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## Peanuts Blended With Milk Proteins Make Delicious Cheese-Like Food

Peanut cheese, with its bland flavor, should appeal to cheese fanciers, and even more to their pocketbooks. Present cheese analogs

are made from sodium caseinate obtained from milk. Protein from peanuts can replace a part or all of this scarce and increasingly costly material and help hold down prices. This new food product is

still under development at Texas A&M University by scientists with the Agricultural Experiment Station and Engineering Experiment Station. Various amounts of peanut flour and protein iso-

late are being used to make "peanut cheese analogs."

It's called an "analog" because even though it's cheese-like, the food has ingredients other than the usual animal milk.

Milk protein and peanut protein are blended to make the peanut cheese.

The new food, and several commercial cheeses, are being compared in casseroles, pizzas, and sandwiches for their performance and acceptance.

Peanut cheese analog is just one of many new food products being developed from a variety of crops at the Food Protein Research and Development Center at Texas A&M.

Expansion of food supplies and development of new markets for farm products are the goals of this cooperative research with Agricultural Experiment Station scientists. This peanut research is partially funded by the Texas Peanut Producers Board.

"Though still in the development stage, our peanut cheese analog compares favorably with several of the processed cheeses now on the market," says Dr. Khee Choon Rhee, project leader on this research for the Agricultural Experiment Station.

"In fact," Rhee says, "the peanut isolate cheese analogs had the most desirable flavor of all the analogs tested."

### DESSERT GINGERBREAD

1-1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon Arm & Hammer Baking Soda

cheese analogs and mozzarella were tested in a pizza food system, the peanut protein cheese analog gave the most cheese-like appearance.

However, it was slightly dry, with minimum amounts of stretchiness. Increasing the oil content has made the product slightly juicier.

For cheese sandwiches, the same group of cheese analogs, mozzarella and club loaf were tested.

Initially, peanut cheese analogs did not melt evenly. But increasing the oil content produced products with similar surface oil characteristics to the commercial cheeses.

Rhee and his associates, Susan Anderson with the Agricultural Experiment Station, and Dr. Peter J. Wan and Shio-Ling Chen with the Engineering Experiment Station, caution that the peanut cheese won't be in the super market tomorrow.

However, this new product has so many good qualities that they're confident it will find ready acceptance with consumers when it's perfected.

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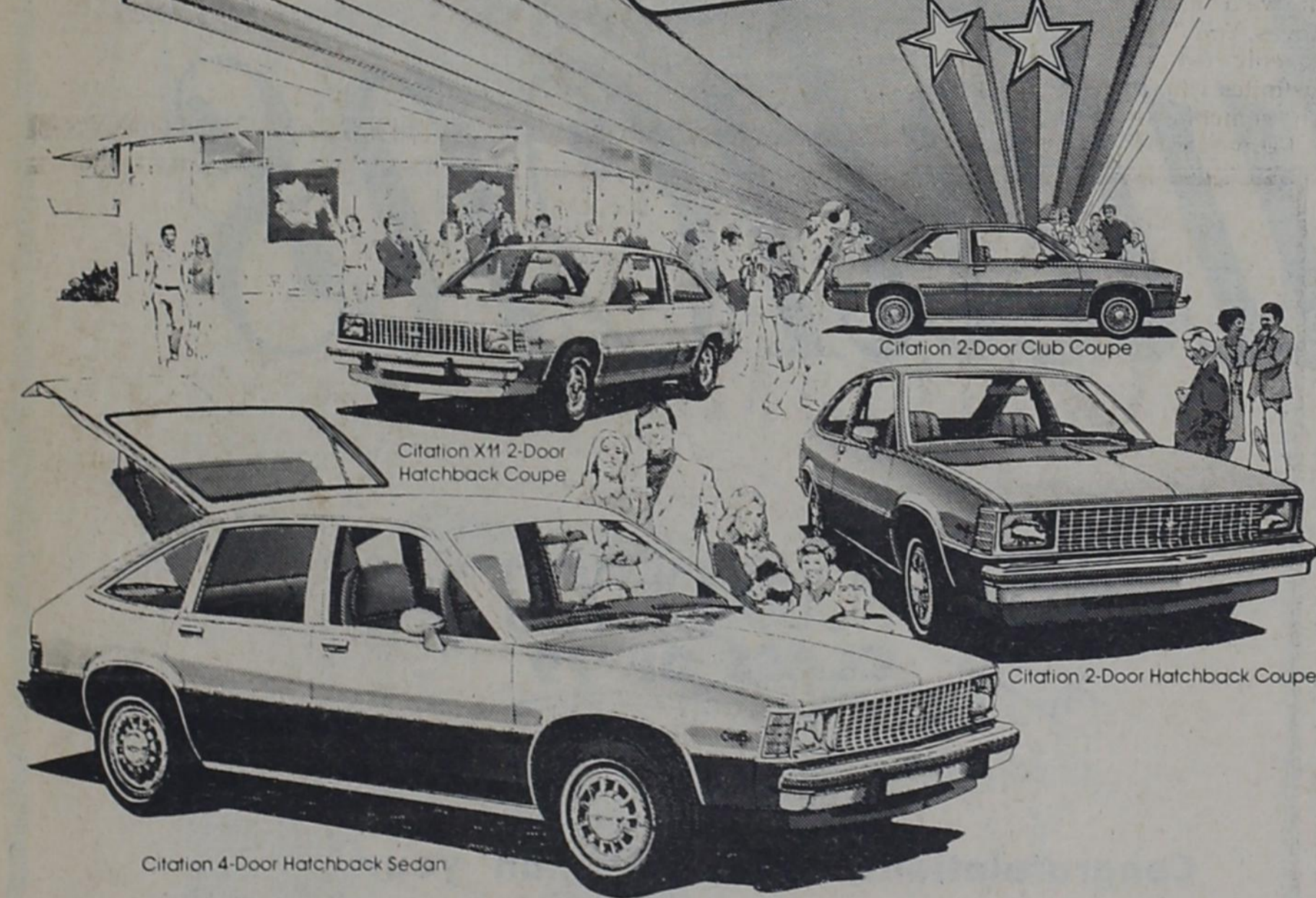

