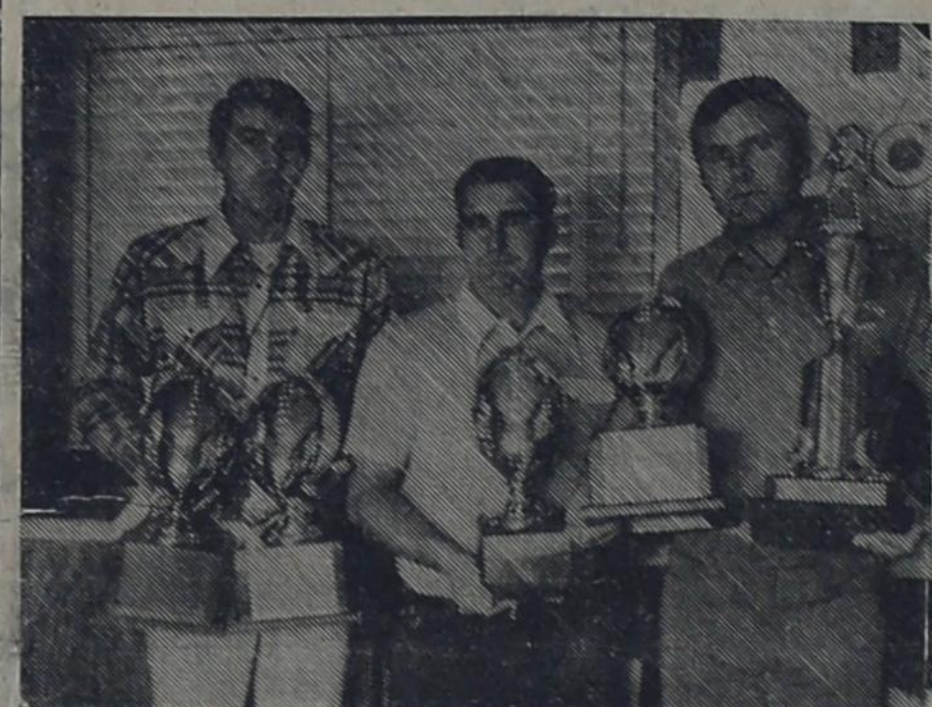
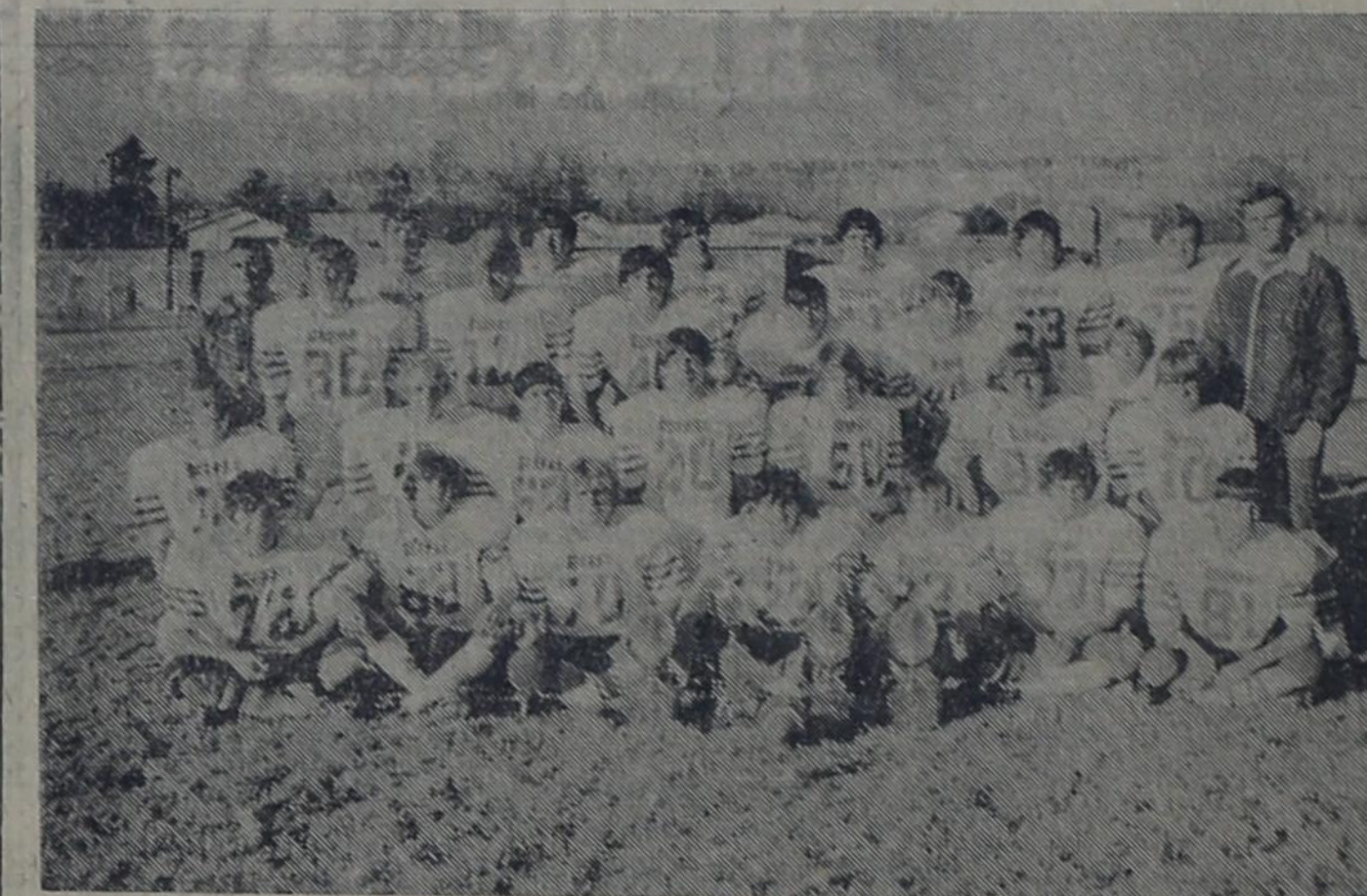

