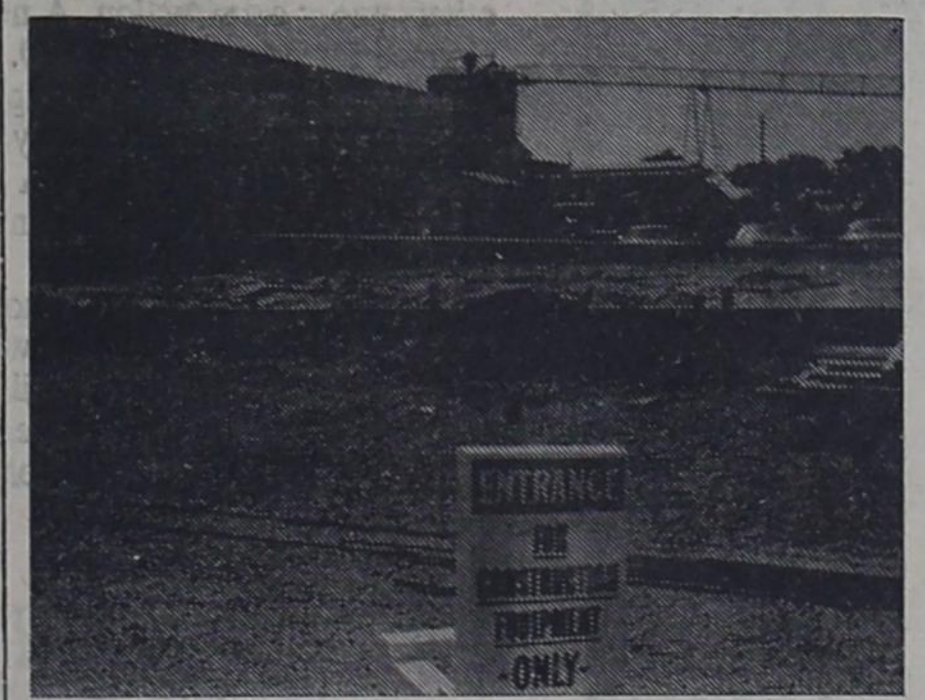

Hwy. Surfacing Projects Approved Eastland County

AUSTIN — The Texas Highway Commission today approved construction of additional surfacing on highways in Eastland and Stephens Counties.

The work is part of a statewide effort to improve safety and convenience for travelers as well as protecting the road way from costly damage by severe weather conditions.

The work includes 23.7 miles of highway at an estimated cost of \$975 thousand. Specific projects are on Interstate 20 in Eastland County from 1.5 miles east of Ranger eastward to 1.0 miles west of State Hwy. 16, State Hwy. 6 in Eastland County from Carbon southeastward to the Comanche County line, and in Stephens County on US 180 from the Shackelford County line eastward 6.7 miles.

(N-31-H-12-328-4; AC/FHT-NC) May 21 — The Suez Canal is expected to be reopened in the near future, through the efforts of Navy Electrician's Mate First Class Clyde C. Howard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Emmett C. Howard of Rising Star, Texas, and his U. S. Navy shipmates who are participating in "Operation Nimbus Star." He and other crewmembers of the amphibious assault ship USS Inchon have been assigned the task of assisting the Egyptian government in clearing the famous canal of all mines which have kept the Suez closed since 1967.

In the Run-Off Election for Eastland County School Superintendent held Saturday, voters chose Jimmy Hughes of Carbon over O. C. (Stubby) Warden of Ranger in a close race by 50 votes.