### Congressional Comment

Washington, D.C.—The most complicated language of them all is not Russian, or Latin, or Greek. In fact the most difficult language in the world is all too familiar to Americans during this time of year. I am referring to that compilation of prolific verbosity known as the Internal Revenue Code. The following is subsection 1023(b)(1) which illustrates my point: If \$60,000 exceeds the aggregate bases (as determined after any adjustment under subsection (h)

or (c) of carryover basis property, the basis of each appreciated carryover basis property (after any adjustment under subsection (h) or (c) shall be increased by an amount which bears the same ratio to the amount of such excess as the net appreciation in value to such property, bears to the net appreciation in value of all such property.

This subsection is part of what is known as the carryover basis provisions of estate tax valuation. The name carryover

basis is indeed a misnomer. It should have been called the Accountants and Lawyers full employment act. Much of this section is impossible to understand and lends itself to a substantial amount of litigation.

Before 1977 the income tax basis of property acquired from a decedent's estate was its fair market value on the date of death. Property that had appreciated in value from point of acquisition to date of death received a "step-up" in income tax basis. But this method was too simple and logical. So the Congress in 1976 passed the carryover basis which carried over the decedent's basis to his estate. Thus the heirs will pay capital gains taxes from the time the property was bought by the decedent until the inherited property is sold. Also the law is written with a number of exceptions and some areas are vague and subject to bureaucratic and judicial interpretation. This provision is scheduled to be implemented in 1980 and will significantly increase taxes for nearly all citizens. Those especially hard hit would be our farmers and small businessmen. People who inherit farm real estate will really feel the pinch because the price of farm land has appreciated rapidly in recent years.

While a necessary change was being attempted to increase deductions and exemptions for estate tax purposes, the carryover basis was attached as a sort of "reform" measure. But the provisions of this law have caused such a public outcry that even the Congressman who originally sponsored this bill is now interested in its repeal. I also believe we should stop the implementation of the carryover basis and preserve the simpler and less burdensome "step-up" basis. I have cosponsored legislation to accomplish this goal. This would be a major step toward preventing more government regulation, paperwork, and taxes and preserve the right to private ownership of property.

