According to action taken on Tuesday night at the called meeting of the Hospital District the citizens of our area WILL have ambulance service. The Board voted to accept the responsibility of operation of the ambulance.  
The City Commissioners had voted at their meeting on Thursday morning to cooperate in the ambulance project and passed the following resolution:

"If the Blackwell Hospital will provide the Ambulance along with all the personnel to properly operate same, the City will furnish all gasoline and oil used in the Ambulance (for ambulance purposes only) as well as all other normal maintenance and repairs, NOT including damage caused by abuse or an accident (wreck). This agreement will be effective for a period of six (6) months ONLY, and at the end of the six months period, the Blackwell Hospital agrees to furnish the City with an accurate report as to how many times the Ambulance was used during the six months pilot period as well as the total amount of revenue the Hospital collected during said time, as well as the amount that had not been collected. The City will keep a record of the total miles driven during this six month period, as well as to the total cost of all operating expense. This six month period will provide the City with the information they need before entering into any kind of a permanent Ambu-

He is now able to be an out patient until a heart is available. They think it will not be too long until they have a heart. He is the only patient waiting for a heart of his blood type. He has a very common blood type and the donor has to weigh more than the person receiving the heart and Guy only weighs 120 pounds now, so with his age, he has a lot of things in his favor. We are greatly encouraged.  
Words are inadequate to express our appreciation for the help being given to Guy in this trying time and hope everyone will be richly blessed for their kindness.  
We feel that with so many people hoping and praying for his recovery that he can't help but come through O.K.

