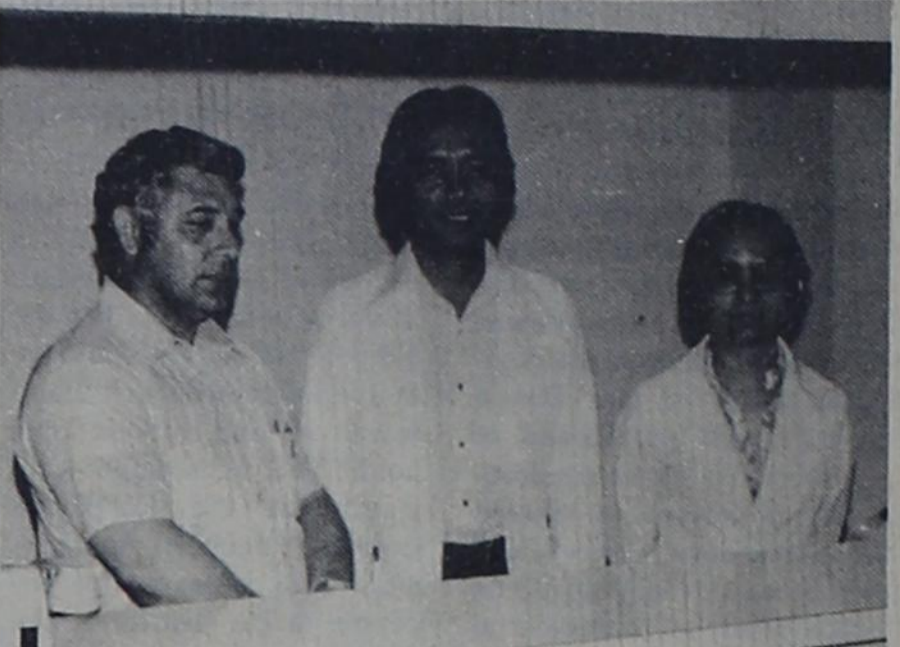

PLEASE CONSIDER THIS AMENDMENT

The Central theme of my campaign will be an amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America that will read as follows:

No person can hold the same public office in the United States of America for a period of more than eight years consecutively, except that the Senators of the United States Government and the Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States shall be allowed to serve twelve years consecutively, if they are re-elected or appointed to so serve; and that those now holding public office shall be immune to this provision as long as they

are re-elected to or remain in the office they now hold. The term public office shall be interpreted to mean all public offices in local, state and federal governments, whether elective or appointive, whether legislative, administrative, judicial or clerical.

It is not the new men in politics that are causing high taxes, low out-put, and a decline in morals and ethics in our governments. It's the old political bosses who have thoroughly entrenched themselves in the offices they hold. They campaign constantly at the tax-payers expense. Each of them is allowed to do favors for key people in his district at the tax-payers expense and to

receive campaign contributions in anticipation of future favors. He is allowed to send masses of propaganda to the folks back home on official paper at the tax payers expense. The government and defense plant workers in his area are taught that he is providing their jobs and they must support him. Others are taught that that he is dependent on him for excessive welfare, food stamps and special government loans. The news media is programmed to give him credit in his district for all the good things that happen and to blame the bad on someone else or on some remote circumstance. They must give him constant and free advertising in the news and editorial columns.

It matters little how well he represents what we, the American people, want in our governments or what condition our governments are in under his participation, the voters will go to the polls, well indoctrinated with the feeling that if they don't vote for him, good things will no longer happen - - - and the bad things are already beyond our influence.

Throughout my life, I have heard people say that we ought to have a law that would limit the time a person can stay in the same public office; a law that would give new men a chance at the office and give lesser office holders a chance to move up without waiting for someone to die. The amendment that we are promoting is such a law. It will assure us that we will not be victims of long-term, devious and deceptive propaganda, when we go to the polls, and that when we elect new men to represent us, they will not have to contend with the arrogance of the old power-oriented politicians' seniority system.

We will start to have balanced budgets; foreign relations that we can be proud of; an intelligent tax reform, with reasonable taxes; an equitable social security program that is not being drained by irresponsible give-aways; a welfare program that will help those who need it and put the rest to work; an economy that operates on real money; an educational system that will no longer be distorted by obscure powers; military forces superior enough to command peace; independence from world government; an end to our government reporting shortages in our everyday commodities, year after year, swindling us into paying higher prices, when there is no shortage; - - and so forth. It is not possible to name all the problems in our governments that need to be and will be corrected when we can replace the Washington controlled machine with men who will represent America.