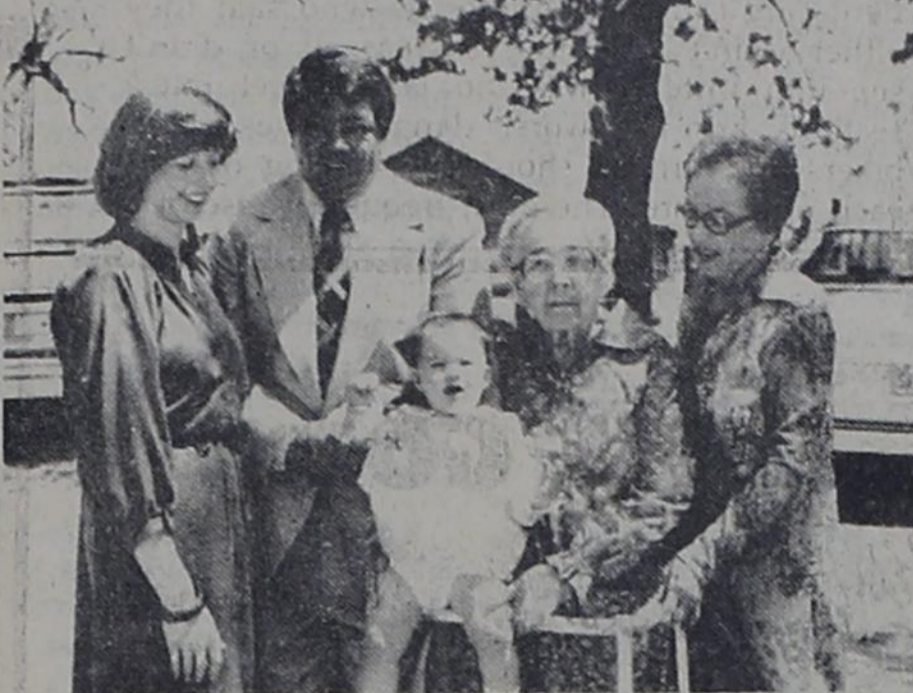

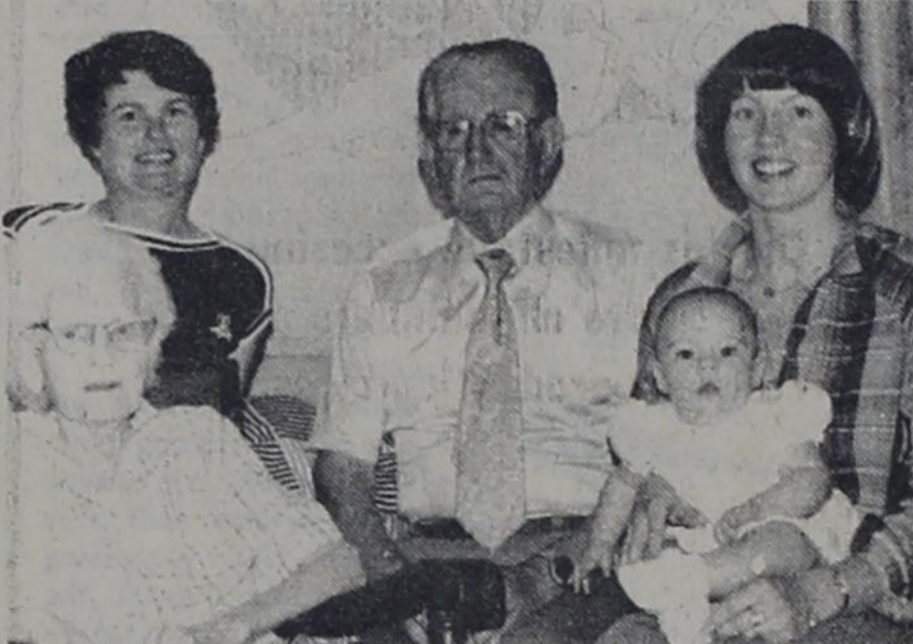

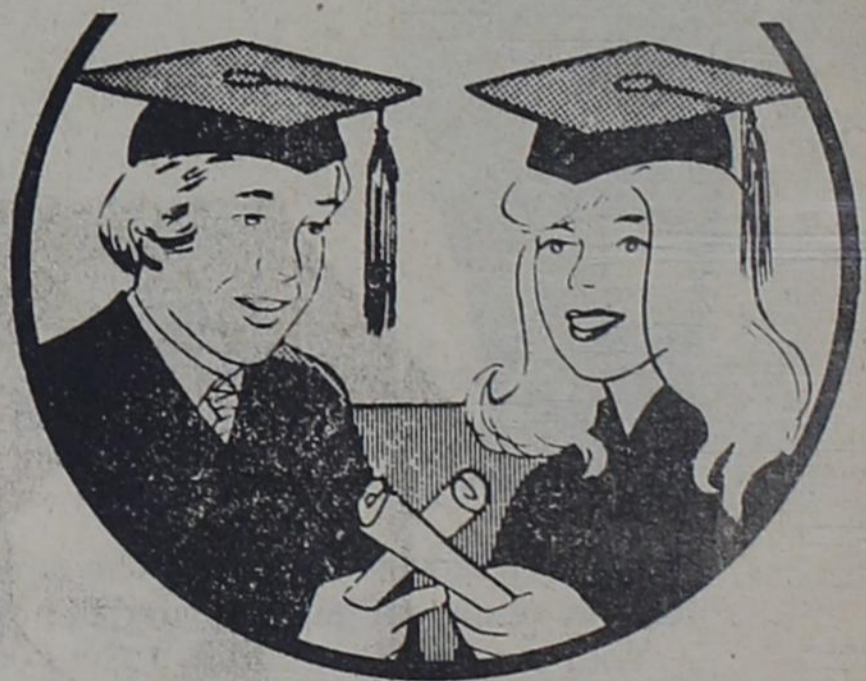

**SIZE STANDARDS EFFECTIVE JULY 15**

"Use up your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15," Sectional Center Manager/Postmaster JACK D. WATSON reminds customers. That is the date when the Postal Service's new size standards become effective.

The Fort Worth postmaster said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3 1/2 inches high or inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmaster WATSON said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new standards, few retailers should still be selling undersized pieces.

"Many consumers, however, are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of station-

