

CARBON AND STAR TO BATTLE FOR REGIONAL AT BROWNWOOD

Area fans will get an opportunity to see two six-man football teams battle for a Regional title Saturday at 7:30 p. m. in Brownwood's Lion Stadium, when the Carbon Wolverines and the Star Tigers tangle.

Coach Grant Tidwell runs a spread formation which tries to open up running room. Star is sparked by the classy running and passing of Barry Miles which defeated the Mozelle Mustangs 61-22 in bi-district game.

Star's biggest asset this season has been its defensive players, David Geeslin, Glendon Sanders, and Jesse Beard, which has limited its foes to an average of 18 points per game. The Tigers put the ball in the air about 15 times a game and rely on shifty backs to pick their way through the spread formation the rest of the time.

Star is boasting a 10-1 season record. Their only loss came in the season opener against Oglesby. The score of that contest was 19-6.

The Carbon Wolverines are boasting an 11-0 season record, defeating the Cranfills Gap Lions in bi-district play at Comanche 38-21 last Friday night.

Fullback Bobby Carlton is the Carbon ace. The 178 pound senior has scored as many as five touchdowns in one game and he and halfback Dale Jackson had four apiece in the 64-30 win over Gordon. The Wolverines have held their opponents to 146 points while scoring 475 in nine games played and a forfeit by Novice.

Bobby Carlton scored twice and tossed a touchdown pass to Doug Bryant in the 38-21 win over the Cranfills Gap Lions in bi-district play. Along with Carlton and Bryant, offensive team All-District, and Dale Jackson, Larry Griffin, and Durward Webb, All-District defensive team, this should prove to be quite a game. Carbon is very proud of their coach, Charles Bryant, who has and is doing an outstanding job. Admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 75c for children.

J. R. Files Practices Good Conservation

J. R. Files has controlled erosion and is getting good production from critical areas. Files prepared a conservation plan early in 1967, and later signed a Great Plains contract to establish his plan on a cost share basis. Six acres of critical areas were shaped in 1968. These areas were gullies from 3 to 8 feet deep surrounded by a dense cover of mesquite trees. After the mesquites were removed, the gullies were filled, seeded, and then Coastal Bermuda was sprigged and fertilized along with a 23 acre pasture.

Files applied plant food to his Coastal in 1970 at a cost of \$17.50. The pasture was grazed for 90 days with 35 animal units. The fall growth was reserved for grazing after frost.

He dozed oak on 17 acres and hand seeded the disturbed areas and 29 acres of mesquite were root plowed and seeded to native grasses the first year of the contract.

New outside fences were built along with 4250 feet of cross fences for management of his grassland.

The cropland is being rotated between small grain and forage sorghums to supplement the grass land grazing.

"Growing of these fields and Coastal Bermuda has greatly helped my native grass," says Mr. Files.

The success of Files' conservation program is based on a good sound soil and water conservation plan.

National Peanut Allotment For 1971 Be Mailed Friday

Peanut allotment notices for the 1971 crop will be mailed to producers by December 4, 1970, according to Robert G. Lyeria, Chairman of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

A national peanut allotment of 1,610,000 acres — the same as for 1970 — has been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

In general, peanut growers who grew their full allotments in 1970 can expect about the same acreage allotments this year, the ASC Committee Chairman said.

Peanut growers who comply with their allotments will be eligible for price support loans at a rate to be announced later. Marketing penalties will apply to peanuts produced in excess of allotment.

By law the Secretary of Agriculture is required to proclaim a national marketing quota and a national acreage allotment for peanuts each year.

On the basis of the prospective need for peanuts for food uses, the national marketing quota would be 1,021,000 tons, which would result in a national acreage allotment of 1,218,031 acres. However, the law provides for a minimum national allotment of 1,610,000 acres, so the marketing quota has been set at 1,553,650 tons, which is the amount determined sufficient to provide for the minimum national allotment.

Peanut marketing quotas have been in effect since 1949. Growers vote at least every three years on whether or not to accept marketing quotas. The last referendum was held in December, 1968 when 6.9 percent of growers voting favored marketing quotas for the 1969, 1970 and 1971 crops.

New Farm Bill Gets Approval

The new farm bill has been passed by both the House and Senate and signed by the President. The new program covers wheat, cotton, feed grains, wool and mohair for a period of three years. It does not cover peanuts or the ACP program. The present peanut program is still effective and expires at the end of the 1971 program year.

Detailed information on the new farm program will not be released until around Dec. 15. 1971 Peanut Allotment notices will be mailed Friday, Dec. 4. The authorization that permitted the sale and lease of peanut acreage in 1970 has expired. It is possible that a new bill to permit the sale and lease of peanut acreage is being considered, but has not passed either the House or Senate. If such a bill is not passed, growers will not have sale and lease of peanut acreage for 1971.

Peanut Farmers To Get Questionnaire About Peanut Crop

AUSTIN — Texas Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White announces that a few peanut farmers will receive a questionnaire in the mail asking for information about peanut yields, rates of planting, insecticides used and other items. Commissioner White explains that this information will be used as a part of a research project to help peanut farmers grow better crops.

The questionnaire should be filled out by the farmer giving the information requested and returned to the Texas Department of Agriculture Laboratory, 301 West Navarro, De Leon, Texas 76444. After all the questionnaires are in, the information will be summarized and will be published in the form of a survey. Commissioner White added that no individual farms or names will be used.

Those farmers who have already received the questionnaire and have harvested their crops should complete and return the questionnaire as soon as possible. Where harvest has not been completed, the questionnaire should be filled out and returned as soon as peanuts are harvested.

Eastland County 70 Peanut Crop Near Mark Of 69 Crop

According to De Gordon, County Agent, the 1970 Eastland County peanut crop is expected to be slightly under the good crop of 1969. Gordon said with about 80 percent of the peanut crop harvested, it now appears that the average yield will be about 100 pounds per acre under the average of last year. Last year's average yield was 1,277 pounds per acre, second only to the 1968 yield of 1,474 per acre.

Tommy Lawson, ASCS County Executive Director, reports that the average yield is between 1,170 and 1,175 pounds per acre on farms that have turned marketing cards into the office.

There were 34,057 acres of peanuts in Eastland County this year, compared to 33,799 acres in 1969. The county agent says the total peanut production in the county should be about 40 million pounds compared to 43 million pounds last year. If the estimates are correct the value of the county peanut crop would be just under 5 million dollars.

Gordon says some growers have reported better yields than last year, but most are reporting lower yields. Yields on irrigated peanuts have been very good while dry land yields have fluctuated considerably.

Several farmers had lower yields caused by salt damage in irrigated peanuts this year. Generally the dry land grades are down.

Peanut harvest continues to run ahead of last year's schedule. The weather has been almost ideal for peanut harvest, Gordon reports. As harvest nears completion, the farmers are hoping for some rain. Moisture is needed for small grain crops and winter cover crops, Gordon added.

The dry weather and high winds have caused wind erosion to be a big problem on sandy fields.
