## YESTERYEAR AT GHS

In 1925, the football coach was G. D. Mulloy. We played 10 games. We played Desdemona and Thurber twice. Breckenridge beat us 35-0. Gorman beat De Leon 3-0. That was the first time the Panthers ever beat De Leon. The De Leon game was played in the mud. The 3-0 score came as a result of a field goal. G. W. Scott was superintendent of Gorman Schools. We only had one game ball, so Mr. Scott wiped off the ball with his hat so they could attempt the field goal.

In 1926 we still had Mr. Mulloy as coach. Wayne Clements was captain. We played De Leon twice. We always played them Armistice Day, unless it came on Sunday. The first game was a tie 7-7, so had to play again a week later in Gorman. This game also ended in a tie, but De Leon won on penetrations. In the third quarter, Paul Jones picked up a fumbled punt and ran 35 yards for a TD, but the officials failed to see De Leon's safety touch the ball, so called it back. I (Huppy) was hurt in the first game with Cisco, so didn't get to play much. We played Howard Payne's scrubs and beat them 20-12. We didn't win any championships but gave everybody a hard fight.

C. O. Bragg was our coach in 1927. We had just an average year. Then in 1928 Buster Skaggs (now County Judge Roy Skaggs of Abilene), came to Gorman as our coach. We won our district and bi-district. We then played Anson for Regional and lost 6-0 on a mix-up on signals. We had a good season, only losing two games. Jimmie Morris made All-State at halfback and quarterback. This was the first year a Panther team had ever gone as far as bi-district and regional.

Coach Skaggs was here in 1929. Then coach Wilbur Williams came in 1930-31. Every year we had an exciting team. Some players were June and Frank Leazer, Aubrey and Morgan Bennett, Paul Jones, Elmer Creager, Murl Pittman, Elza Perry and many, many more.

Jimmy Morris said he didn't think his football suit was cleaned from the time he started his freshman year. The "Old Shack" was our field house. Remember the 19th annual Gorman Homecoming is slated for Saturday, November 1st. Be There!

The Panthers fumbled the ball away on 5 of 6 times and killed some good drives. The game was a hard hitting affair as Santa Anna also lost the ball on fumbles 2 of 3 times.

The Panther offense amassed 380 yards on the ground with James Webb doing some marvelous, hard running. The Panthers only threw 4 passes and completed 2 of them. The Panther defense was again outstanding all evening, allowing only 82 yards on the ground and 13 in the air. They have only allowed 13 points to be scored on them in the last six games, and have lost only one game, and that was their first game of the season against highly rated De Leon. The defense has really been coming along week by week and enough praise cannot be placed on these outstanding players, and we just hope they can continue their marvelous performances in the remaining games. . . . 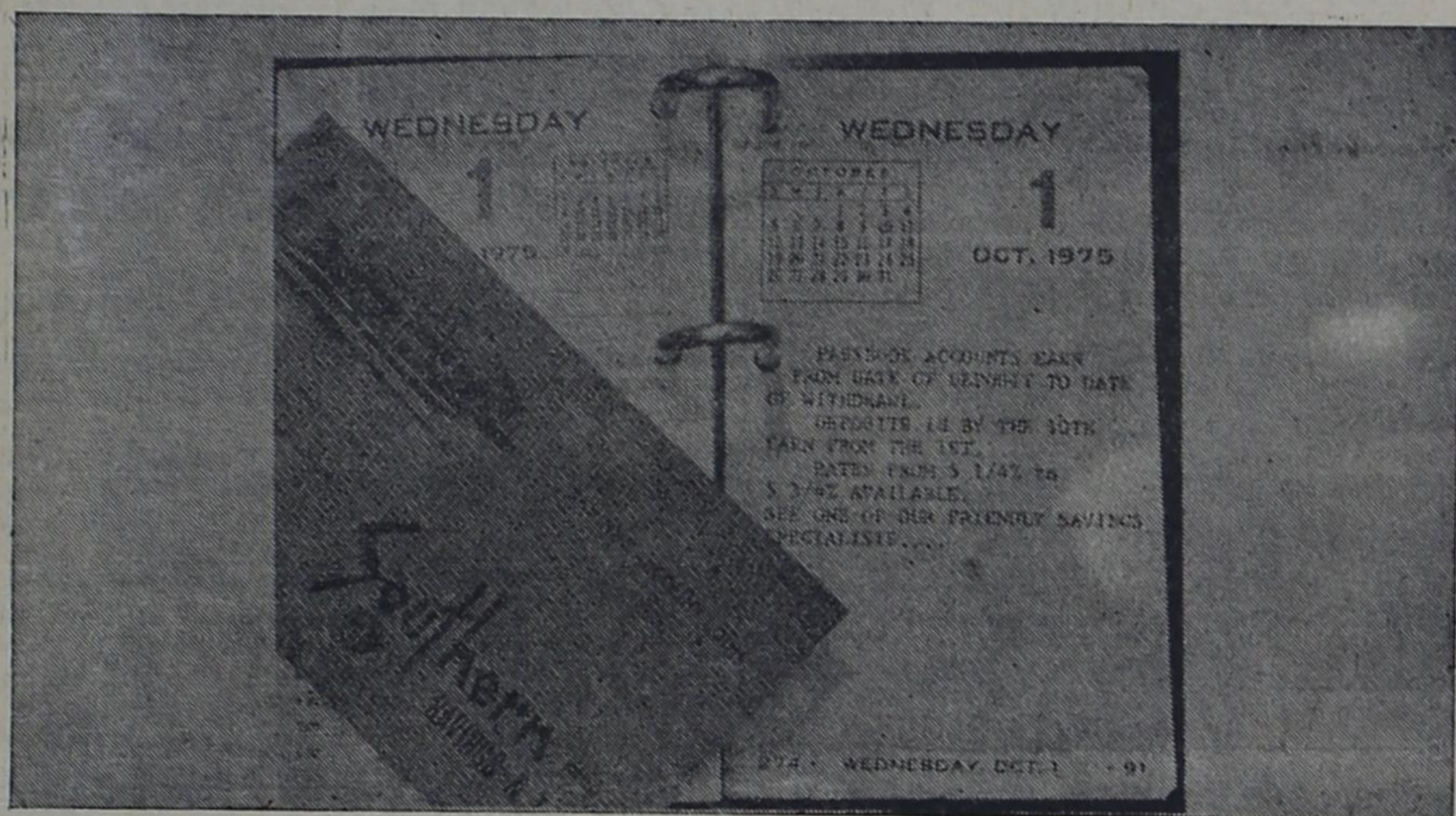
### ACTEEN ACTIVITIES