GASOHOL BILL PASSES SENATE

AUSTIN — The Texas Senate passed legislation by a vote of 28-0 legislation legalizing the production of alcohol in Texas for fuels. House Bill 1986 authored by State Representative Bill Keese (D-Somerville) and sponsored in the Texas Senate by Valley State Senator Raul Longoria (D-Edinburg) is legislation vital to the development of alcohol fuel facilities, such as gasohol, in Texas.

The legislation creates a new permit in the Alcoholic Beverage Code allowing for the production of gasohol. Currently, the alcohol portion of gasohol has been prohibited in the State for more than forty years. Under a changing energy situation, the law presents a barrier to the development of gasohol in Texas. Already shortages are being experienced in some parts of the nation. Texas is currently experiencing some diesel fuel shortages.

The legislation was one of two bills by Keese to remove existing institutional barriers to gasohol. House Bill 2068 which would allow the construction of large-scale gasohol facilities in Texas met strong opposition from the Liquor Lobby in the State Capitol. Current Texas law requires that a holder of a liquor permit be a Texas citizen or if a corporation, that the corporation be 51% Texas-owned. Holders of beer permits are exempted from this provision.

"The Liquor Lobby just did not realize that they were standing squarely in front of gasohol's future in Texas", Keese related. "They learned the error of their ways though. We had almost every agricultural commodity association and farm organization in the State behind this bill."

Keese stated that the Lobby relented upon a strong

showing and counter-lobbying by the agricultural community.

The Texas Senate amended House Bill 1986 to include the very important elements in Keese's other legislation. It was a real community effort."

Agricultural Commissioner Reagan Brown had previously endorsed both pieces of legislation and worked behind the scenes for passage of the legislation, as did Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale.

"Had we not been able to amend HB 1986 to include HB 2068," Keese stated, "we would have lost a \$15 million federal loan guarantee for a pilot gasohol facility in the Rio Grande Valley." The Valley gasohol pilot plant is expected to generate 470 jobs in the community of Santa Rosa, Texas, \$330,000 in State and local taxes, and \$26.5 million to the local economy, according to data supplied by the Texas Industrial Commission.

The Commission's director, Gerald Brown, further reports that should ten percent of the total motor fuels market in Texas become gasohol, the impact on Texas would amount to 6,000 workers employed directly in gasohol and would require 79 additional gasohol facilities the same size as the Valley plant.

Mr. Brown further stated that although "there is no short term solution to the current energy problem, the development of an in-state alcohol plant and a gasohol program would help diversify the Texas industrial economy, create stable employment for the state farm community and provide a domestic source of clean energy". "Furthermore, substantial benefits would accrue to the State and Nation in terms of reduced reliance on imported crude and reduced balance of payments on the foreign trade account."