## HOSPITAL BOARD OKAYS AMBULANCE

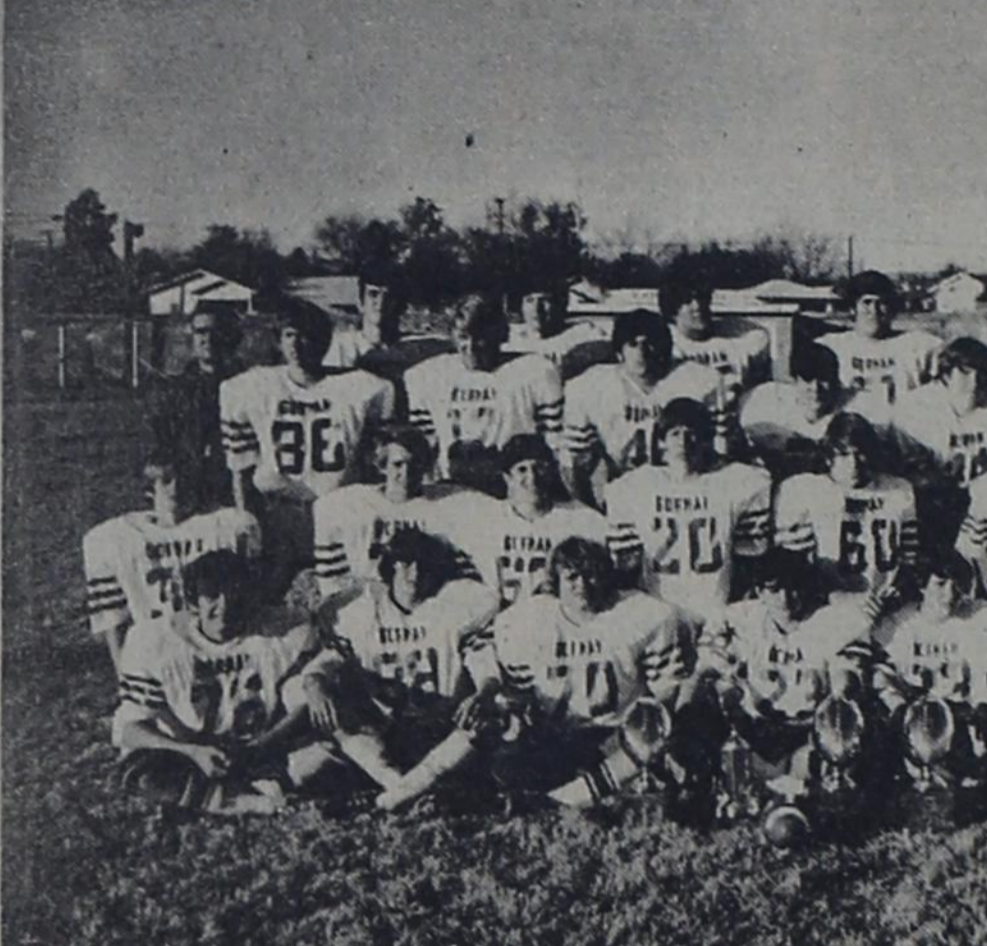

A motion was passed by unanimous vote of the Board to provide the ambulance service needed by the Gorman area with the assistance of the Gorman City Council. The motion called for the city to provide fuel, oil, maintenance and insurance for the ambulance; the hospital will supply the personnel through hospital personnel and volunteers. **The Speaker Reports**

AUSTIN—In compliance with House Bill 1126 of the last legislative session, the Governor's Office of Educational Resources has compiled and released market value figures for all property in Texas, as well as legislative recommendations. The Governor's Office undertook this project over a year ago and has produced a product that will receive considerable attention for some time.

Included in the recommendation is proposed legislation. The bill which has been released contains two major elements: provisions for changes in the public school finance system and provisions for the establishment of uniform property assessment practices. These sections deserve careful thought by legislators and citizens alike so that the best possible plan can be developed.

A look at the proposed bill from the Governor's Office, which has a price tag of approximately \$850 million, reflects a desire to reduce local property taxes while adding more State money to public education. The local fund assignment would be reduced, and at the same

time, the value of property assessments would increase.

This increase would offset any dramatic decreases in property taxes. However, the tax rate would drop to about 9 cents per \$100 from the 35 cents per \$100 rate set by House Bill 1126. As a result, the local share of education funding would be reduced, and the State would contribute a greater share of the funds. An additional \$640 million would be funneled into the foundation school program, and this change would create a State share of about 90 percent of the foundation program. In addition \$50 million is budgeted for maintenance and operation expenses of the schools.

A more liberal equalization aid formula has also been proposed. The package would cost a total of about \$100 million for the biennium. The philosophy behind this approach is to bring the less wealthy districts up to a more acceptable level without placing much spending constraint on wealthier districts.

Although tax limits have been proposed for both maintenance and operation and

**Carbon School Gets Certificate Exceptional Merit**

The Carbon Independent School has received a certificate of Exceptional Merit and has been placed on the National School Safety Honor Roll of the National Safety Council, Superintendent Marshall S. Hickman announced last week.

This is the first year that the Carbon School has received this honor.

"We are encouraged by this recognition of our efforts to build a good safety education program," Mr. Hickman said. "We will continue to teach our young people to protect themselves and their fellow students as long as accidents remain the chief cause of death among school age children." The Honor Roll was initiated in 1944. To gain a place on it, a school must present a detailed report of its safety program to a local committee, composed of the school principal, the president of the local Parent-Teachers Association or similar parent group, a student leader, and the president of the local safety council or the school's safety education supervisor. Upon the recommendation of this committee, the report is forwarded to the National Safety Council to be listed on the Honor Roll.

capital improvements, the caps do not seem to be stringent enough to really prohibit school districts from increasing their property taxes in view of their increased revenue-producing ability due to the rise in property values.

Other education issues are addressed in the proposed bill. An accountability and renewal system at a cost of \$10 million has been included. This system would provide for a management information system, an improved accreditation process, and other such procedures. Transportation funding is revised and would cost \$25 million. The "hold harmless" formula for districts under 1,000 students in average daily attendance would cost about \$15 million.

The other major part of the proposal concerning assessment practices provides for several significant changes and new developments. This section would set up a School Tax Assessment Board with six members appointed by the Governor with the approval of the Senate.

Minimum standards for operating the school tax offices are included as well as sanctions for noncompliance. There are many specifics on contracting, reporting, confidentiality and other items included.

Certainly, it can be seen that there is a concern for reform in our property tax assessment system and a belief that uniform practices would result in fair and equitable tax administration.

