort, and it surely had to be or else it might not have been a victory at all.

Billy Burgess again led the Panthers with 98 yards on 18 carries. James Webb did real well on the night carrying for 69 yards in 21 trips and did some very tough running to accomplish this. Mel Maxfield got 42 yards on 8 keeps. Carl Burleson showed improvement in ball carrying with 16 yards on just 4 tries. Robert Lewis had 12 yards on 4 totes.

The Panthers needed a real tough game and they got it. And this should help prepare them for the battle they will be facing here on Friday night when they host the always tough Evant Elks, who seem to be even tougher than usual this season. This game could be a deciding factor in just how far the Panthers could go this season, if they get through their own District 6-B West Zone race, as the Elks seem to be one of the teams to beat in the East Zone. They are really tough and the Big Red had better be ready for this one. . . . And that's exactly what we think they will be on Friday night. Right, Panthers!

## Sn. Tom Creighton Urges Voters View New Constitution

Mineral Wells - Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells was the guest speaker at a recent meeting sponsored by the Jaycees in Rising Star where he spoke on the proposed state constitution which will be submitted to Texas voters in November.

Creighton was introduced by Jaycee President Bob Clark and presented a "Statesman Award" by Mr. John Bishop on behalf of the Concerned Citizens of Texas.

While discussing the proposed constitution, Creighton singled out several amendments as being especially bad and said, "It is not so much what is contained in the document, as to what is not." He stated that "this is the worst piece of legislation ever proposed. The original Constitution is the basic law of the land and precedent is more important than pure press."

He indicated that the education provision would provide a host of new financial obligations and that equal education as proposed in the amendments at the cost of one billion dollars would have to come from the taxpayers' pockets.

Creighton also is highly opposed to the proposal which would let the state comptroller's office in Austin set tax valuations rather than having them set locally. "This amendment in particular is simply more government and higher taxes and, therefore, I cannot recommend it to my constituents," he said.

In his closing remarks, Creighton stated that as always he is interested in the public's view and wants to hear from the voters.