The regulations also prohibit flimsy cards. In the future they must be at least seven thousandths (.007) of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of nine thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, the letter of others can also be damaged.

The standards also effect oversized and odd-shaped pieces of mail, WATSON said. For first-class mail weighing one ounce or less, there will be a surcharge of 7 cents for pieces more than 6 1/8th inches high or 11 1/2 inches long.

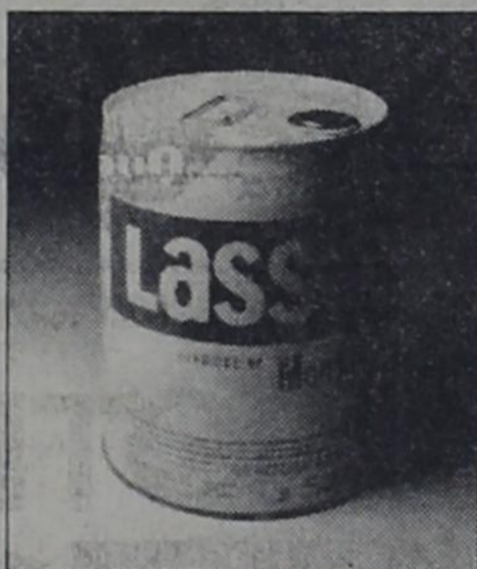

Since coming to Eastland County eight months ago, Waites has supervised 4-H programs and has been a leader in adult education in areas of swine, dairy animals and horses.

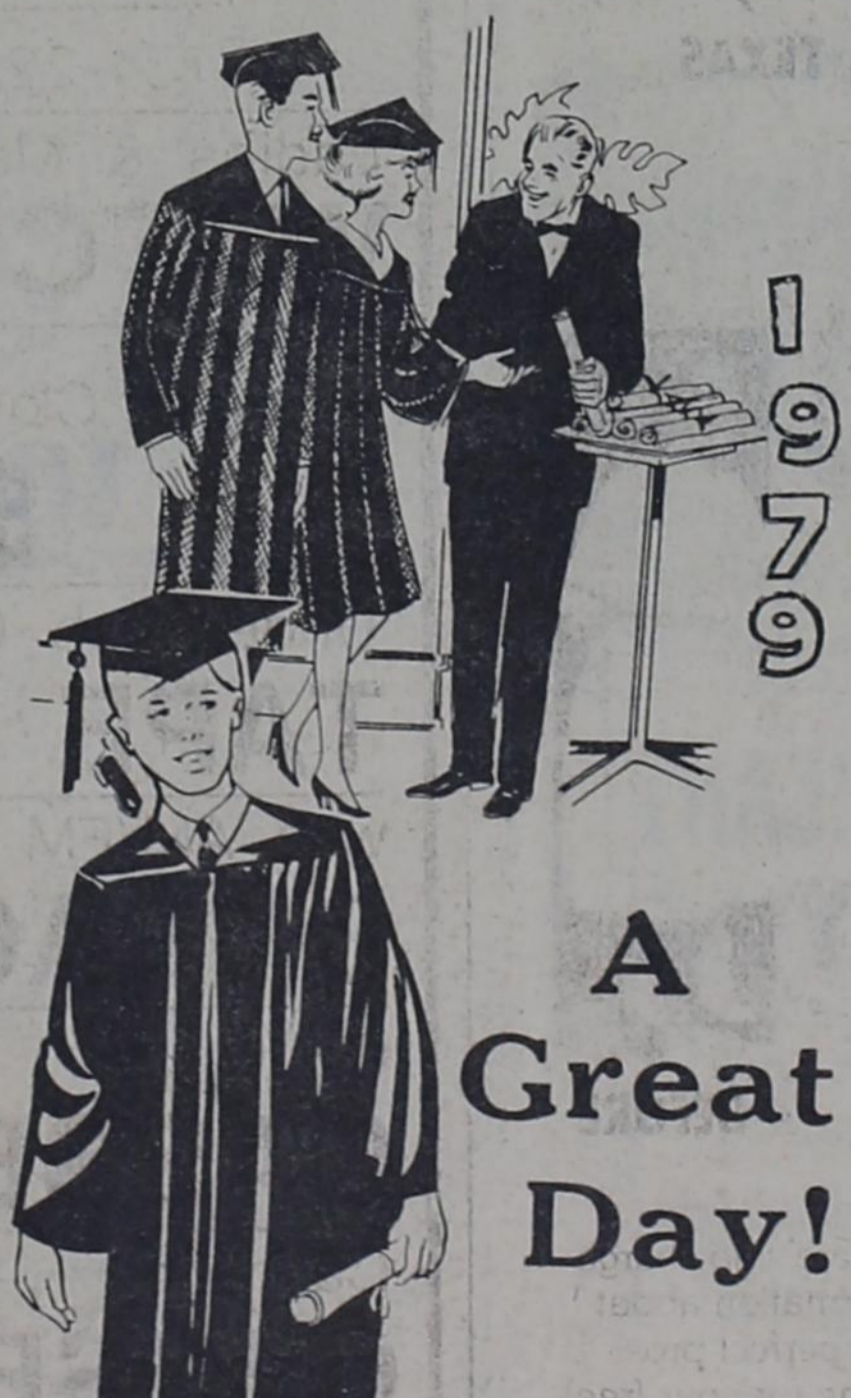
Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey said that District Agent John Bursleson of Stephenville will submit an applicant to fill Waites' vacancy.