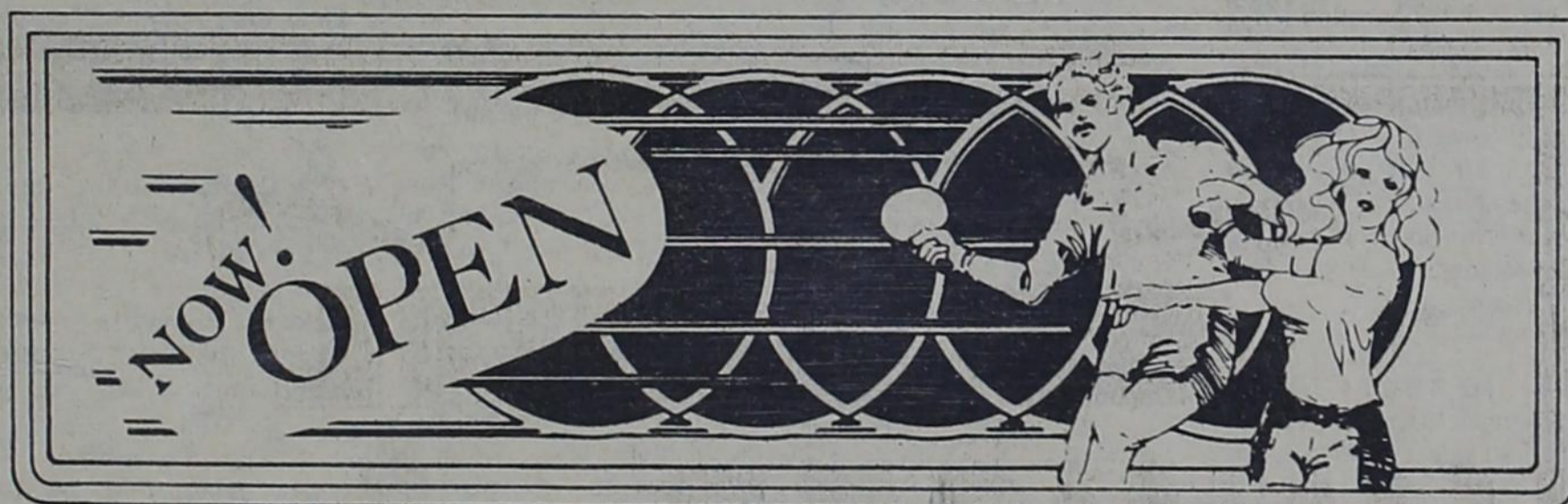

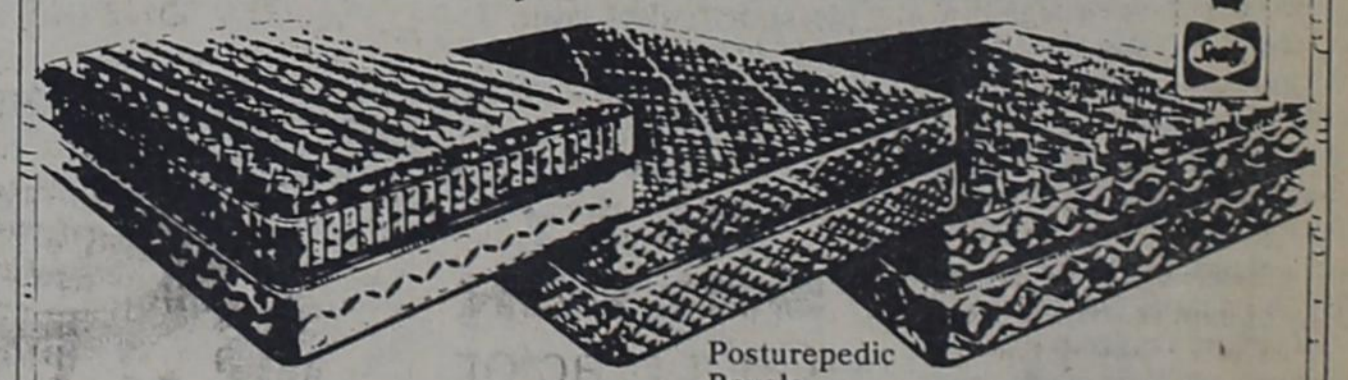

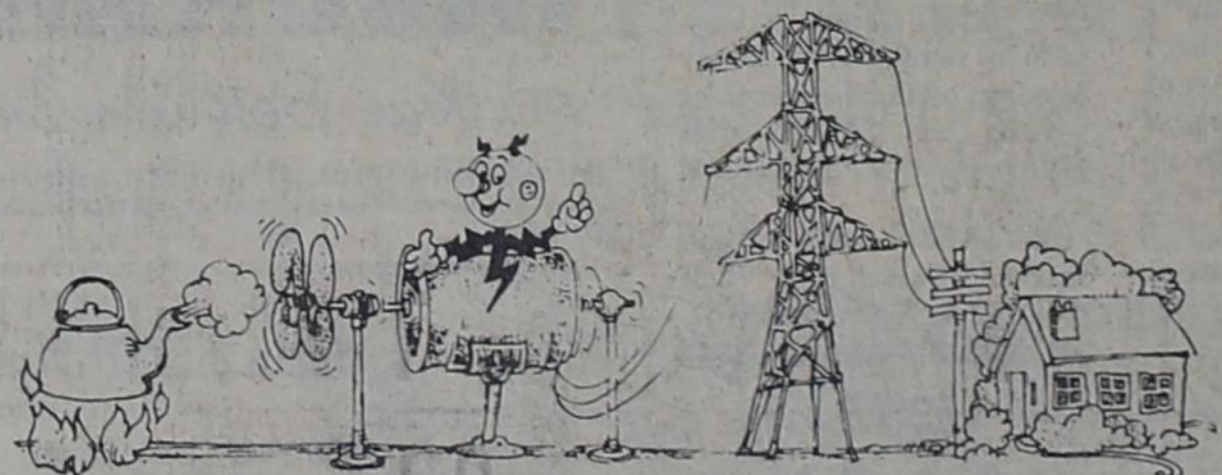
