His lively, day-by-day
chronicle of one staunch fam-
ily, eking out a living in the
rural southwest, is both touch-
ing and down-to-earth in its
frank appeal. From outhouses
and train rides to religion
and politics, he recreates for
us the refreshing outlook of
a young boy struggling to
adapt in a world of "dirty
words" and missionary ladies
— typical incongruities one en-
counter in a small town at-
mosphere.

The excitement of train
stations, an overheated school
house, one's first look at an
automobile and fourth of July
picnics all come alive thru
the eyes of this little boy.
Small town politics take on a
colorful excitement as the
voters cast their ballots on
the Prohibition; and Satur-
day night movies with Char-
lie Chaplin are the highlight
of the week in the little town
of Gorman.

Gooberland Memories closes
on a prosperous era, when oil
wells were beginning to spout
and new wealth was being ac-
quired, though not for the
Mullins. The going had been
rough and many were strik-
ing it so filthy rich, that he
seems to express a kind of
awe rather than envy at the
rapid changes around him -
and perhaps a little fear.

"One young man in Gor-
man — became the most
wealthy man in America of
his age. He chartered a spe-
cial train and several of his
special friends went on a
sightseeing tour of New York
and other places, but he found
himself suddenly right back
where he started."

At the close of his mem-
ories Mullins concludes with one
simple statement: "I have al-
ways had a deep respect and
sympathy for the underdog."
After reading his informative
book, the reader will readily
understand why.

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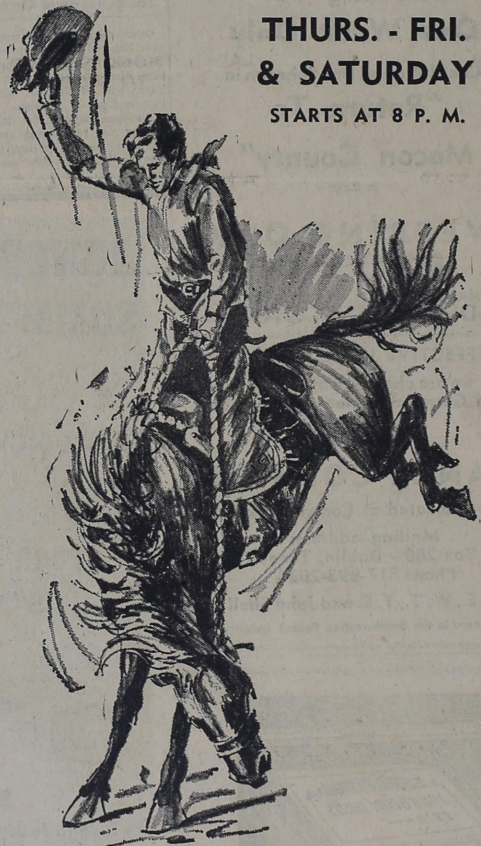