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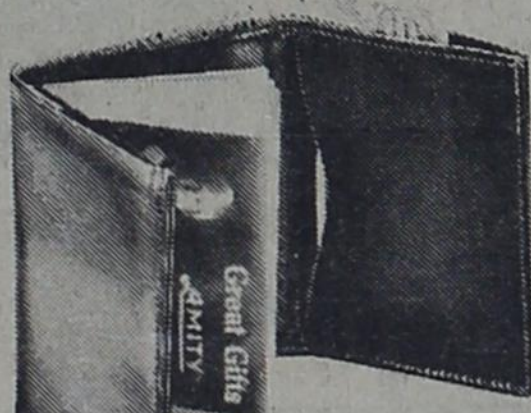

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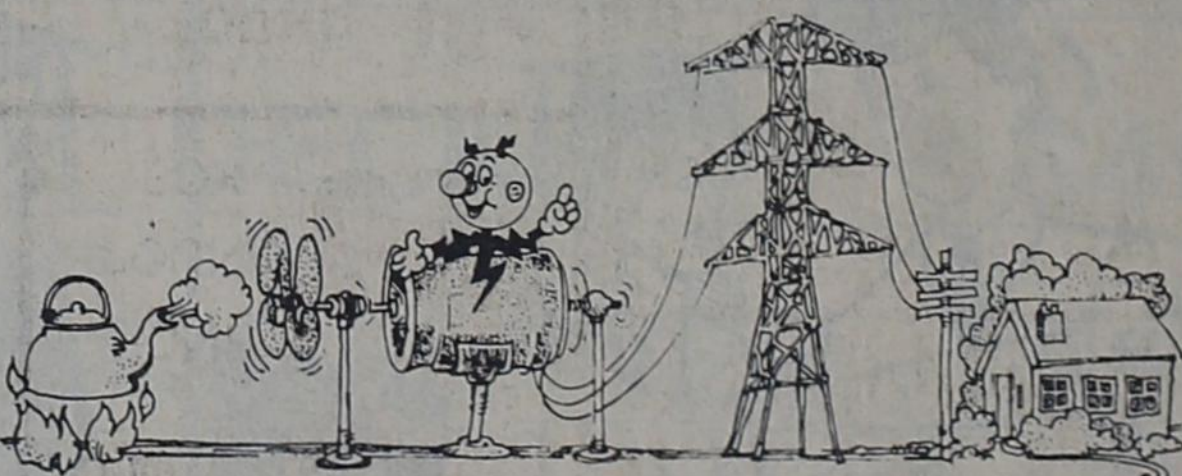