The basic design of this bill corresponds with my priorities of reducing property taxes and providing more State funds for public education. However, I do not believe the Governor's bill goes far enough in truly creating tax relief for property owners, or in producing equity between school districts. With more State funding and stricter caps on local spending, more fairness could be achieved in financing public education.

All interested persons are invited to enter baked items for judging. Baked foods must contain pecans and be entered by 11 a.m. on Friday, December 10th. Cash awards and ribbons for the Pecan Bake Show are being sponsored by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

The Eastland County Pecan Grower's Association is sponsoring the ribbons and cash awards for the adult and youth divisions of the Pecan Centerpiece Arrangement Show.

Rules for the Adult division of the Pecan Bake Show are as follows:

- ADULT DIVISION:**
- There shall be six divisions of products with requirements for each:  
Pies...must enter one whole pie  
Cakes...must enter one whole cake  
Candy...must enter at least 12 pieces  
Nut Bread...must enter one whole loaf  
Cookies...must enter at least 12

  - Anyone, man or woman from this county may enter an arrangement in the show.
  - All entries must be entered and in place by 11:00 a.m. when the judging will begin on December 10th.
  - The arrangements must remain in place until Saturday, December 11th. Arrangements must be claimed no later than 2 p.m. on December 11th.
  - Centerpieces and arrangements must be original and created in 1976.

**YOUTH DIVISION:**

- Any youth (ages 9 to 19 years old) from this county may enter an arrangement in the show.
- All rules listed above for the adult division shall apply for the youth division. There will be three prizes given to the top three entries as follows: First—\$5.00, Second—\$2.50, and Third—\$1.50.

**JUNIOR DIVISION:**

- There shall be six divisions of products with a requirement for each:  
a. Pies...one whole pie  
b. cakes...one whole cake  
c. candy...twelve pieces  
d. nut bread...one loaf  
e. cookies...twelve cookies  
f. snack items...(dips, cheese rolls, etc. No sugar snacks. Must enter whole recipe or ample portion for judging and display. Food entered as a snack cannot be entered in the above five baked food divisions. Suggested pecan snack items would include coated or salted nuts, party appetizers, etc.

