



Producers who believe they may be entitled to disaster payments under the Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 should notify the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office as soon as possible.

Evidence of Loss

What they should NOT do: Martin said, is plow under or: otherwise destroy evidence off the crop damage until specifically advised by the county ASCS office that they may do so. Official determinations must be made on the extent of loss.

"If a farmer believes that natural disaster has caused a substantial loss in yield of his program crops, he should notify the county office as soon as he can. He should not destroy the crop residue. If his loss is partial and he harvests some or all of the crop, he should be ready to furnish evidence of the yield, such as a warehouse receipt and similar documents," said David Martin.

"Most important of all, he hould keep in touch with the County ASCS office," he said.

This is the first year in which ASCS is to make disaster payments to eligible farmers who have substantial losses in production of program crops because of natural disaster. Program crops that are grown in this area include wheat, grain sorghum, corn, barley, and Upland Cotton.

More complete information on disaster payment provisions is available from the County ASCS office. -GP-