'Twas not a fit night for man nor beast, but, nevertheless, there were about 1500 hearty fans who withstood all the elements to cheer on their teams. The two teams had to play in this impossible type of circumstances and in no way could they perform to their expectations. In terms of playing conditions, it was "worse than worse." We do, however, think that both ball clubs played fine ball considering the circumstances.

For the Panther fans, however, it turned out to be a beautiful night, for the Panthers had ended a perfect season (14-0) and had accomplished something that only happens maybe once in a lifetime, winning the State Class B Championship by the score of 18 to 6.

The hero of this game would surely have to be "good ole No. 23" Blaine Gibbs, as he seemed to run real great in the mud and really broke the game open in the second half

with two touchdown runs. It was a marvelous performance by Blaine.

Of course, there were several heroes who performed outstanding duties on the defense for the Panthers. There was Jack Jackson, Chuck Troutman, Stacy Webb, Doug Warren, Charles White, Ed Cox, Steve Keith, Larry Keith, Clifford Lewis, Randy Barnes, Blaine Gibbs, Mel Maxfield, Ricky Troutman, Jamie Snider, Bobby Jay, and Billy Burgess. Also adding support were Ricky Townley, Steve Watson, Marty Carr Jeff Bowling, Riley Curb, Randy Laminack, Randy Seaton, Tim Swanner, Revise Laminack, and even the managers, Danny Burgess and James Creed.

This whole year has been one of total effort on the part of ALL the players, and folks, that's what it takes to have such an outstanding football team, such as we have had now for the past couple of seasons, and especially this season. Also lets give credit where credit is due, and that's to Coach Gibbs and Coach Ables for the marvelous job they do with our youth, not only on the football field, but also in the "game of life".

The Panthers and Badgers played on even terms through a good part of the first quarter before Ben Bolt was forced to punt the ball. Mel Maxfield ran the punt back for 74 yards to set the Panthers up with a first and goal at the one. The tough Ben Bolt defense held the Big Red on three tries at the line, but on the fourth down play, Billy Burgess just wasn't to be denied as he rammed in from the one yard line with 5:16 in the quarter. The kick for point failed and Gorman had a 6-0 lead.

This score held up until the middle of the second quarter. The Panthers held the Badgers and took over the ball at the 12 yard line. On a fine play that gained good yardage on first down, the Pan-

thers were called for holding and were penalized back to their 6. After a couple of plays had netted almost nothing, the Panthers tried a pass from the end zone, and with the weather conditions so bad, the ball slipped in the hand of Maxfield, who was throwing to an open receiver and was intercepted by Rolando Gutierrez and returned to the Gorman two yard line. From there quarterback Manuel Amador went over his right guard for the tying touchdown with 7:38 left in the half. The pass try for two points failed and the score was tied 6-6.