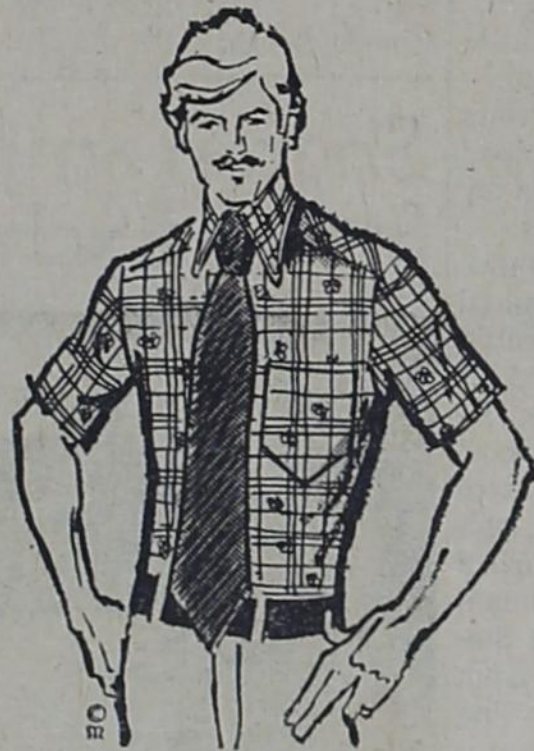

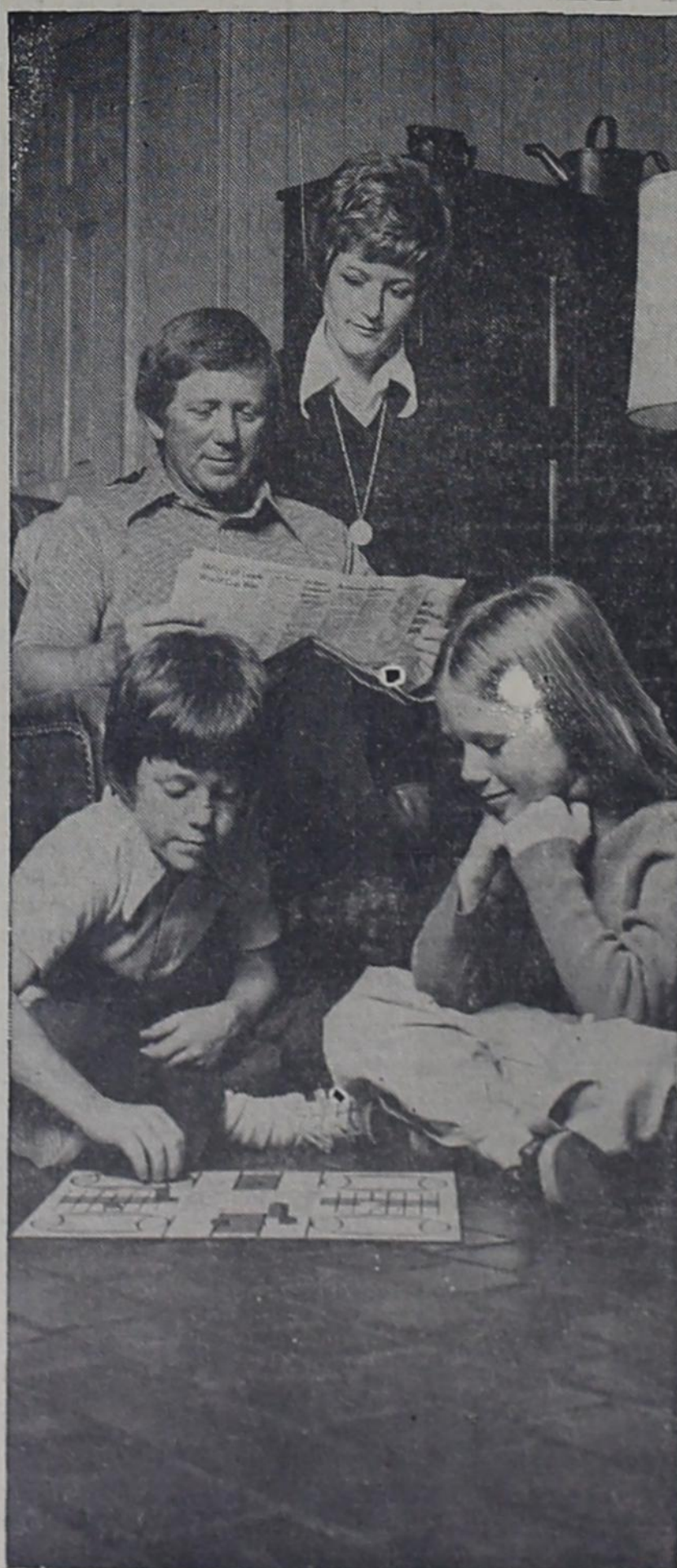

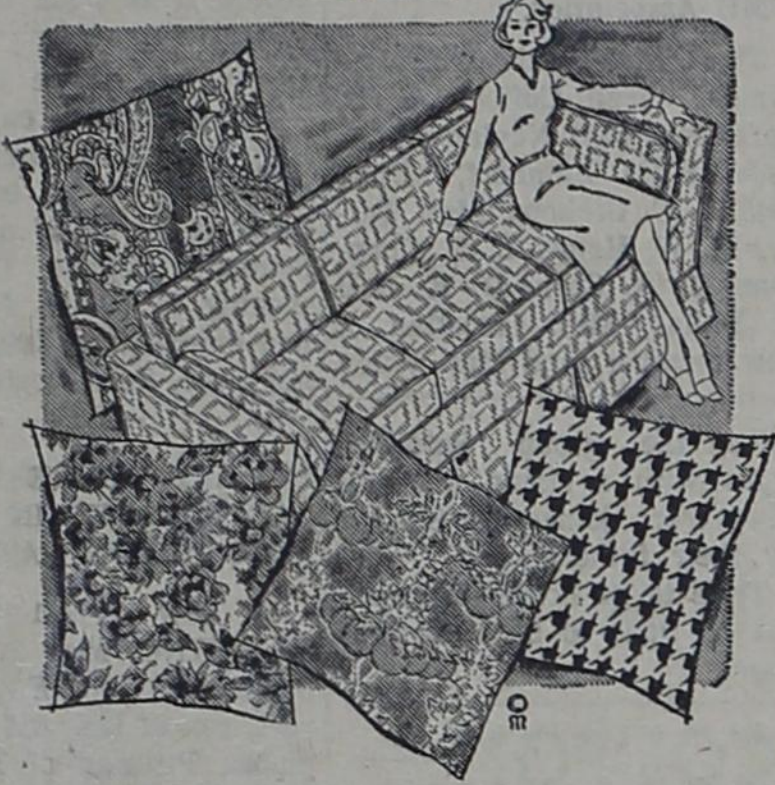

PEANUT PRICE SUPPORT LEVEL AT \$358.50 TON

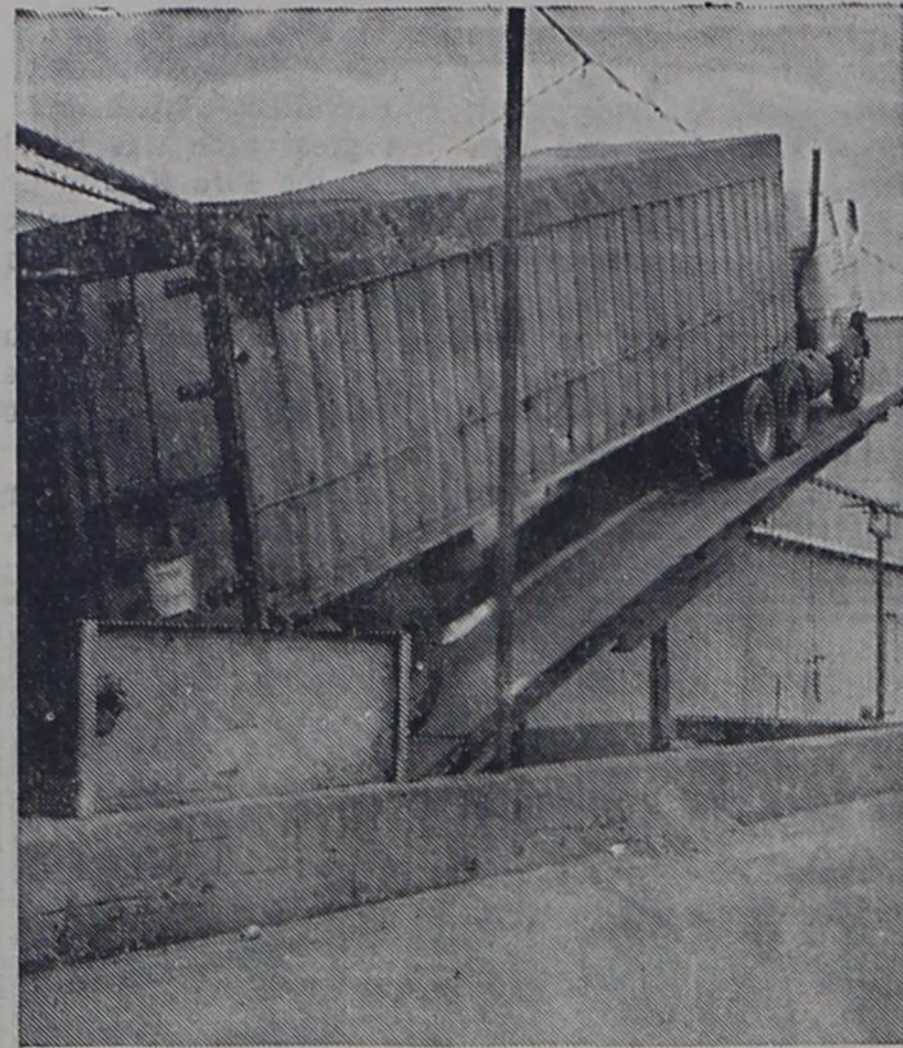
WASHINGTON — The USDA today announced the minimum national average support level as \$358.50 per ton and other major program provisions for 1974-crop peanuts. The new minimum support level represents 75 percent of the peanut parity price for May 1974. The support level for 1973-crop peanuts was \$328.5 per ton.

The 1974 peanut program differs from the 1973 program in that (1) peanuts found to contain visible aspergillus flavus mold will be ineligible for support, (2) the charges assumed by producers for storage, handling and inspection will be increased from \$15 to \$17 per ton, and (3) CCC's minimum sales policy for diversion sales will be 100 percent of the loan level.

The Agricultural Act of 1949 provides for peanut support at a level between 75 and 90 percent of parity depending on the percentage which the total supply of peanuts is in relation to the normal supply at the beginning of the marketing year. Today's announcement is in accordance with "forward pricing" provisions of legislation providing for such determination in advance of the planting season.

The national average support level will not be less than \$358.50 but will be adjusted upward at the beginning of the marketing year August 1, 1974, if at that time a combination of the parity price and the supply percentage results in a higher legal minimum support level.

A later announcement will list the support level of 1974.—GP—
