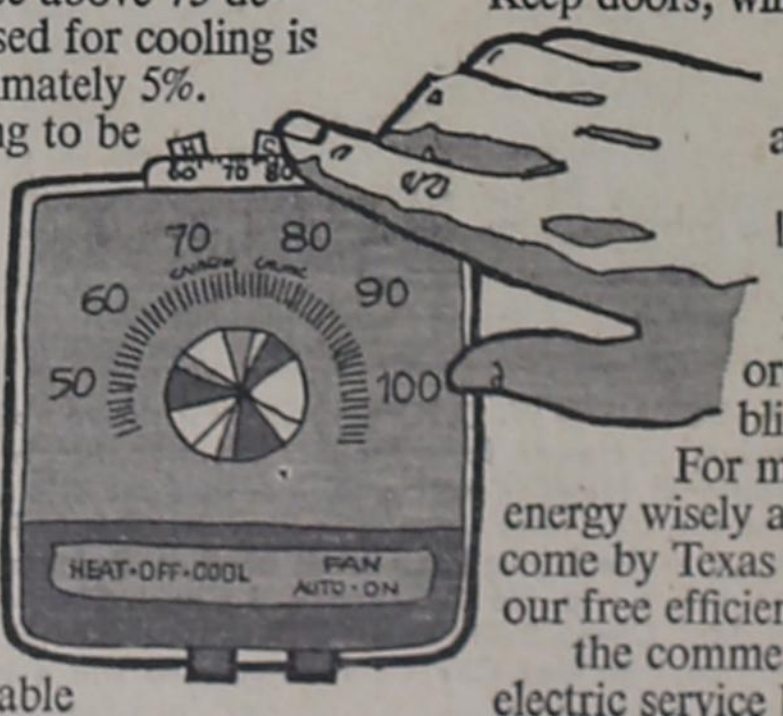

good thing happened in Washington last week. The so-called Land Use Planning Act was defeated on a procedural vote by 211 to 204. THIS DOES NOT MEAN THE END OF THE EFFORT BUT IT MAY BE SOME TIME before it is tried again. The Senate had already passed the measure and they may have a re-run if the sponsors

feel they have a chance. THE LAND USE PLANNING ACT IS MUCH LIKE THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION ACT. This EPA measure came to passage as a "Mr. Clean" proposition. As stated here before, everyone is for clean air, clean water, and clean everything, but this Agency is violating basic human rights and under its rule-

making power strikes at our free enterprise system and a takeover of local and State government responsibility. THE PUBLIC'S DESIRE FOR A HEALTHY ENVIRONMENT AND THE INTENT OF Congress to enact a reasonable approach has been twisted by rules and regulations into a bureaucratic overload of individual citizens and

whole communities. IT IS ALMOST UNBELIEVABLE THE DICTATORIAL ORDERS IMPOSED BY THE Environmental Protection Agency against some areas of the Country where they have found pollution the worst. The Houston Chronicle recently described the threat of this Agency to impose economic sanctions against the whole

City unless people formed in to car pools and buses as a part of controlling pollution. The Environmental Protection Agency ordered firms with 1,000 or more employees to reduce parking spaces and force workers to pay \$1.00 a day fine plus a fee for driving to work.

OTHER MAJOR CITIES ARE CONFRONTED WITH AN EDICT TO ELIMINATE downtown parking, denying license plates for automobiles with excess emissions, and to curtail construction of facilities of any kind which might contribute to air pollution. In other words, the Agency acts as the policeman, the jury, and the judge with orders resembling a dictatorship.

WHILE SOME CITIES SUCH AS INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA, ARE TRYING TO revitalize their downtown area the Environmental Protection Agency comes along and attempts to prohibit new construction, enforce anti-parking rules, and plow under downtown development.

REGARDLESS OF WHETHER THERE IS A LAND USE PLANNING ACT OR NOT, the EPA insists that it has the final decision to approve new construction of buildings, roads, streets, parking lots, garages, shopping centers, recreational areas, amusement parks, sport stadiums, airports, and all kinds of commercial and industrial development. No business decision of significance can be made under EPA's mandates without the Agency's approval.

THE LAND USE LEGISLATION COULD HARDLY DO MORE TO TAKE AWAY A property owner's rights than this. Like so many other Federal requirements, it burdens productive business and adds nothing to the wealth or well-being of the Country. In fact, it adds to the price of things at the same time we concern ourselves with inflation.

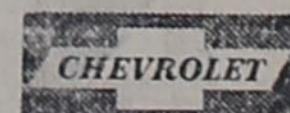

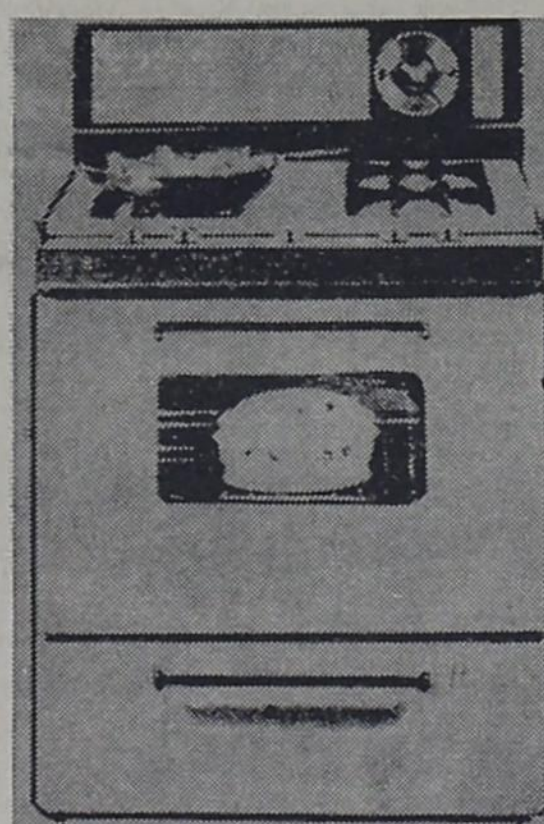