This score stood up through the first half, but the Panthers came out all fired up in the third quarter and put the game out of reach with two fine touchdown runs by Gibbs. Steve Keith really belted Michael Gonzales with a jarring tackle on the second half kickoff, causing a fumble and he recovered it for the Panthers on the Ben Bolt 35. This drive failed to produce a score as Gorman fumbled.

The Badgers gave the Panthers a fine break with a fumble on the Ben Bolt 38 yard line five plays later and the Big Red machine drove the distance for the go-ahead TD. Blaine Gibbs scored on a dive play, which saw him break into the clear ran ramble for 27 yards. Burgess tried a run for the two-pointer but failed and the Panthers went ahead 12 to 6 with just 3:59 left in the third period.

Another Badger bobble gave the Panthers the ball on the Ben Bolt 46 and the Big Red drove for the insurance score. Ironically this came just as the public address announcer had told the crowd that De Leon had just upset Seagraves 21 to 12.

It took only 10 plays to score the tally with the fine blocking up front for the Panthers as they started opening nice holes. The big play was a fourth down keeper play by Maxfield that set Gorman up at the six yard line, first and goal. Gibbs took a hand-off and went over the left side on the line for the score. The try for two points again failed and the score was 18 to 6. And that's the way the ball game ended, 18-6.

Both teams had planned on throwing the ball a lot but the weatherman took care of that idea. Ben Bolt completed only 1 pass for 11 yards in the game. The Badgers outtrused the Panthers 139 to 119 yards, however the big 74 yard run-back by Maxfield, and the fine running of Gibbs made the difference for the Big Red. Gibbs wound up rushing for 89 yards on 17 carries. Maxfield wound up with a minus 3 on 13 keeps. Burgess was held from his usual running

performance by the mud and also the fact that he was keyed on by the Ben Bolt defense. Steve Keith and Jack Jackson also carried the ball for the Panthers on occasion and made good yardage on plays straight up the middle.

Gorman is the first team in our section of the country to win the State Championship. So history has been made, and it has been a marvelous year for the fans and the football team. Something we will all never forget. And when you see one of the Panther players, thank him for a job well done, and for being one of the outstanding youth that we are blessed with in this community.

Take a break, Panthers, you really deserve it!