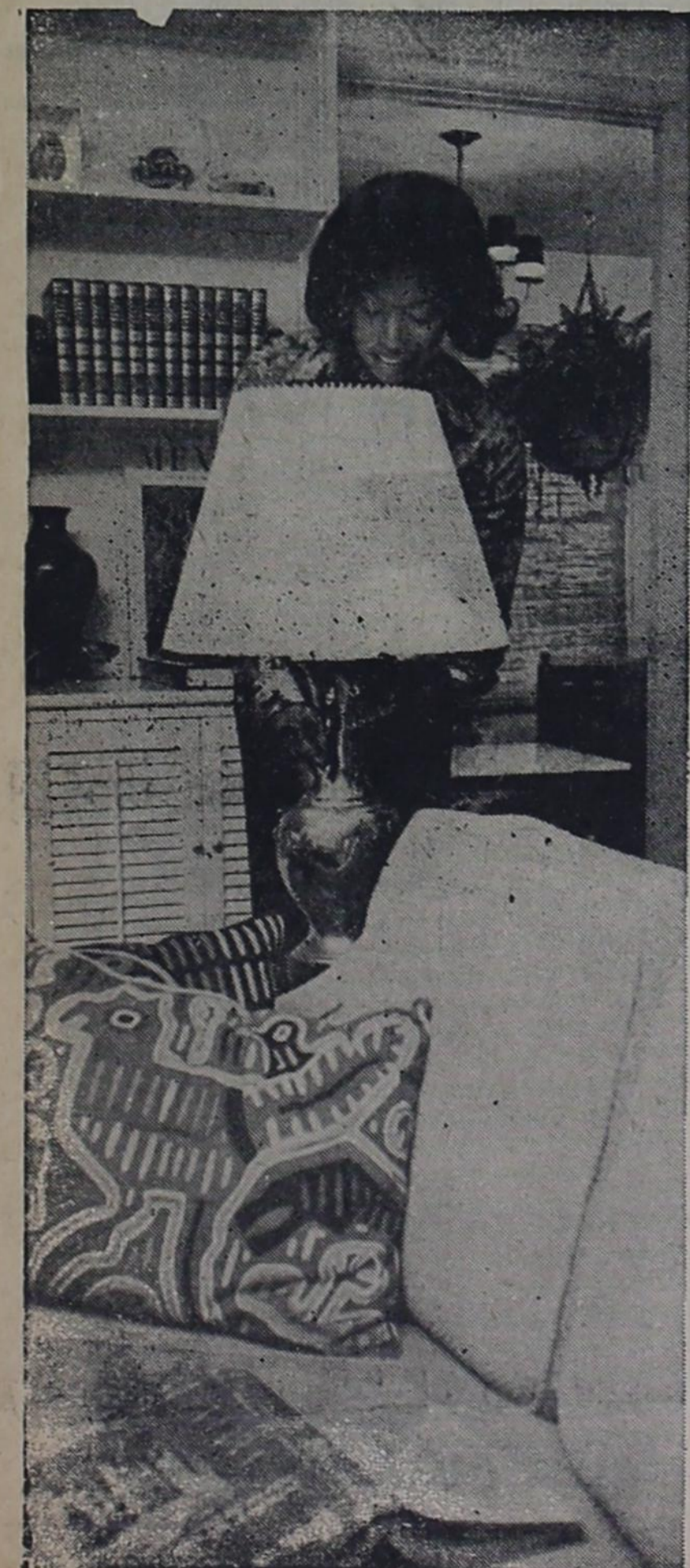

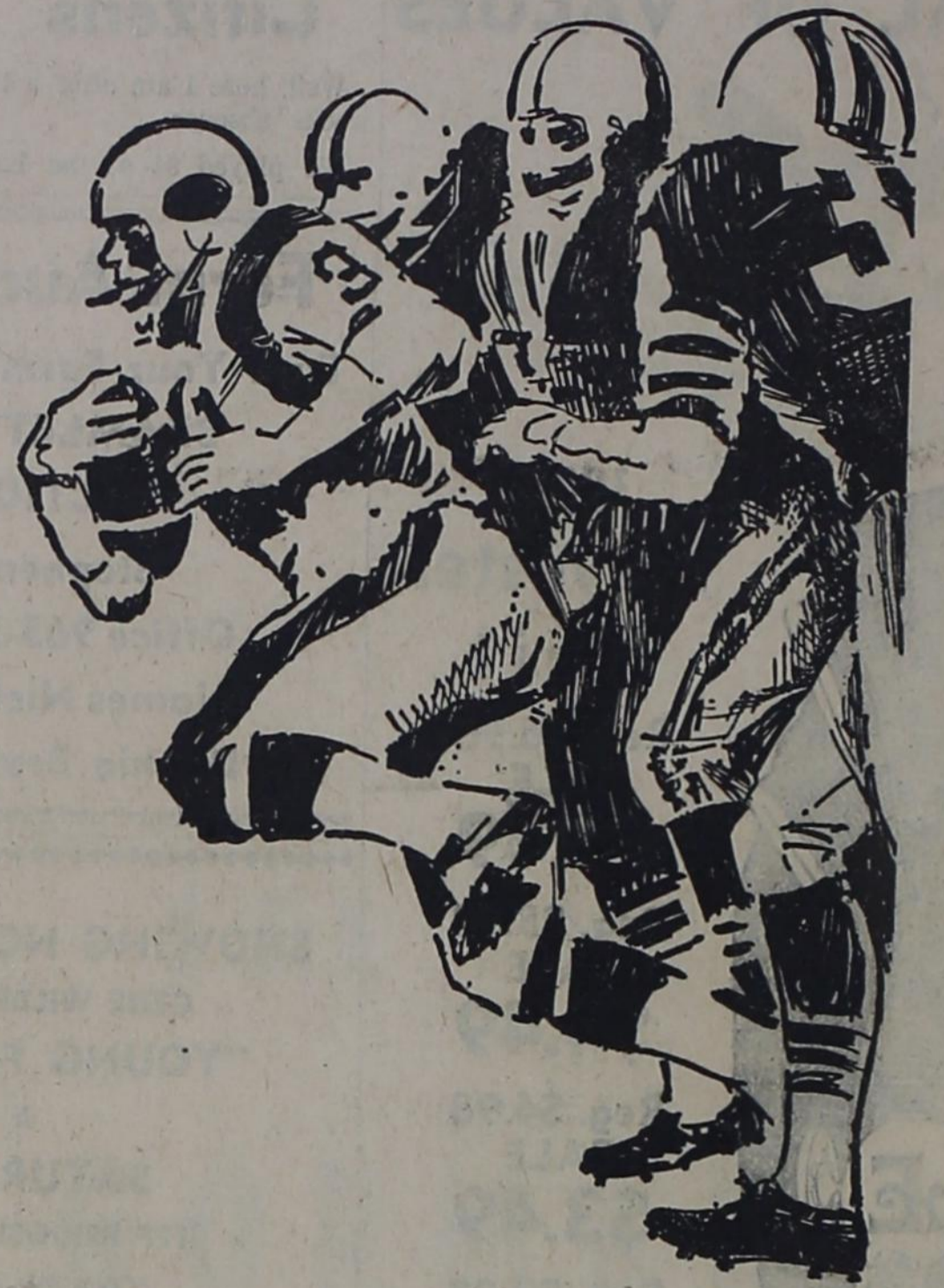

Survivors include his wife; a sister, Mrs. Bess Elliott of Fort Worth; and several nieces and nephews.