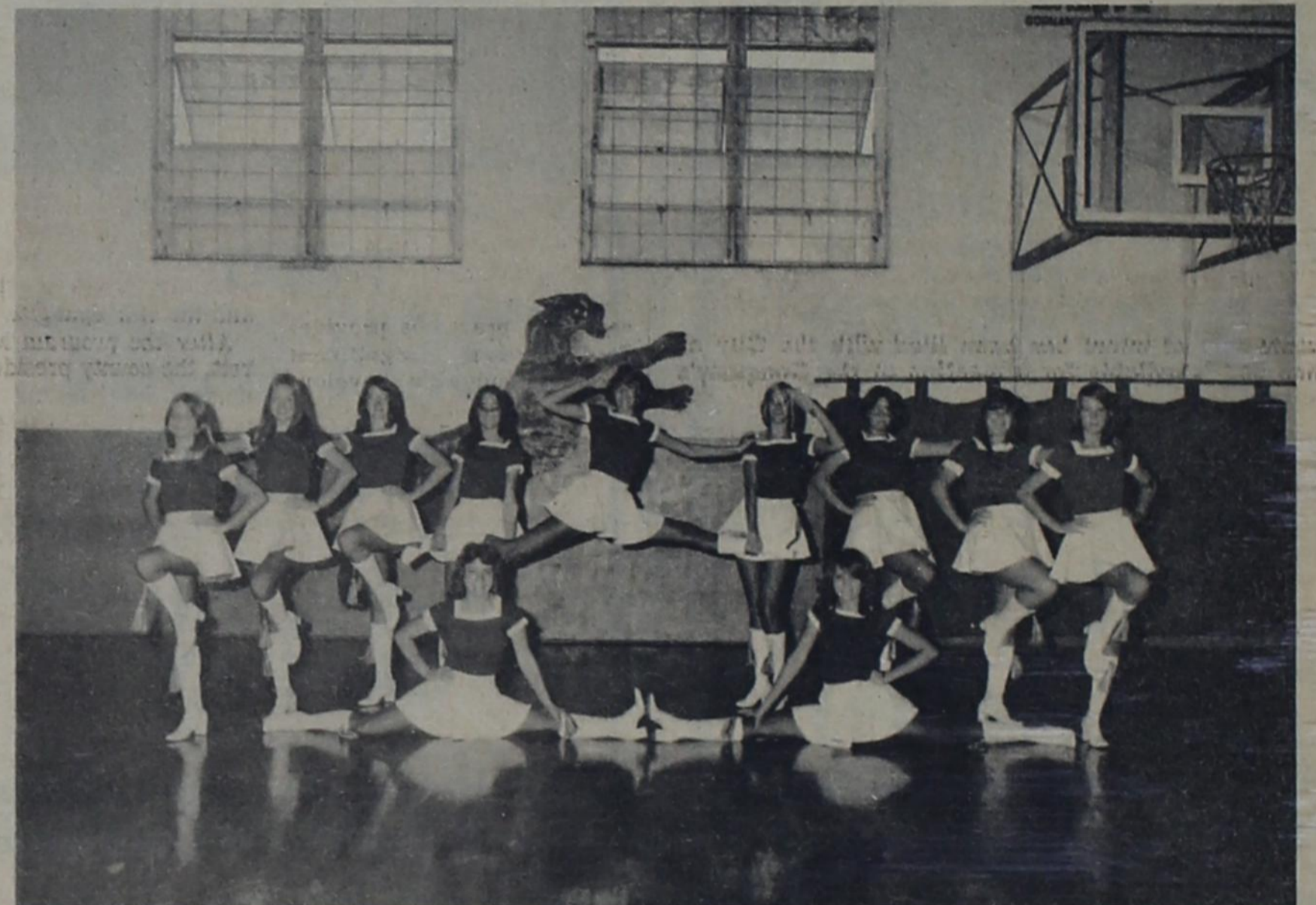

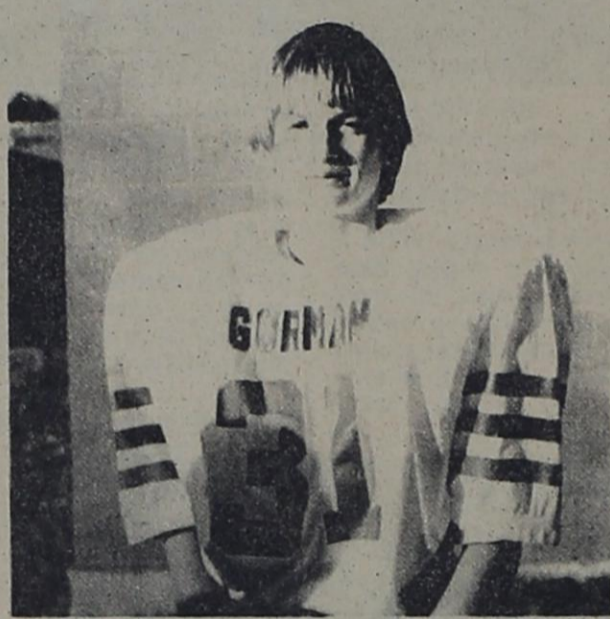

**Pecan And Bake Show To Be Fri.-Sat.**

The Eastland County Pecan and Pecan Bake Show will be held for the 24th consecutive year next Friday and Saturday. The show will be in the country courthouse in Eastland. The announcement was made jointly by the County Pecan Growers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the event. James Wright, Manager of the Chamber of Commerce, says the pecan show will include about 200 entries of top quality pecan exhibits, a pecan baked show and pecan centerpiece show. He says the

variety may be exhibited in the show. The pecans must have been grown in 1976 and interbred by the family who grew them. Everyone who owns at least one pecan tree is invited to enter and exhibit pecans. The entry deadline is 5:00 p.m. Thursday, December 9. Entries may be brought to the courthouse Thursday afternoon or may be left at the county Extension agent's office at anytime. They may also be left at the Chamber of Commerce offices in Ranger and Cisco any time before December 9.