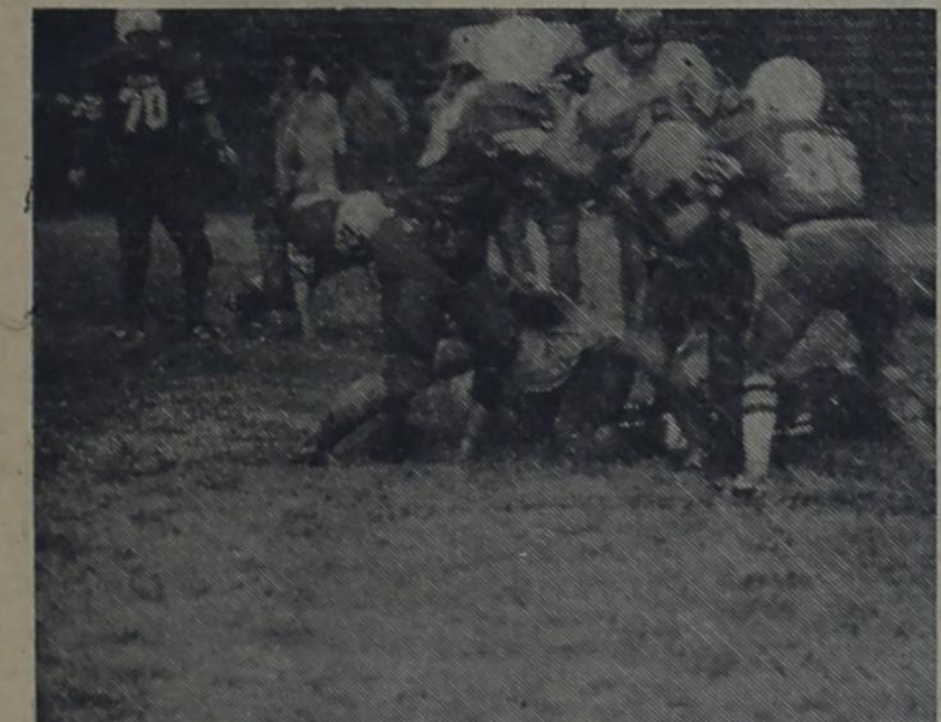

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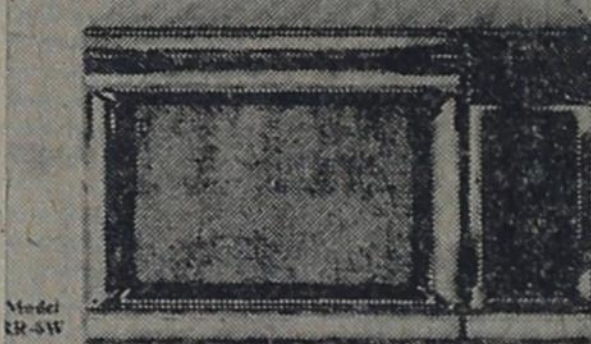

AN OPEN LETTER TO BIRDSONG EMPLOYEES AND THEIR FAMILIES:

We face a very important union election tomorrow. The election is so important to all of us that we should take time out to think about it seriously and to reason together before any ballots are cast. This is the purpose of this letter.

This election is extremely important because it not only affects Birdsong Peanuts and our employees, but our employees' families as well. The voters will decide whether or not the Teamster's union can speak and act for most of our employees. If a majority of the voters vote for the union, all of the employees in the unit will be bound by what it does or by what it does not do.

The Teamster's union and some of its supporters have had a lot to say, I'm sure, about rates of pay and benefits. What they say, I feel quite confident, appeals to many of you. It sounds real good, but let's examine the facts.

This union expects to make a living off you. It's their business. They sell memberships. They haven't invested a single cent in making a job for you. They are not going to pay you any wages, vacations, holidays, retirement, or insurance. In fact, they want you to pay them! Why should you pay a stranger to represent you?

Now, let's examine what Birdsong has. We have a going business and jobs for over 200 people. We have a large investment in plant and equipment. We have a desire to succeed and to keep you employed. We have permanency...Birdsong will be here long after the union goes...we are not a bunch of fly-by-nighters who are here today and gone tomorrow.

Our only source of security, wages, and benefits...yours and mine...is from all of us working together to build a successful company.

You create your own security by doing your job well. No one else, certainly not the union, can do this for you.

The union and its supporters have made some promises. How can they keep them? I tell you that the union cannot deliver on their promises...only the company can! The union doesn't have a plant or jobs for you. They are wrong when they say they can guarantee. The union can try to pull you out on strike to try to keep their promises and guarantees. Your job is put on the line. I doubt that is what you want!

Let me emphasize the fact that even if the union is voted in, the company does not have to give the union the things the organizers may have promised you. We would be obligated to bargain in good faith with the union, but under the law, we would be under no obligation "to agree to a proposal or make a concession". If we don't agree with the union's demands, the union may or may not use the "ultimate weapon"...the strike. If the union calls an economic strike, you could be called upon to leave your job and walk a picket line. A strike doesn't mean that the company has to give the union what it wants. We have the same right to operate our business as the union has to strike. You can be in danger of losing your job if you engage in an economic strike. The company has the right to replace you permanently, subject only to being hired if and when the replacements ever terminate. Naturally, the company does not pay strikers, and strikers are not even eligible to collect unemployment compensation. I doubt seriously if the union has told you these facts, but they are true, and you should think about them when you vote Friday.

The union's talk about big increases in wages and benefits is just "sucker" talk. Don't be fooled by it. Increases come out of profits...nowhere else. We have raised wages and added employee benefits as fast as we thought good business policies would justify. We haven't needed any outside help from a union to do that in the past, and we won't in the future. It has not taken the union to get the improved working conditions, higher wages, and other employee benefits you have received. You have not had to pay union initiation fees, monthly dues, fines, and assessments.

The future of the company is as good as we, working together as a team, make it. The union will tend to divide us...not help us. What is bad for the company cannot be good for our employees.

What about this union...the Teamsters? While we are not saying that Local 47 is corrupt or has ever engaged in lawless acts, they are subject to the Constitution and By-Laws of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. As we have shown you by newspaper and magazine articles, these International Teamster leaders have engaged in violence and other lawless acts. I just don't think you want to take a chance on having this type of leadership.

I would like to state very simply our company's union stand. It is our belief our company will do as much for you without a union as it will with a union. The company will do as much for you as it can.

I sincerely ask that you vote for yourself and for your family! Vote for Birdsong Peanuts! Vote "NO" on Friday!