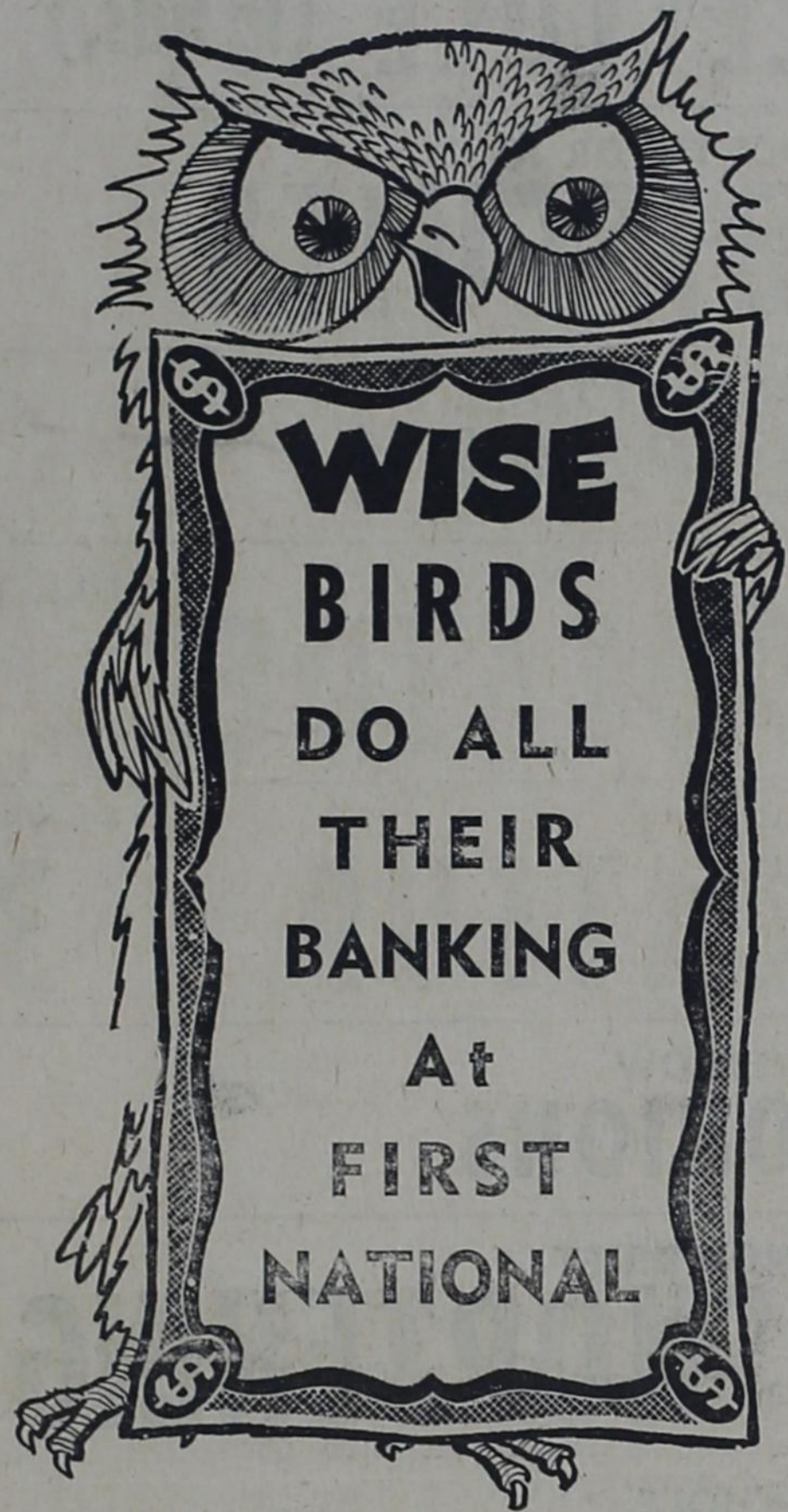
**STEVE WEBB ATTENDS DALLAS THEOLOGY SEMINARY IN DALLAS**