Pecans are judged on the basis of size, percent kernel, quality of kernel and attractiveness of the pecan. Natives, variety seedlings and named varieties may be entered in the show. A grower may enter one entry of each named variety and as many different entries of natives and seedlings as he chooses. Entries winning first, second, and third will be sent to the regional

pecan show in Dallas. Ribbons will be awarded to exhibitors who have first, second and third place entries. Plaques will be awarded to the exhibitors of the champion shelling pecans, champion in shell pecans and champion natives. Rosettes will be awarded to reserve champions. Ribbons will also be given for the smallest pecans and the largest pecans entered.

The chamber of commerce and pecan growers invite everyone to come and see the exhibits Friday and Saturday morning. Pecan judges will be

## County Farm Income \$14½ Million

The market value of all agricultural products sold by the 1,168 farms in Eastland

County in 1974 amounted to \$14,511,000, according to a preliminary report of the 1974 Census of Agriculture released today by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census. Production expenses on these farms totaled \$12,619,000 in 1974.

The figures are for farms qualifying under the definition first used in the 1959 Census of Agriculture: A farm includes all agricultural operations conducted at any time during the census year under the control of an individual management, provided that sales of agricultural products amounted to, or normally would amount to, at least \$250 for places of less than 10 acres or \$50 for places of 10 acres or more.

Figures for farms with sales of \$2,500 or more are shown for 1974 and 1969. These farms accounted for \$14,028,000 of all agricultural products sold in 1974 and \$10,444,000 in 1969.

There were 693 of these farms in 1974 compared with 725 in 1969. The average size decreased from 588 to 568 acres during the five years. The value per acre increased from \$130 to \$220 raising the average value per farm from \$76,352 to \$125,049.

PANAMA CITY, Fla. — Air National Guard Technical Sergeant James A. Craig, son of Mrs. W. S. Craig, Sr. of Desdemona, Texas, is participating in William Tell '76 - a world-wide weapons competition conducted by the Aerospace Defense Command at Tyndall AFB, Fla.

Sergeant Craig, a radio technician at Ellington AFB, Tex., will represent the 147th Fighter Interceptor Group.

The purpose of the meet is to evaluate flying and support personnel, demonstrate the capabilities of fighter-interceptor aircraft and check air-to-air weapons systems. Teams from four countries, eight states and four U. S. Air Force major commands with an air defense mission will be competing for top honors. Aircrews will fly the F-105 Delta Dart, the F-4 Phantom and the F-101 Voodoo.

The sergeant is a 1951 graduate of Gorman High School. His wife, Lula, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Welch of Route 2, Gorman.

#### EMS Program Need Increases

As a result of the Gorman Emergency Medical Services (EMS) program, the level of training of emergency personnel has increased substantially.

The only State requirement for ambulance personnel is Red Cross first aid training; however, with the wide-spread growth of EMS, professionalism is becoming the self-imposed standard.

Only three years ago, the State had 2,728 Emergency Care Attendants (ECAs), 2,762 Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) and no means for examining and registering Paramedics. Today those registered numbers have increased to 4,493 ECAs, 3,961 EMTs and 427 Paramedics.

Kim V. Cockerham is a trained EMT with Higginbotham Funeral Home ambulance service. In addition, Helen Mardie True (EMT), also serves the Gorman area.

The advanced training has enhanced initial emergency care, and more and more hospital emergency department people are taking the extra hours of education to better prepare themselves for emergency medical care.

The difference between each of these levels of training is the number of hours of classroom and emergency duty required for certification and the medical care services each group can perform.

The initial level of this training is that of an Emergency Care Attendant (ECA). This person has had 24 to 30 hours of training and has passed testing by the Texas Department of Health Resources. The Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) receives 80 hours of classroom and laboratory training, 40 hours of hospital emergency duty and is tested for skills and knowledge. EMTs can monitor patients' vital signs and professionally provide temporary care for injuries. Emergency Medical Technician-Paramedics receive 280 to 400 hours of training in addition to basic EMT training. Their course of study includes classroom and hospital work. They are qualified to administer drugs under the direction of a physician and can handle more elaborate injuries and illnesses.

All levels of trained technicians are professionals in health care. They can perform most of the procedures necessary to sustain life and minimize discomfort prior to reaching the hospital.
